NOTES ON REGULATED ENTERTAINMENT

In terms of specific regulated entertainments please note that:

- Plays: no licence is required for performances between 08:00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
- Films: no licence is required for 'not-for-profit' film exhibition held in community premises between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day provided that the audience does not exceed 500 and the organiser (a) gets consent to the screening from a person who is responsible for the premises; and (b) ensures that each such screening abides by age classification ratings.
- Indoor sporting events: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000.
- Boxing or Wrestling Entertainment: no licence is required for a contest, exhibition or display of Greco-Roman
 wrestling, or freestyle wrestling between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not
 exceed 1000. Combined fighting sports defined as a contest, exhibition or display which combines boxing or
 wrestling with one or more martial arts are licensable as a boxing or wrestling entertainment rather than an
 Indoor sporting event.
- Live music: no licence permission is required for:
 - o a performance of unamplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, on any premises.
 - a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a workplace that is not licensed to sell alcohol on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
 - a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.
- Recorded Music: no licence permission is required for:
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
 - any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school proprietor or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.

- Dance: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500. However, a performance which amounts to adult entertainment remains licensable.
- Cross activity exemptions: no licence is required between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, with no limit on audience size for:
 - o any entertainment taking place on the premises of the local authority where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the local authority;
 - o any entertainment taking place on the hospital premises of the health care provider where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the health care provider;
 - o any entertainment taking place on the premises of the school where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the school proprietor; and
 - o any entertainment (excluding films and a boxing or wrestling entertainment) taking place at a travelling circus, provided that (a) it takes place within a moveable structure that accommodates the audience, and (b) that the travelling circus has not been located on the same site for more than 28 consecutive days.

- (2) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.
- 5. The responsible person shall ensure that -
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures
 - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and
 - (b) customers are made aware of the availability of these measures.



e) Relevant Sections of the Local Licensing Policy.

The Licensing Authority believes that the following sections of Carmarthenshire's Licensing Policy are relevant to this licence application:-Section 3 Fundamental principles, Section 4 Conditions of Licence, Sections 5 – 9 relating to The Licensing Objectives and Section 11 relating to Licensing Hours.

f) Proposed Operating Schedule.

Having considered the current application and the operating schedule put forward by the applicant, the Licensing Authority believes that, if the application were granted, the wording set out in the operating schedule, which refers to the existing licence conditions, is not sufficiently precise to enable it to form clear enforceable licence conditions in accordance with section 18(2)(a) of the Licensing Act.

The Police have submitted a letter of representation in relation to the application. The Police representation does not object to the application but requests that additional conditions be attached to the licence should the application be granted.

Further representations has been received from other persons, which sets out their objection to the application. The subcommittee will have to be satisfied that granting the application will not undermine the licensing objectives.

If the application is granted, given the location of the premises and the permitted hours sought, I believe it would be appropriate to attach conditions numbered 1-19, requested by the Police in their letter of the 7th of August. In addition to the Police conditions I believe that it would be appropriate to attach a further condition requiring the licence holder to place prominent signs both inside and outside at the entrances to the premises advising customers that no persons may enter or re-enter the premises after midnight.

These representations have been prepared on the 23rd of August 2018 with the benefit of viewing the original application and representations from the Police and other parties.

I would be grateful if the applicant could contact me to discuss the above representations at the earliest opportunity and certainly prior to the application being referred to a Licensing Sub Committee hearing for determination.



Mr. Andrew Giles has for some time been in charge of the day to day business of running the premises. The Police therefore request that Cefin Evans be replaced as the DPS with a person who has the day to day control of the business.

There are no Police objections to the proposed variation; the Carmarthenshire Division of the Dyfed Powys Police will make the following representations.

With the later hours applied for the Police have asked for strong and robust conditions to promote the licensing objectives.

- 1. The whole of the licensed area with entry and exit areas must be covered by CCTV cameras, and there must not be any hidden or obscured areas. This will deal with issues which may have arisen outside the premises when customers have been arriving or leaving.
- 2. The System must be installed by a company certified by SSAIB or NSI Gold standard.
- 3. Main entrance exit to have a camera meeting a minimum of 100%R image quality.
- 4. All footage must be of good quality and of a minimum performance capability sufficient to identify individuals.
- 5. It must be in colour.
- 6. It must record at a minimum of 12 images per second.
- 7. All images will be time and date stamped.
- 8. All footage during the hours of Licensable activities to be retained for a period of 30 days.
- 9. The CCTV system must operate continuously, and if a defect arises the police must be informed and immediate arrangements must be made to rectify the fault
- 10. All footage must on demand_be made available to a Police Officer, Police Community Support Officer and Local authority Officer for viewing and a copy of that footage made immediately available to the above officers.



- 11. At all times during the period of operation of the premises there must be a competent person on the premises capable of reply and be able to undertake the export of recordings quickly onto a removable storage medium. Memory Stick, CD, or DVD format is acceptable to the police. The master copy will be available to the police on demand.
- 12. The system must incorporate a means of transferring images from the hard-drive to a format that can be played back on any Microsoft Windows or MAC compatible computer. The application software required to launch and view recorded images must either be included as part of the standard operating system installed or be installed to the recorded media when the data is copied to that media.
- 13 The system must be registered with the Information Commissioner (Tel 0303 123 1113 or email registration@ico.org.uk)

Please refer to the Dyfed Powys Police CCTV requirement document for full specification. This can be accessed by contacting Pc. Rob Chapman at the Neighbourhood Development Office at Ammanford Police Station telephone number 01269 590580 as a matter of urgency to discuss the above CCTV conditions prior to any agreement being reached. To ensure that any system installed complies with the requirements of the proposed licence conditions.

- 14. No open glass or glass vessels/bottles to be removed from the boundary of the Premises.
- 15 .The DPS to become a member of the local Pub Watch scheme and to support the BOBB scheme, 'Behave or be Banned'.

As per paragraph 6.7 within the Licensing Policy

- 16. The challenge 21 scheme to be adopted at the premises with notices and posters to be clearly displayed in the premises, near the entrances and bar areas. To emphasise to customers that they will be challenged if they look 21 and under.
- 17. No person under the age of 18 shall be employed on the premises whether paid or unpaid for the purpose of serving alcohol.
- 18. The consumption of alcohol by customers at the premises must cease at or before the end of opening hours as specified in the premises licence. Staff are required to collect all alcoholic drinks prior to the end of the opening hours as set out in the licence.
- 19. No persons to be allowed entry or to re-enter the premises after midnight.

The above conditions the police believe are necessary and appropriate to promote the



Licensing Objectives.

I live above my business of my garden is at the rear of the property I wish to voice my strong objections to increase the licensing hours at the Pelican Inn from Sunday - Thursday Ilpm to midnight friday - Saturday, from Ilpm to 2:30 any And here are the reasons why but first you'll have to bear in mind that I assumed' that The Pelican was legitimately open until 1-1.30am so you'll have to read some of this as the problems the proposed extension to the opening hours

Taxis

Cars of Minibusses, even the odd small coach on occasion but it's not uncommon to have up to 3 assorted vehicles all sat in the vicinity outside the felican with their engines idling in the early hours of the morning.

You're thinking now that it's just for a few minutes before they pick up their clients aren't you?

I know that you are because this would be logical reasonable/sensible. But no! whether they are waiting 15 minutes or an hour they ALL without exception leave their engines running.

It is usual for taxis to be waiting 20-40 mins.

This is annoying because in the quiet of the night the sound of the idling engines immerse my home in a pulsating drone with a raaah ta-ta-ta mrhaaaag ta-ta-ta beat if their engines ann't up to scratch and, it stinks.

It's really relaxing to get some clean fresh air at night. Taxis idling for long periods of time really stink my home out more than cars driving past during the day. It makes me feel quite nauseous sometimes.

Other neighbours complaining to me about 29239

gave me incentive; on occasion to go out to ask the taxi drivers if they would mind turning their engines of whilst they're waiting & explained why. 6 Most were Sweethearts, a few have been gruff of arsie and have gone Cosat with their enfines running around by the clock-tower instead. but people live by there too, so. This issue is still an ongoing nuisance of a completely unnescessary one by my reasoning The third issue with the taxi drivers collecting clients from the Pelican in the early hours of the morning is that by that time the front doors are Oclosed to new arrivals but the pub is still busy & playing loud music inside. Consequently the taxi drivers have to hammer with some force on the front door of the pub in order to be heard above the noise inside. Frankly this would wake the dead but oftentimes is not loud enough to alert the clients inside the pub, so, repeat until desired results are obtained It's very alarming, would certainly wake me if was naive enough to go to sleep before 2 and I've got used to it - still gives me a start but no

longer creates that flight or fight anxiety response when you recognise that it's not a neighbours door getting kicked in. This door hammering also occurs with drunk people desperate for more booze having already spent the evening in another pub,) presume.

Despite that these issues occur well post midnight, I do understand that the above issues are not directly within the control of the manager of the Pelican Inn. Regardless they are still problems in relation to the Pelican that I fear would continue from Midnight ~ 4 am should this extension to the license be granted.

Now for the issues that are under the control of the licensee. Motorhead, & other such heavy metal bands. I am not a fan.

I am not a fan of much of the music played at The Pelican (-) don't want to have to listen to it in my home. The Pelican goes through phases where all is good (-) get on with mine & my life. There may be a degree of background poise in my house of course but not to the extent of being

particulary intrusive or really interfering with the enjoyment of my home. Then there are phases and single occasions where the volume of the music is completely unacceptable & completely disrespectful of the lives of local residents! By an unacceptable level I mean being able to hear clearly which tracks are being played whilst working inside No. 17 with all the doors of windows closed. mean thoroughly anti-social It's meant to be a pub not a nightchib. I don't want to be ringing the Police at 3am to get the Pelican to stfu when the pub is going through a loud phase. Certainly 1, to 1m sure the Police have better things to do. The last issue, not entirely unrelated to the above fairly frequent breeches of the current licensing hours! I've had previous issues which should be on file regarding heavy metal music from the Pelican being audible in my home at 2-3 am. I must stress this was from the pub not from the flat above. I don't know where those files are now but when I met with the Police I could prove Page 42 it was absolutely evident from the

recordings that the pub was very much in full swing At that time I was given to understand by the Police that the license to play music was until 11pm? Still to this day the music from the Pelican is frequently at its loudest from 11pm - 1am. I have no issue with quiet lock-ins. I object when the whole neighbourhood has to share in them. It's anti-social of drunk people comming out of a noisy environment make à lot of noisé. I can understand the Pelican wanting to even out the playing field in regard to its licensing hours compared to the licensing hours of other pubs in town.

I hope I can express how strongly I object to the extended licensing hours at The Pelican Inn, Newcastle Emlyn.

I live at the back of Sycamore Street _ a garden and an alleyway from the rear of the Pelican _ and I'm frequently disturbed by loud music, swearing, shouting & general alcohol-fuelled noise from the 'smoking area' _ many times past midnight & beyond. I cannot have any windows open nor can I go to sleep on these occasiono _ the thought of it going on until 230/3am is intolerable. The Landlord already breaches his licensing hours & shows little consideration to this being a residential area (at least & people in close proximity) however much he talks the talk in our conversations.

Newcastle Emlyn is a small, unique market town & having the proposed opening hours would not be of ANY benefit to the town, only the landlard. Experience has tought me that people who drink alcohol until the early hours tend to be loud, aggressive, rously and have anti-social behaviour. Also with 5 public houses in the main street, if these extended opening
