ENVIRONMENTAL ENFORCEMENT UPDATE

To provide Scrutiny Committee with an update of enforcement matters including Public Space Protection Orders, Community Protection Notices, tackling Fly tipping and a general update on Enforcement issues.

1. Public Space Protection Order

The Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 introduced several new tools and powers for use by local authorities and partners to address anti-social behaviour (ASB) in their local areas. These tools, which replaced and streamlined a number of previous measures, were brought in as part of a government commitment to put victims at the centre of approaches to tackling ASB, focussing on the impact behaviour can have on both communities and individuals, particularly for those who may be most vulnerable.

Public Spaces Protection Orders (PSPOs) are one of the tools available under the 2014 Act. These are wide-ranging and flexible powers for local authorities, which recognise that councils are often best placed to identify the broad and cumulative impact that ASB can have. The Act gives councils the authority to draft and implement PSPOs in response to the particular issues affecting their communities, provided certain criteria are met.

Councils can use PSPOs to prohibit specified activities, and/or require certain things to be done by people engaged in particular activities, within a defined public area. PSPOs differ from other tools introduced under the Act as they are council-led, and rather than targeting specific individuals or problem properties, they focus on the identified problem behaviour in a specific location. The legislation provides for restrictions to be placed on behaviour which apply to everyone in that locality (or people in certain categories). Breach of a PSPO without a reasonable excuse is an offence.

A Public Space Protection Order was implemented on the 1st of September 2015 following a public consultation. That order enables the officers to issue fixed penalty tickets to persons who let their dogs foul anywhere in Carmarthenshire where the public have access. In addition, other powers included requesting persons to put their dog on a lead, and a ban of dogs from enclosed children's play areas. The penalty had been increased from £75 to £100. An early repayment was introduced reducing the amount from £100 to £50 if paid within 10 days.

Officers were trained, given amended penalty ticket books and have issued 13 fixed penalty tickets to date.

A letter has recently been sent from the Chairman of the Council requesting that Police Support Officers and Police Officers be designated for the purpose of issuing fixed penalty tickets in accordance with the Public Space Protection Orders. If agreeable, it would help in alleviating the high expectations placed on the Environment Enforcement section to enforce.

A joint initiative between the Police, Fire Service and Carmarthenshire County Council that allows for community groups to report anti-social behaviour issues directly. The initiative is called "Paws on patrol". Funding has been provided jointly and will go towards arranging events, literature and raise the awareness of the ASB issues in their community.

In other circumstances it may be more appropriate to use tools such as community protection notices (CPNs). CPNs are used against specific individuals responsible for causing harm, or for tackling particular problem premises, unlike PSPOs which create a broader ban covering a whole area. Similarly, in many cases existing legislation covering various forms of anti-social behaviour or public order may be adequate.

As a result Officers have issued a CPN letter and two further CPN's are presently under consideration.

2. Fly Tipping

Statistics from the Welsh Government have shown that Carmarthenshire is in the top 5 authorities in Wales in relation to fly tipping. The success is mainly due to an intelligence led approach collecting information, analysing and targeting incidents where the officers have a variety of techniques to apprehend offenders.

The section utilises Fly mapper which is a GIS mapping feature allowing staff to analyse data and take the appropriate action. (See Appendices A and B attached)

The cases are published thereby providing a deterrent to any future offenders. In 2016, 40 prosecutions have been undertaken.

Other approaches are also utilised to tackle fly tipping for example education and awareness, engaging the community in clean ups which hopefully deter further repeats.

3. Enforcement Operational Matters

Following an enforcement review on the 1st February, 2017 the officers were given new areas and boundary changes were made to balance workloads across the 4 teams. The County has been split in to four areas - teams now cover the North West, North East, South East and South West.

A review of the effectiveness of this arrangement will be undertaken after 6 weeks of operation.

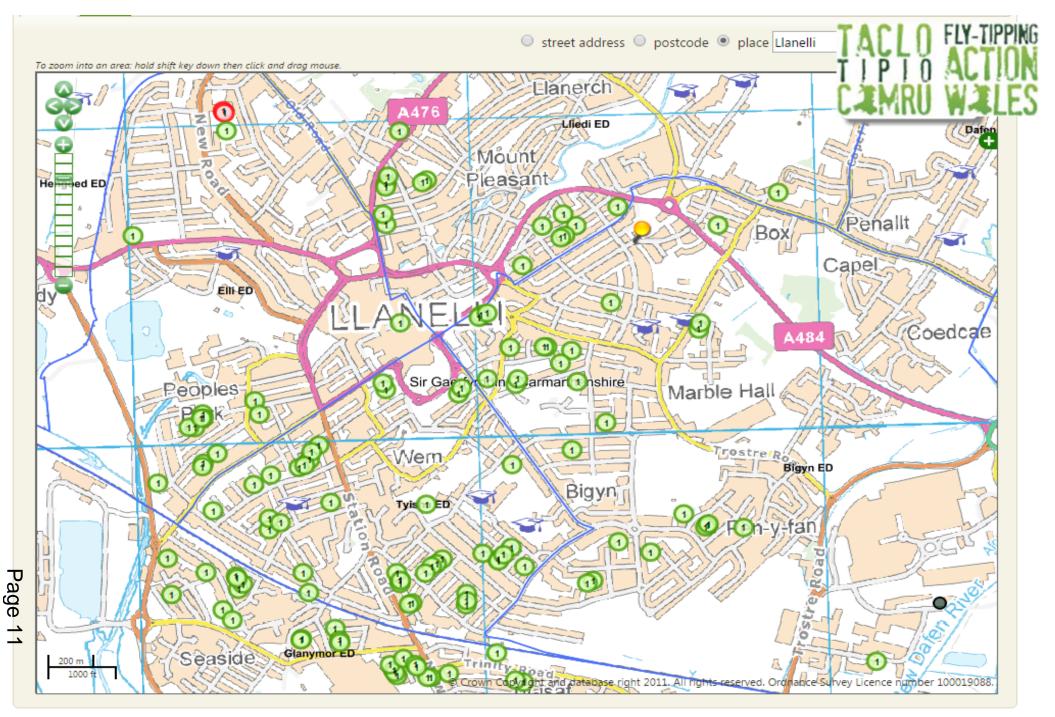

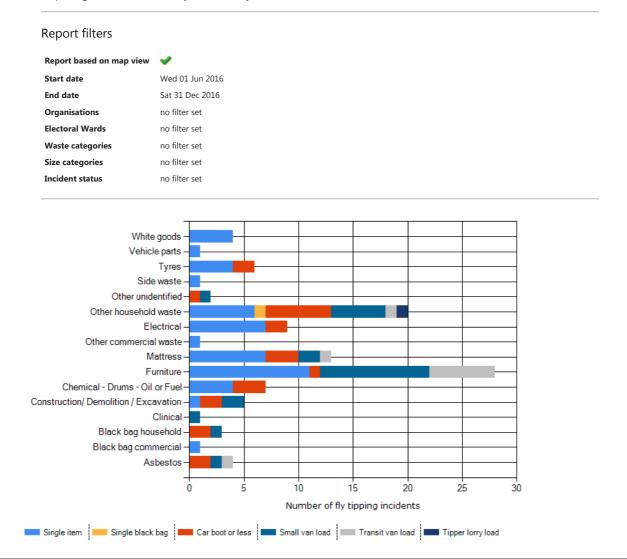

REVIEW OF LED CONVERSION PROJECT

1. Introduction and Background

1.1 The Authority section has continued to implement a programme to convert sodium lanterns to LED lanterns as approved by Executive board on 27th July 2015. The programme was developed to deliver a targeted efficiency saving of £627,000 over a three year period.

1.2 The report to Executive Board set out that £401,000 of revenue savings would be achieved through converting the Sodium lamps to LED with a further £227,000 to be delivered from reduced maintenance, labour and plant costs.

1.3 Executive Board resolved:

1.3.1 That the Technical Services Department be authorised to prepare a business case to pursue the option of funding the capital investment required to deliver the "Converting sodium lanterns to LED lanterns" option savings over the next years to implement Phases 1-3 noted in the report, via the WAG "Invest to Save" fund.

1.3.2 That the Technical Services Department's reserves (Fleet Management Reserve) be utilized to fund the capital works (up to £1.875m) required to deliver the PBB savings identified in Phase 1 and Phase 2 of the report, and that the Department continues to investigate alternative funding for Phase 3;

1.3.3 That the Public Lighting section fully implements measures to deliver the options for reducing maintenance, vehicle and labour costs noted in the report thus reducing its operational costs in order to meet its PBB targets;

1.3.4 That, should the proposals noted above fail to be delivered, then a programme of "de-commissioning" lights on the road networks be prepared by the Public Lighting section to achieve the required budget savings for the outstanding amount and report thereon be submitted in due course.

1.4 The capital investment required to fund delivery of the first phases of the programme was secured from a Wales Government Invest to Save Fund and reserves.

The programme was structured into three phases as set out in the Table One overleaf:

2.0 Progress

Funding for the programme was secured through a £1.4 million Invest to Save Loan and the balance from the reserves, as approved by Executive Board.

The original programme was reviewed and amended to exploit advancement in technology and improve efficiency during the installation phase. The detail is set out in Table Two below:

Further savings of **£309,000** have also been realised from changes to the operational delivery in the areas of maintenance, vehicles, energy and labour. The total saving delivered to the end of Phase One is **£454,000**.

The saving delivered to the end of the current financial year is consistent with the budget profile as set out in Table Three below.

In terms of capital investment, the authority has drawn down £950,000 of an agreed invest to save loan of £1,400,000 and plans to draw down the full value of the loan by phase 3 of the programme.

The forecast savings moving forward are reliant on the Department continuing to sustain the efficiencies, the programme is subject to risk particularly with regards to energy costs. The programme will be reviewed following completion of Phase 2.

The project to date has been successful in delivering the efficiencies envisaged at the outset, a further review will be undertaken near to the completion of Phase 2 to determine if Phase 3 can be delivered in line with the original programme.

Carmarthenshire County Council Environment Act Forward Plan

This report brings to the attention of the Committee the requirements under the Environment (Wales) Act 2016 that all public bodies 'must seek to maintain and enhance biodiversity in the proper exercise of their functions and in doing so promote the resilience of ecosystems'. This new duty is termed the Biodiversity and Resilience of Ecosystems Duty. It strengthens, and supersedes the Biodiversity Duty placed on public bodies under the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act 2016.

The Act requires that all public authorities prepare an Environment Act Forward Plan detailing out how they intend to demonstrate that it will be complying with the Biodiversity and Resilience of Ecosystems Duty referred to in the Environment (Wales) Act 2016. The requirement that this Forward Plan be submitted to the Welsh Government by 31st March 2017 is set out in the legislation.

The draft Forward Plan for the Authority is attached for Committee's information and comment. The plan will be taken to the Executive Board.

In order to comply with the Environment (Wales) Act 2016 and the Biodiversity and Resilient Ecosystem Duty set out in the Act, CCC as a public body, needs to review its plans, policies and working methods, across all directorates, to ensure that that is fulfilling this new duty, namely to maintain and enhance biodiversity and to promote ecosystem resilience. Not only are public bodies required to publish their Environment Act Forward Plan, but they will be required, in 2019, to report on how they have met the Biodiversity and Resilient Ecosystem Duty. The intention in the legislation is that the duty to forward plan will ensure that biodiversity is considered at the decision making level, and the reporting duty will make public authorities more responsible for showing how their actions have helped enhance biodiversity and ecosystems.

Attached is CCC's first Forward Plan. It has been developed by and for the Environment Department through a series of workshops with both Heads of Service, and officers within four of its divisions, held in November and December 2016. Those attending were asked to review the activities for which they are responsible, and identify activities that had the potential to impact either positively or negatively on biodiversity. They were then asked to address, how, perhaps through changes in working practice, they could ensure compliance with the new Biodiversity and Ecosystem Resilience duty placed on public bodies by the Environment (Wales) Act 2016. The twelve key actions set out in the plan reflect these discussions, and have been circulated to Heads of Service, and all those that attended the workshops, prior to inclusion in this plan. The plan refers to twelve key actions that will be carried out to demonstrate how the Council is embedding biodiversity into its decision making and working practices.

Assuming that this proves to be a successful approach, similar workshops will be held for other CCC departments in 2017, with a view to developing further the Council's approach to demonstrating compliance with this new duty.

1. Policy, Crime & Disorder and Equalities

Biodiversity is everywhere: in gardens, fields, hedgerows, mountains, rivers and in the sea. Biodiversity represents quality of life. It gives pleasure, interest and an appreciation of our natural environment.

Why biodiversity matters?

The natural environment of Wales supports the huge variety of wildlife that lives here. But we must remember that biodiversity also sustains our lives. A healthy natural environment is a vital part of a sustainable and robust society in Wales. Wildlife provides us with pleasure, inspiration and attractive communities.

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Carmarthenshire's natural environment matters to us all - in many different ways. Although it is not always obvious, biodiversity provides us with many of the things that sustain our lives, through a number of important services:

- Provisioning providing food (wheat, fish, etc.), fuel (timber, coal), fresh water, medicine, textiles.
- Regulating disposing of pollutants, controlling floods, absorbing carbon dioxide (greenhouse gases), stopping erosion.
- Cultural beautiful landscapes, a sense of place, recreation and tourism, inspiration and investigation from schoolchildren to scientists.
- Supporting maintaining soils and plant growth.

Biodiversity matters for a whole variety of reasons: ethically, emotionally, environmentally and economically. It is at the very foundation of our society and the basis of our economic success and wellbeing.

A lot of these services we get for free! The cost of replacing these (if possible) would be extremely expensive. For example, bees are vital to our economy – they pollinate many of our crops such as strawberries and apples as well as animal fodder crops such as clover. It would cost UK farmers £1.8 billion a year to pollinate their crops without bees (WG Bee friendly Action Guide).

The underlying geology, the geography and hydrology of the county allow many important ecosystem services to work and improve our lives. Some examples:

• Peatland – peat soils capture and store atmospheric carbon dioxide which can be held in the soil permanently when the soil is in good condition.

- Saltmarsh on the coast helps dissipate wave action and high tides to prevent flooding and erosion.
- Floodplains in the valleys help dissipate water at high rainfall preventing flooding downriver.
- Species rich grasslands provide essential habitat and connectivity for pollinators and food for livestock. Damp grasslands act like sponges, storing and slowly releasing water.
- Woodlands help clean the air of pollutants, provide oxygen and timber products.

The varied habitats also bring job opportunities, particularly in the tourism sector where Carmarthenshire is well known for its magnificent coastline, for its forests for mountain biking and its uplands for walking.

There are a number of sites within Carmarthenshire that have been designated for nature conservation including local, national and international designations. These special habitats support some wildlife nationally important species such as the marsh fritillary butterfly, water vole and red squirrel.

The Carmarthenshire Local Biodiversity Action Plan (LBAP) focuses on local action that meets the objectives for each habitat and species within the plan.

How our natural resources support the seven well-being goals (from State of Natural Resources Report)

A prosperous Wales	Natural resources provide opportunities for employment and economic activity. For example, wildlife and outdoor activity tourism to Wales provides around 206,000 jobs and is estimated to be worth £6.2 billion. In 2013, over 3.5 million visitors to our coastline brought £602 million to the economy, with growth predicted at 10%. Wales' three National Parks attract 12 million visitors every year who spend £1 billion on goods and services.

3. Environment Act (Wales) 2016

The Environment (Wales) Act became law on 21st March 2016. It puts in place legislation to enable Wales' resources to be managed in a more proactive, sustainable and joined up manner and to establish the legislative framework necessary to tackle climate change. The Act supports the Welsh Government's wider remit under the Well-being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015 (WFG Act, see below), so that Wales benefits from a prosperous economy, a healthy and resilient environment and vibrant, cohesive communities.

The Biodiversity and Resilience of Ecosystems Duty

Section 6 of the Act requires that all **public authorities** 'must seek to maintain and enhance biodiversity in the exercise of functions in relation to Wales, and in so doing promote the resilience of ecosystems, so far as consistent with the proper exercise of those functions'.

The duty replaces the Section 40 duty in the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act 2006 (NERC Act 2006), in relation to Wales, and applies to those authorities that fell within the previous duty. The duty came into force May 2016.

See Appendix 1 for more detail.

The intention is to ensure that in carrying out their functions, public authorities will:

- Place biodiversity as a natural and integral part of policy and decision making within public bodies, embedding it in its plans, policies and projects and day-to-day activities.
- Address biodiversity decline, through positive actions that will result in maintenance or enhancement of our biodiversity
- Develop ecosystem resilience through maintaining and enhancing biodiversity

A resilient ecosystem is one that is healthy and functions in a way that is able to address pressures and demands placed on it, and is able to deliver benefits over the long term to meet current social, economic and environmental needs. Our ecosystems provide us with a wide range of services and benefits. We need to take **all** of these into account when we make decisions about how we use them, so that they provide multiple benefits for the long term. This includes taking into account their intrinsic value.

It is part of a wider delivery framework for the sustainable management of natural resources (Appendix 2).

Biodiversity Lists

Welsh Government (after consultation with NRW) must prepare and publish a list of species and habitats which in their opinion are of principal importance for the purpose of maintaining and enhancing biodiversity in relation to Wales ('Section 7 list'). Public bodies must take all reasonable steps to maintain and enhance the living organisms and types of habitat included on this list. This replaces the list created under Section 42 of the NERC duty. The species and habitats on this list that occur in Carmarthenshire can be found <u>here</u>.

Forward Planning and Reporting

Unlike the previous duty provision the new duty requires formal demonstration of compliance. The Authority is, therefore, required by the Act to prepare and publish a plan setting out how it intends to comply with the duty. While the Act does not set a timescale for this, guidance from Welsh Government expect it to be produced by March 2017. By the end of 2019 the Authority is required by the Act to publish a report on what it has done to comply with the duty, this is then required to be reported every 3 years.

However, as Carmarthenshire County Council falls under the WFG Act it can:

- use its statement on Well-being Objectives to state how it plans to deliver the Biodiversity Duty.
- report on how it will meet the Biodiversity Duty via the annual review of the Well-being Objectives.

Nature Recovery Action Plan

The Welsh Government launched its own <u>Nature Recovery Action Plan</u> (NRAP), which sets out its commitment to biodiversity in Wales, the issues we need to address, and the objectives for action to show how in Wales, we can address the underlying causes of biodiversity loss. Specifically by:

- Putting nature at the heart of decision-making
- Increasing the resilience of our natural environment
- Taking specific action for habitats and species

It sets out how Wales will deliver the commitments of the Convention on Biological Diversity and the EU Biodiversity Strategy to halt the decline in our biodiversity by 2020 and then reverse that decline. The ambition of the plan is: *To reverse the decline in biodiversity, for its intrinsic value, and to ensure lasting benefits to society.*

It also sets out how current and proposed actions for biodiversity, through the Environment (Wales) Act 2016 and the WFG Act

By adopting and applying the NRAP objectives, when carrying out their functions, public authorities can ensure that they comply with the new duty.

This approach will also help public authorities meet their obligations under the WFG Act, in particular to meet the Resilient Wales goal, as well as many of the other goals. Appendix 4 suggests ways in which the authority action could meet these objectives (from WG guidance).

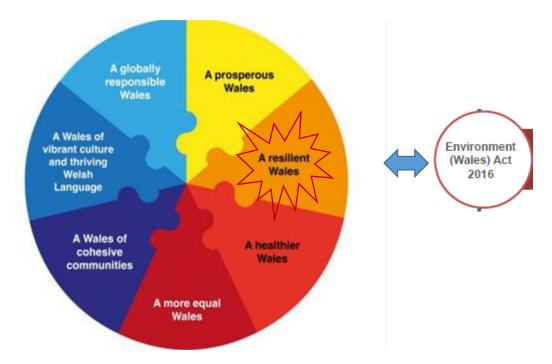

4. Strategic context

4.1 Well-being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015

The Well-being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015 (WFG Act) puts in place a stronger, more coherent sustainable development framework for Wales through a set of seven well-being goals (Appendix 4), a sustainable development principle, and a strong duty for all public bodies to carry out sustainable development, reflecting the need to improve the economic, social, environmental and cultural well-being of Wales. The Environment (Wales) Act 2016 complements the WFG Act.



• As part of the WGF Act individual Public Bodies must prepare and publish well-being objectives based on the well-being goals alongside a statement about the well-being objectives by 31 March 2017.

• With regard to the 'Resilient Wales' goal, the Act requires public bodies to set objectives to achieve a 'biodiverse natural environment with healthy functioning ecosystems'. This must be considered within the context of all the goals being integrated, i.e. the fact that biodiversity contributes to our economy and health and well-being, etc.

The Sustainable Development Principle and the Five Ways of Working

The WFG Act sets out five ways of working public bodies must adhere to in order to demonstrate how they are meeting their duty. Any plan/project must now demonstrate that they are following these ways of working.

Looking at the **long term** so that we do not compromise the ability of future generations to meet their own needs

Understanding the root causes of the issues to **prevent** them reoccurring

Taking an **integrated** approach so that we look at all well- being goals and objectives of other services and partners

Collaboration - working with others in a collaborative way to find shared sustainable solutions **Involvement** - ensuring a diversity of the population is involved in decisions that affect them

5. Forward Plan – Divisional Actions

How the action plan was developed

This first action plan has been developed by and for the Environment Department through a series of workshops with both Heads of Service and colleagues within four of its divisions in late November and December 2016. Those attending were asked to review the activities for which they are responsible, and identify which of these had the potential to impact on biodiversity and where there are opportunities to address, through a change in working practice, the new Biodiversity and Ecosystem Resilience duty placed on public bodies by the Environment (Wales) Act 2016. The goals set out below reflect these discussions, and have been circulated to Heads of Service and all those that attended the workshops prior to inclusion in this plan. Assuming that this proves to be a successful approach, similar workshops will be carried out with other CCC departments in 2017.

The Biodiversity and Resilience of Ecosystems Duty

The new Biodiversity Duty replaces Section 40 of the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act 2006 in Wales whereby public authorities had a duty to 'have regard to the conservation of biodiversity' in the exercise of their functions.

- (1) A public authority must seek to maintain and enhance biodiversity in the exercise of functions in relation to Wales, and in so doing promote the resilience of ecosystems, so far as consistent with the proper exercise of those functions.
- (2) In complying with subsection (1), a public authority must take account of the resilience of ecosystems, in particular the following aspects—
 - (a) diversity between and within ecosystems;
 - (b) the connections between and within ecosystems;
 - (c) the scale of ecosystems;
 - (d) the condition of ecosystems (including their structure and functioning);
 - (e) the adaptability of ecosystems.
- (3) Subsection (1) does not apply to-
 - (a) the exercise of a function by Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs, or
 - (b) the exercise of a judicial function of a court or tribunal.
- (4) In complying with subsection (1)-

(a) the Welsh Ministers, the First Minister for Wales, the Counsel General to the Welsh
Government, a Minister of the Crown and a government department must have regard to the
United Nations Environmental Programme Convention on Biological Diversity of 1992, and
(b) any other public authority must have regard to any guidance given to it by the Welsh Ministers.

(5) In complying with subsection (1), a public authority other than a Minister of the Crown or government department must have regard to—

(a) the list published under section 7;

(b) the state of natural resources report published under section 8;

(c) any area statement published under section 11 for an area that includes all or part of an area in relation to which the authority exercises functions.

"Biodiversity" means the diversity of living organisms, whether at the genetic, species or ecosystem level

The intention is to ensure that in carrying out their functions, public authorities will help to reverse biodiversity decline but also to assist in the delivery of sustainable management of natural resources by contributing to the resilience of ecosystems.

Forward planning and Reporting

(6) A public authority other than a Minister of the Crown or government department must prepare and publish a plan setting out what it proposes to do to comply with subsection (1).

(7) A public authority must, before the end of 2019 and before the end of every third year after 2019, publish a report on what it has done to comply with subsection (1).

(8) A public authority that has published a plan under subsection (6)—

(a) must review the plan in the light of each report that it publishes under subsection (7), and Page 40

(b) may revise the plan at any time.

Explanation

The duty requires that public authorities '*must seek to maintain and enhance biodiversity in the proper exercise of their functions and in doing so promote the resilience of ecosystems*

- Biodiversity the variety of species and habitats found in the county.
- Ecosystem communities of plants and animals, together with the non-living physical characteristics of their environment (e.g. geology, soil and climate) interlinked together as an ecological system through nutrient flows and energy cycles.

e.g. woodlands, grasslands, freshwater

What is ecosystem resilience?

- Diversity of species and habitats within and between ecosystems
- Size and extent of the ecosystem. The greater the extent of an ecosystem the more able it will be able to cope with disturbance, e.g. the larger the area of habitat is the larger population of a species it can support – ditches in Llanelli area and water voles, so they are less likely to become extinct and the more genetically diverse they will be.
- Condition of the ecosystem. If an ecosystem is in poor condition it will be stressed and reduced capacity to resist, recover or adapt to new disturbances or to deliver ecosystem services.
- Connection and linkages between and within ecosystems. This usually applies to movement of
 organisms from foraging to dispersal of seeds and genes, adjustment to climate change. Also with
 regard to natural processes, e.g. water cycling within a landscape. Good connectivity allows
 ecosystems to recover from disturbance more easily Connectivity can be reduced through habitat
 loss and fragmentation.
- Adaptability to change (e.g. climate change). A vital part of resilience allowing ecosystems to adapt to change, climate change. All the other elements of resilience are the basis of allowing adaptation to happen.

Appendix 2

The Environment Act is part of a wider delivery framework for the sustainable management of natural resources.

• <u>State of Natural Resources Report</u> (SoNaRR) – has been produced by Natural Resources Wales (NRW). The report sets out the state of Wales' natural resources. It assesses the extent to which natural resources in Wales are being sustainably managed, and recommends a proactive approach to building resilience. And - for the first time – the report links the resilience of Welsh natural resources to the well-being of the people of Wales. NRW consider how pressures on Wales' natural resources are resulting in risks and threats to long-term social, cultural, environmental and economic well-being, as set out in the WFG 2015. It looks at the key issues, as well as opportunities for integrated solutions that provide multiple benefits. SoNaRR *will underpin the,*

• A <u>Natural Resources Policy</u> (NRP) – will be produced by Welsh Government, which will set out will set out the priorities for sustainable management of natural resources at a national level. The priorities in the NRP will be delivered at a **local level through**,

• *Area Statements* – to be produced by **NRW** in order to facilitate the implementation of the NRP. Area statements will set out the key risks that need to be carefully managed and mitigated and the key

opportunities and priorities for the sustainable use of natural resources at an area level. These will be produced between May 2017 and December 2019.

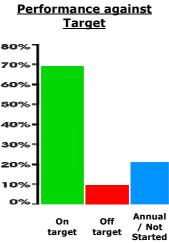

7. UPDATE ON THE CURRENT AIR QUALITY MANAGEMENT AREAS IN CARMARTHENSHIRE

The Committee considered the Update on Current Air Quality Management Area (AQMA) in Carmarthenshire. The Committee noted that the Environment Act 1995 placed a duty on local authorities to assess and manage air quality in its area. This report provided the Committee with a detailed update of the levels of NO² specifically with in the town of Llandeilo and areas of Carmarthen and Llanelli which had experienced increasing levels of NO² over the last few years. It was noted that in relation to the provision of a new bypass for the Town of Llandeilo, a number of actions had been implemented and that the Welsh Government had recently released a statement to confirm that work would progress on the bypass in 2019.

The following issues were raised in relation to the report:

In response to a concern regarding to what was planned to help improve the flow of traffic in the Felinfoel area of Llanelli, the Head of Transportation & Highways informed the Committee that the flow of traffic and level of emissions had significantly improved following the changes to the road layout. The Head of Transportation and Highways also confirmed that actions to be included within an Air Quality Management Plan would be fully considered.

Reference was made to the fact that the appendices 1, 2 and 3 were not attached to the report. The Head of Housing and Public Protection apologised to the Committee for the oversight and stated that the report would be rescheduled for the next meeting along with the appendices for consideration.

It was commented that a new bypass would be a welcome improvement to the town of Llandeilo and improve the current traffic pollution problems.



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YOUR COUNCIL doitonline www.carmarthenshire.gov.wales Disappointment was expressed that Job's Well Road, College Road and Llansteffan Road remained outside the AQMA boundary. The Director of Environment reminded the Committee that the recommendations for the AQMA's had been previously considered and agreed by Council meeting held on the 11th May 2016.

A concern was raised regarding the impact the work of the new bypass would have on the residents of Llandeilo.

The Principal Environmental Health Officer informed the Committee that in accordance with legislative requirements, an Action Plan had been developed and was currently in the second year of phase 1, which would be reported shortly.

It was stated that residents of Llandeilo were 'pro the route' and that the new bypass seemed to be the only solution to the current air quality problem.

RESOLVED that the report be received.

8. CURRENT POSITION OF FOOD HYGIENE RATING IN CARMARTHENSHIRE

The Committee considered the report on the Current Position of Food Hygiene Rating in Carmarthenshire. The report in accordance with the Food Hygiene Rating (Wales) Act 2013, and in conjunction with the voluntary scheme which required food businesses to display their food hygiene ratings enabled consumers in Carmarthenshire make better informed choices about where they eat and buy food.

The following issues were raised in relation to the report:

A query was raised whether the same officers carried out inspections in the same premises. The Public Health Services Manager confirmed that officers carried out inspections in different areas.

Reference was made to the list of the 26 businesses who were broadly compliant but had failed to respond. In response to a query, regarding the 'period since last score' and frequency of inspections, the Head of Housing and Public Protection informed the Committee that an inspection programme was in place which was updated frequently. Furthermore, it was highlighted to the Committee that the list provided was as of the 29th December 2016. The Public Health Services Manager added that since the 29th December 2016, the hygiene rating for two of the premises had improved following a recent inspection. The inspection of Whitland Mart found an improvement to a rating of 4 and Ling Di Long in Ammanford had demonstrated a rating of more than 2.

A query was raised regarding the imminent risk factors which result in the closure of food businesses. The Head of Housing and Public Protection stated food businesses could only be closed down if there was found to be an 'imminent risk'. The report included examples of imminent risk including infestation of vermin or lack of hot water. However, the Committee was informed that there were many other factors of risk which would be considered during inspections.



EICH CYNGOR arleinamdani www.sirgar.llyw.cymru YOUR COUNCIL doitonline www.carmarthenshire.gov.wales In response to a query regarding Carmarthenshire's current poor performers, the Head of Housing and Public Protection stated that all 36 businesses who were not broadly compliant had been written to, had asked to confirm their plans on how they intended to improve their hygiene ratings.

It was asked, what would happen should an Inspecting Officer not be satisfied that a premises would obtain a minimum of a 3 rating? The Public Health Services Manager stated that if the Inspecting Officer was not satisfied that a premises would improve upon their current hygiene rating following reassessment, the premises would be given an improvement or remedial action notice and that prosecution could take place if notices had not been adhered to.

In response to a query, the Head of Housing and Public Protection stated that various public communication methods would be utilised as an influential tool to encourage premises who were not broadly compliant to improve their food hygiene ratings. Furthermore, it had been made clear to all businesses contacted, that the Authority would be make a public statement on those who appeared not to have any intention to become broadly compliant.

The Head of Housing and Public Protection emphasised that it was safe for the public to eat and purchase food from those premises who were found to be not broadly compliant.

It was asked, how Inspecting Officers deal with owners/staff of premises who speak a foreign language? The Head of Housing and Public Protection stated that Authority had a well-established procedure in place and when necessary the Language Line service was utilised.

RESOLVED that the report be received.

9. PRIORITISATION MODEL FOR HIGHWAY INFRASTRUCTURE AND ROAD SAFETY IMPROVEMENTS

The Committee considered the Prioritisation Model for Highway Infrastructure and Road Safety Improvements report, which provided an outline of the revised criteria for the assessment and prioritisation of requests for highway infrastructure and road safety improvements. The Committee noted that the Executive Board at their meeting on the 14th November, 2011 approved the current criteria for assessment, selection and prioritisation of Road Safety Improvement and Footway Improvements funded from the Council's capital budget. The report highlighted that the demand for improvements was high and that currently there were 355 separate requests for highway infrastructure and road safety improvements.

The following issues were raised in relation to the report:

In response to a query regarding the number of schemes, the Head of Transportation & Highways informed the Committee that new requests were assessed on an annual basis with the overall list of requests being reviewed every 2 years. However, schemes that were already committed for delivery within the Programme would not be included in any review.



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YOUR COUNCIL doitonline www.carmarthenshire.gov.wales Following a query, the Head of Transportation & Highways clarified that 10% of any Capital Programme could be allocated to provide expedient low cost, high value measures to address high risk road safety issues or to reduce revenue costs from school transport costs. An example of which, could include a section of highway used for walking to school being upgraded with additional safety measures such as road markings, improved signage, safety fencing, surfacing or developing linking footways to create 'safe' walking routes.

In response to a comment regarding high risk sites following accidents resulting in a fatality, the Head of Transportation & Highways stated the Authority investigated accidents along with relevant partners and that this model would be used to assess interventions according to risk using the criteria set out in the model.

RESOLVED that the report be received.

10. TO SIGN AS A CORRECT RECORD THE MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE COMMITTEE HELD ON THE 16TH DECEMBER 2016

Reference was made to Minute 6, Update on the Situation Regarding the Kerosene Leak Incident at Nantycaws. It was asked if there was any further information on the matter. The Director of Environment stated that the Recovery Group was scheduled to meet early February 2017 and that no other issues had arisen to date.

A request was made to make an amendment to Minute 2, Declarations of Interest as follows:-

Amend the declaration from "Member of the Carmarthen & District Fishing Club" to read "Chairman of Carmarthen Amateur Angling Association".
