Disclosure of the proposed sites at this time is likely to undermine the administration of justice, and therefore on balance the public interest in disclosure is outweighed by the public interest in maintaining confidentiality.

The Executive Board Member considered a report which recommended the serving of Prohibition Orders in relation to a number of long dormant mineral working sites so as not to perpetuate historical and unsustainable patterns of supply and to ensure that supply was managed in a sustainable way and struck a balance between environmental, economic and social considerations.

Xcel has been developed in response to identified need for quality services via extensive community consultations – Petitions, Questionnaire, Letters of Support, sample Surveys, Facebook posts, Trip Adviser comments, customers feedback

There is no other low cost charitable meeting space in the vicinity of Johnstown, this will be a new service to the project adding another income stream to the bowling alley, furniture and charity shop.

Towy Community Church and project Xcel (now in its third year) have a proven track record of delivering on social objectives in the local community:

- Foodbank over 5000 people have received emergency food aid
- Xcel Furniture over 200 people have benefitted from low cost furniture, and nearly 100 tonnes recycled therefore reducing the amount being sent to landfill
- Over 150,000 visitors to date

The project seeks to benefit this community and the neighbourhood by associating together with the community, local authority and voluntary organisations. Making the offices in Phase 2 of the project habitable will reduce sickness levels at the project (it is severely cold in the winter) but also provides valuable income for the project enabling the other aspects like the Foodbank to continue to meet the needs of those in distress, thus helping their wellbeing and health.
