2. DECISIONS RECORD - 26TH JANUARY 2022

RESOLVED that the decision record of the meeting held on the 22nd January, 2022 be signed as a correct record.

3. SUPPORTING WELSH LANGUAGE IN BUSINESS AND COMMUNITY ORGANISATIONS - IAITH GWAITH

The Cabinet Member considered a report detailing the proposed establishment of an initiative, laith Gwaith, to support businesses and community organisations to access financial support to raise the profile of the Welsh language within their organisation following on from a successful application to the UK government community renewal Fund. The maximum grant would be £3,000 with each grant award based on up to 50% of the total eligible costs.

RESOLVED to approve the delivery of the laith Gwaith initiative detailed in the report.

4. LLWYDDO'N LLEOL BURSARY PROGRAMME

The Cabinet Member considered a report detailing the proposed establishment of an initiative, the Llwyddo'n Lleol Bursary Fund, which would offer a bursary of up to £2,000 or 80% of total project costs, whichever was the lesser amount, for prestart businesses or existing SME businesses trading for less than 12 months where the business concept had a strong Welsh or bilingual focus. Whilst the project would primarily focus on 18–30-year-olds, applications from other prestart businesses would be considered.

RESOLVED to approve the delivery of the Llwyddo'n Lleol Bursary Fund initiative detailed in the report.

In this case, the public interest in maintaining transparency and accountability is outweighed by the public interest in maintaining confidentiality, as disclosure would be likely to place persons and businesses named in the report at an unfair disadvantage in relation to their commercial competitors.

The Cabinet Member reconsidered an offer of grant for £750,000.00 from the Carmarthenshire Transformational Commercial Property Development Fund to Cambrian Pet Foods on 19th December 2019 [Minute 6 thereof refers] following delays in the original proposed scheme and changes within the company itself as detailed in the circulated report.

Project Description	The Cylch Meithrin at Drefach Felindre has been operating out of a side room at the Village Hall for over twenty years and the Meithrin has steadily outgrown the facilities during this time. The additional requirements which have been imposed upon them due to COVID has meant that they were not able to operate to the capacity, which was once possible, also the pandemic has had an impact on the space and play facilities that they are able to offer children in their care.		
	They became aware of the vacant former School House, which is attached to Penboyr School and following discussions with the School and the St David's Diocesan Board of Finance's Endowed Schools Committee representatives. It was evident that with some development, this would be an ideal property within which to house the Cylch Meithrin.		
	They propose to convert the former School House into a purpose-built space which will have several benefits to the children and community.		
	 They will be able to extend the morning provision to a full day, providing affordable Childcare and Education to local families. (They are Estyn registered as well as CIW) Employment options for families who can't currently afford private care could be increased. The project will allow for adaptations and disability access to make it more inclusive. Children from the Cylch are more likely to progress to the local primary school, Penboyr, maintaining that sense of community and belonging. 		

The project will allow them to offer after-school and holiday play schemes, which are not currently available in the area. The new building will give them space and capacity to work with volunteers and those on college training courses, enabling them to support the workforce development programme. They propose to spend the money on design and estimation services from suitably qualified professionals (i.e., architects/quantity surveyors), to include the following. Evidence of Need / Community Engagement

There is no other provision such as this within the vicinity and the project will allow them to expand a service that is currently delivering in a limited capacity, for the following reason.

 Currently unable to meet the demand for the Cylch Meithrin provision in the area, at present can only offer spaces on a part time basis, as they have 14 spaces to accommodate the 22 children who are registered with them.

The current venue is sub-standard, it does not offer sufficient space and is not ideal for young children, preventing them from offering all day care.

- Pre-school aged pupils and families will afford parents an opportunity to seek employment, knowing that they have a space at Cylch Meithrin for their children. Children will benefit from being in a safe, adequately staffed, educational environment, enabling them to learn and form relationships with other children of a similar age.
- Local employers increase capacity in the workforce.
- Local community support services e.g., Tir Dewi

College students training in childcare – provision of a placement experience.

Demographically, Drefach Felindre has several young families with small children and with the expansion of the Cylch Meithrin, and its proposed proximity to the school, it is hoped that the Cylch Meithrin would act as a feeder for the school, which would benefit both in the long term. There is potential to increase the current part-time provision, extending this to full day care and expanding this further into holiday play schemes. The building could offer the ability to create a community hub for lifelong learning. There is the possibility of Eco-school provision to extend to the Cylch Meithrin and expand outdoor learning opportunities. As part of KAM function the Cylch will receive regular support from the Bureau to assist and ensure outputs and targets are achieved and the project maintains its sustainability.

Project Description	Myddfai Trading Company is a Limited company which operates as a social enterprise. The business has been in operation for 12 years and sells a range of toiletries and gifts to both retail and wholesale customers. The company mission on top of their sales is to provide opportunities to vulnerable people from the local community to work alongside the team to gain work experience, social interaction, and confidence.		
	The Company has seen significant growth in recent years, however further growth is limited by current capacity. The purpose of this project is to enable the business to develop to the next stage by increasing capacity; developing new products; investing in new equipment; and providing more employment and work experience opportunities in the local community. As well as this, with increased raw materials and electricity costs, the group aim to keep its pricing competitive, but to do this, costs and overheads must be reduced, and future sustainability must be at the forefront of the company.		
	The funding will be spent on:		
	 Filling Machine – Myddfai will need to invest in a second filling machine to enable them to meet demand from customers. This will lead to increased productivity and will also create an opportunity for employment of another staff member. Labelling Machine – increased production will require investment in a third machine to label bottles. This will also provide additional work experience opportunities for team members from the community. Cardboard shredder – this will enable the group to produce their own packaging and void fill by utilising the cardboard waste produced by delivery of raw materials etc. It will reduce existing expenditure on packaging and will also reduce the cost of recycling, thereby improving environmental sustainability. Tape dispenser – Myddfai Ltd will be looking to invest in a high-capacity electronic tape dispenser which dispenses strong self-adhesive tape to pre-set length, increasing packing speed, reducing waste, and eliminating the use of plastic tape.

Project Title	Capel y Groes – Cilycwm Community Centre
Applicant	Menter Cilycwm
Project Description	The project is to restore and adapt Capel y Groes, a Grade II Listed Building donated to Menter Cilycwm by the Annibynwyr congregation in 2019, into a fully accessible, energy-efficient community centre with income potential to cover all maintenance costs and secure the future of this historic building. Cilycwm has had no venue for meetings or community activities since the school was closed in 2013. In the past the community was very active, and they want to revive that community spirit. Following on from a 2019 Project Viability study, this grant will be used for phase 1: Project Development to convert the chapel.
	This start-up phase involves surveys, appraisals, plans, permissions, and costings (e.g., structural, energy, heritage impact, asbestos, ecology, bat, topographic, and archaeological surveys) led by conservation professionals (Hiraeth Architecture, formerly r+m architects) and their project manager, who is an experienced building surveyor and conservation professional. The result will enable them to apply for funding for the Capital Works phase to refurbish and adapt the building for community use and provide expanded vital services so badly needed after the difficult and isolating times of the COVID-19 pandemic.
	There is no duplication of services or additionality. The proposed community centre will fill an aching gap. In the past Cilycwm has been a very vibrant and active community and we want to revive that spirit and develop resilience in case of future challenges like lockdowns or rural de-population.
	A WCF grant will contribute to phase 1: Project Development to meet the RIBA Stages 1, 2 and 3. The budget also covers fees & costs for the lead consultant/architects, project manager, local building surveyor and expenses like mileage and materials for displaying plans for community consultation and the planning authorities.
	While these surveys and plans are ongoing, the group will continue to offer Ty Capel vestry as a small meeting venue for community groups to meet while adhering to Welsh Government COVID-19

	guidelines about social distancing, ventilation, and hand sanitising For example, the Community Council have held meetings there, the Parents & Toddlers group are about to start meeting, and local farms have donated firewood totes to raise funds for the communicentre project. By the end of the Project Development stage, they expect to be ready to apply for a major grant(s) to progress to the Project Delivery/Capital Works phase of refurbishing and adapting Capel Groes into a fully accessible, energy-efficient, and sustainable community centre. At this stage the broad estimate for capital works is around £250k. They will not stop as one of the key objectives of Menter Cilycwm is "To secure the establishment of a community centre". Project Description	Threshold DAS Ltd are seeking grant support for their 'Helping Hand' Food Bank which opened within Llanelli Town Centre in October 2021. As with other food banks operating in the area, the 'Helping Hand' Food Bank primarily serves to create more equitable access to food through community partnerships and respond to the needs of the community through food distribution and support services. Threshold DAS already works in collaboration with other third sector organisations in the area but seeks to develop specifically access to food for individuals experiencing domestic abuse . In December alone, they provided 1125 meals and worked with 125 families. The situation regarding domestic abuse has been made worse through the COVID-19 pandemic and 'Helping Hand' food bank aims to support victims of domestic abuse throughout Carmarthenshire. The group have conducted extensive research and there will be no duplication in activities with similar services in the Carmarthenshire area. Given the niche service user group, the Helping Hand food bank would be able to offer a quick, more immediate and (if necessary) longer-term response to those vulnerable victims suffering domestic abuse and in need of food. Last year they supported 2268 individuals, a large portion of these were living in poverty and struggling to eat healthy and nutritious meals. The funding will be utilised in the following ways: - To expand and increase the capacity of the existing 'Food Bank' and to move to a new site on Station Road, so Threshold can also					

and frozen foods. This means not only the acquisition of food but assets like fridge/freezer, kitchen appliances/cooking equipment, a confidential service to create more equitable access to food for individuals. It is not envisaged that any 'caps' will be placed on the service – individuals can use the Food bank as often as they require (providing there is sufficient food) and food parcels will continue to be distributed beyond that of 'emergencies', that is, until they no longer require the support of Threshold. The food bank will be open five days a week and every other Saturday. The Helping Hands food bank will develop and strengthen food partnerships within Carmarthenshire, with a view to creating healthy, sustainable local food systems that help tackle food insecurity. The building of resilience through the development of a range of support services built around community food provision To further develop and embed food bank activities as part of Threshold's community hub to complement its existing community services such as the 'Helping Hand' Clothes Store, 'Repair Café Wales and Tea & Coffee Mornings. To explore moving some of the project's services into hubs within Carmarthenshire in rural areas. To develop volunteering opportunities for food bank users, offering volunteers training opportunities, including accredited training which will support employability. Threshold's commitment to supporting its service users had expanded to include not only individuals themselves but their children, and as such, the addressing of food inequity and the continuation of any Food bank activity will be considered as in integral part of Threshold's overall service provision - once established it will form part of Threshold's organisational services and not just a 'one-off' project activity.
