Evidence of Need / Community Engagement	Local resilience is being built within the business community by supporting local businesses and start-ups - providing and supporting local employment and other much needed and used community organisations e.g., Ferryside Repair Café, St Ishmael Community Wardrobe and the Mens Shed.

Project Description	The Public Hall central heating system needs to be replaced as the current central heating is no longer fit for purpose. Heating the building is essential for the day-to-day operation of the Public Hall during the winter. The building is very large and requires an appropriate system to adequately heat the space.
	The current oil-fired boiler has been in place since the 1970s. Yearly services to the boiler and regular maintenance has kept it in good condition for decades, but it has now come to the end of its usable life. but they cannot feasibly further maintain and sign off the safe use of the system. There are concerns of leakage due to the deteriorating state of the chimney and the boiler is not running efficiently or reliably.
	The project would see a full overhaul to the system, by removing the current boiler and sealing off the original chimney. A new gas fired boiler would be installed with its own dedicated flue, external to the building and not reliant on the original chimney. A gas supply will be run from the mains gas network into the building and a gas meter installed. Gas is the most efficient fuel type for a building of this size with such large heating requirements. The efficiency will be greatly improved over the old system, with a boiler operating at far above 90% efficient when burning fuel, vs the current boiler which is well below 90% efficient.
	With the improved efficiency of the boiler and the increased control over separate heating zones, they should see a substantial reduction in the energy bills. The boiler will burn less fuel to reach the desired temperature, and areas of the building that aren't needed can be isolated so that only the required areas are heating, again burning less fuel. There should also be a reduction in repair bills and service costs, as the new boiler will require far less maintenance outside of a yearly service.
	The project will benefit everyone that has any connection to the public hall e.g. cinema and theatre customers, performing arts groups, Brynamman Players group, local schools, snooker players, children and parents and the staff and volunteers at the cinema. The central heating is a core necessity

Project Title	Connecting People to Nature
Applicant	Initiative for Nature Conservation Cymru (INCC)
Ward	GARNANT
Project Description/ Community Benefit	This project will enable communities of the Amman Valley to get closer to the wildlife in the towns and gardens by helping to save some of the valley's most endangered wildlife species. Specifically, the project will.
	 Increase visitor numbers, activities, and participation at the Community Wildlife Garden. Install 100 specially designed nest boxes in the Amman Valley to help save the increasingly rare and endangered House Martin. Build and install a minimum of 40 Hedgehog boxes to support the UK's most iconic mammal species.
	The wildlife garden is a community space where people can come to enjoy, take part, and learn about nature conservation in the area. The funding will employ a Community Wildlife Officer to ensure that the garden is open to the public on a regular basis, so that additional people can get involved. The new officer will run open days, activities and volunteer events for schools, groups, and the general public. The garden will become the base and hub for nature conservation activities such as the Hedgehog Box building and House Martin surveys and training.
	Over a 12-month period, the project will:
	 Employ a Community Wildlife Officer (part-time). Recruit a minimum of 10 core new volunteers as well as opportunities to upskill unemployed members of community. The project will consult with Ammanford Job Centre and the Carmarthenshire Action for Volunteer Services (CAVS) to advertise volunteer roles.

Engage with 80 volunteer / participants through open
days, outreach, events, and activities. Engagement
activities will be through direct outreach to the community
as well as working in partnership with Carmarthen
County Council (CCC), Cwmaman Town Council (CTC),
Garnant Family Centre, Local Schools, and community
groups.
• Deliver 22 open days at the wildlife garden for people to
experience the garden and its wildlife. This will provide
educational and recreational opportunities, as well as
helping to combat isolation in the community whilst
increasing mental health benefits and community
cohesion.
Deliver 8 community wildlife survey events to increase
local communities' understanding and appreciation of the
wildlife they share their environment with. Local
volunteers will be involved in undertaking scientific
species monitoring of wildlife linked with the gardens
including House Martin and Hedgehog. Information
gathered by the project will be shared with local
community groups and authorities as well as
conservation groups across Wales. This will ensure that
local community action can have a national beneficial
impact.
 Deliver 3 wildlife refuge/ nest box making events.
Collaborating with existing partners in the community
such as Amman Valley Maker Space (AVMS) and
Men2Men, the project will train and upskill members of
the community in carpentry and wildlife refuge making.
These skills can then be shared with other groups and
- · ·
community volunteers.
Deliver 4 guided wildlife walks from the community
wildlife garden throughout the Amman Valley. The walks
will be an excellent opportunity for participants to learn
about the valley, its history and wildlife. The walks will
vary in length and accessibility so that all members of the
community can take part and be inspired by the wildlife
we share our valley with.
 Deliver 3 training sessions to those core volunteers who
want to take their nature conservation skills to the next
level. Training volunteers in topics such as wildlife
gardening and wildlife surveys will enable the project to
reach more communities in the Amman Valley and
provide the volunteers with transferable skills for
employment.
The Wildlife Garden has been open since April 2022. However,
without a resolute staff member, the garden has not been able to

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	realise its full potential or address the needs of the local community. Funding to employ a resolute Community Wildlife Officer will ensure that INCC can deliver more for local people and wildlife and build a strong and sustainable support base for the wildlife garden in future.

Evidence of Need / Community Engagement	 INCC first attended a community engagement event in run at the Cwmaman Town Council, Community Centre in September 2022. At the engagement event, staff and volunteers asked members of the community three questions: What do you think is special about the Amman Valley? What more would you like to see being delivered in the area for nature? And What ideas do you have for getting people involved in nature conservation. Feedback from participants showed that the environment, nature, and sense of place were principal factors of the Amman Valley and that more people wanted to see more wildlife and do their bit for nature conservation.
	From that early consultation, INCC, have been collaborating with local volunteers started to develop the Connecting People to Nature project. Additional consultation days with local groups, community open days, drop-in sessions and volunteer events undertaken in early 2023 helped refine the project and further reinforced the desire by the community to want to be closer to nature.

Contributing to the themes of the Fund	 Recreation - Community members will be able to use the garden as an outdoor recreational space where they can meet and socialise whilst enjoying wildlife or taking part in gardening activities and making wildlife refuges. Environment - The wildlife garden will create and manage a host of important natural habitats including woodland, scrub, meadow, bog, and pond. In addition, native wildflowers will be grown at the garden's polytunnel so help support local wildlife gardening within the community and wider habitat restoration projects. Research from Welsh Government and conservation bodies shows that wildlife in Wales is in serious decline. The project will support the needs of two species in Wales that desperately need our help, the Hedgehog, and the House Martin. By providing habitat boxes throughout the valley, we will be directly helping to improve our environment for these species and local people. Education - They will be developing partnerships with the local primary schools and Garnant Family Centre, to involve children and parents in this project, who will have educational opportunities to gain experience about House Martin and Hedgehog habitats, how to encourage and support their numbers in the valley. The wildlife garden will be a place where people can learn about their environment, the species, and habitats they share it with and what steps they can take to help. Guided informal walks and training days will be delivered
Ownership/ Lease	alongside more informal information sharing so that people with different interests and commitments can learn and enjoy wildlife at their own pace. Health - The project will help reduce isolation, improve mental health, and offer activities that are suitable for a wide variety of abilities within the community. Research shows that connecting people with wildlife can be beneficial for people's health and mental wellbeing. Experiencing wildlife and wildlife habitats such as meadows has been shown to reduce ailments such as stress, anxiety, and depression. It also reduces the risk of illness, including diabetes, cardiovascular disease, and cancer (Welsh Government 2022). As well as collaborating directly with the community, the project will also work with local mental health support groups including Shadows and Men2Men. As well as mental health and wellbeing, the project will also be running activity days, volunteer practical sessions and guided walks, increasing physical activity through participation.

A community consultation process conducted by Cwmaman Town Council (CTC) showed that local people wanted to see more environmental and wildlife projects being delivered in the area.
Future Sustainability	The Community Wildlife Garden is owned and managed by INCC in partnership with CTC. INCC will be the responsible organisation for the project and for the wildlife garden in the future. INCC is a charitable incorporated organisation with a strong board of trustees who oversee the financial, policy and governance of the charity.
	As well as employing a part-time Community Wildlife Officer, INCC will also be supporting the project through additional staff time from the Chief Executive Officer and Species Officer. In additional to staff, INCC has a core volunteer support group in the Amman Valley who will not only help deliver the Connecting with

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	Nature Project but will also help manage and maintain the wildlife garden in future.
	INCC staff and volunteers will become trained in making wildlife refuges such as bird nest boxes and Hedgehog boxes. Trained staff and volunteers will start making habitat refuges for online sale to support the Community Wildlife Garden and the Community Wildlife Officer. Research shows that durable Hedgehog boxes cost on average £65.00. Including materials, officer, and volunteer costs, INCC can build a box for £15.00 and are confident in retailing them at £45 per box to reflect the competitive online sale price. This will give INCC a profit margin of £30.00 per box.
	With INCC's connections to 'warm' markets across Wales and via their online shop <u>— Initiative for Nature Conservation Cymru</u> they envisage producing and selling enough units to become self- sustaining. In addition to Hedgehog boxes and House Martin Boxes, INCC will explore other habitat refuges such as Dormouse boxes, Pied Flycatcher boxes, Pine Marten Boxes, Otter Holts, and Bat Boxes.
	In addition to the sale of wildlife refugia, income will also be generated from the sale of wildflower seeds and plant plugs. Whilst we envisage that the sale of the plants will not be enough to support staff, we believe the sales will help cover the costs of materials such as recycled pots and peat-free compost. This approach makes the wildflower sales self-supporting and in- keeping with a circular economy.

Project Title	Cwm Fferws Park Community Herb Garden

Project Description/ Community Benefit	There are 3 exceptionally large, raised beds in Cwmfferws Park, 2 of which were prepared (weeded/cleared) by FOTP 2 years ago for the planting of herbs, they then involved Tycroes Brownies to help plant herbs into the prepared beds and since then, the herbs have flourished.
	Attempts have been made to weed the 3 rd bed but were unable to do so as a membrane had been put a 1/3 of the way down in the bed and below the membrane are crocosmia bulbs. They have dug out numerous bulbs over the last year but cannot get to the bulbs below the membrane, the crocosmia continue to multiply and flourish! There are also large clumps of shrub roots below the membrane which they were unable to remove.
	They would like to complete the community herb garden and clear this bed, but it will require the hiring of a digger + replacing half of the depth with topsoil + purchasing herbs to plant in the bed.
	The herb garden is for the benefit of the community - sprigs of herbs can be taken and used in cooking etc. However, most people are unaware of the names/types of herbs growing in the beds and are not helping themselves.
	By having a herb identification notice board, with herb images and names will help and result in more people taking cuttings. The board will have the herb names in both Welsh and English and they have received a quotation from a company who specialise in designing/making custom made wooden signs using sustainable timbers, they were unable to locate a company in Carmarthenshire who make large environmentally friendly custom signs.
	They will involve the community by asking for ideas of using herbs e.g. simple herb recipes, herbal teas and contributions would be put on FOTP's face-book page. A QR code would also be placed on the notice board with a link to their page where the ideas can be seen, also providing information about the health benefits of herbs.
	The Local Brownie group will be involved in planting the herbs and the Youth club will support in helping to weed the other beds and anything else (within their capabilities) we would like done.
	Other members of the community will benefit from being able to pick/use the herbs and have more of an interest in the herbs.
	The completed herb garden will improve the physical appearance of the area and of all of the Park.

	By asking for herb recipes this will be the 1 st stage in getting to know the multi-cultural residents who have recently moved into the village. Future ideas could be to offer invitations to talk about their country of birth - traditions/ foods/music etc which would enlighten many and provide an opportunity for everybody to get to know each other.
	The herbs will be purchased from a local gardening centre.

Evidence of Need / Community Engagement	Comments from residents established the need of having a method to identify the herbs e.g. I take a weekly walking group and we always walk through Cwmfferws Park via the 2 existing herb beds. I have been told regularly that signs should be in place as most people are unable to identify the herbs. FOTP volunteers are also unsure of the names. Initially, we had wooden stakes and printed stones by the herbs, but these have disappeared - a more permanent structure would be far better. Although the 2 existing beds contain a range of herbs, there are still many other varieties available which we would plant in the 3 rd bed. FOTP work in conjunction with Llanedi Community Council, and we have consulted with the contractor who is employed by LCC. He has advised that the crocosmia bulbs need to be removed from the 3 rd bed, the quantity of topsoil and herbs required for the bed and that the removed soil can be used to form a bank on an area in the park rather than being transported and disposed of.

Project Title	Ammanford Park Lighting Project
Applicant	Ammanford Town Council

Project Description/ Community Benefit	Ammanford Town Park is in the process of undergoing major refurbishment thanks to a huge amount of support from the community for the project, who have been campaigning for years to see this change and improvement. As this regeneration takes place the use of the park by the community will increase significantly to what we see today. It is anticipated that we will not only see more children using the new playground on a regular basis (the consultation, planning and funding of which is all underway) but also even more people using it for recreational and fitness purposes.
	Unfortunately at this time, particularly in the Winter months, the park is unusable due to lack of adequate lighting. Not only does this lead to the park being underutilised it also has led to considerable damage occurring within the park due to antisocial and destructive behaviour which is difficult to monitor and address in the dark. They are aware that currently members of the public avoid walking through the park and often choose to take a significantly longer route around the park using the roads which have streetlights as they are fearful of their safety walking through the park after dark.
	The lighting issue began to be addressed when funding was secured to install lighting columns at the Iscennen Road gate entrance of Ammanford Park, this new project forms the next step in ensuring the park is well lit, useable, and safe for the community of Ammanford.
	Ammanford Town Council are seeking £15,000 (with £3829.83 match funding – Total Project cost £18829.83) to install 14 new solar powered lighting columns to the main area of the park, these are to be installed at regular intervals around the existing pathways. In addition to the column lights the council is seeking to add adequate solar powered spot lighting to the newly refurbished Bandstand.
	 It will allow the Bandstand to be used by Schools/Community Groups and others for evening performances.
	 It will encourage the community to engage in projects promoting the arts, culture, and heritage.
	 It will increase the opportunity for all members of the Community to engage in physical exercise in a safe environment all year round.
	 It will encourage children and adults to use the park as a safe route to School/Work even in the winter months.
	 It will allow Ammanford Town Council to continue its redevelopment of Ammanford Park as has been requested by the residents of Ammanford.

Project Description	The Public Hall central heating system needs to be replaced as current central heating is no longer fit for purpose. Heating the building is essential for the day-to-day operation of the Public H during the winter. The building is very large and requires an appropriate system to adequately heat the space.		
	The current oil-fired boiler has been in place since the 1970s. Yearly services to the boiler and regular maintenance has kept it in good condition for decades, but it has now come to the end of its usable life. but they cannot feasibly further maintain and sign off the safe use of the system. There are concerns of leakage due to the deteriorating state of the chimney and the boiler is not running efficiently or reliably.		
	The project would see a full overhaul to the system, by removing the current boiler and sealing off the original chimney. A new gas fired boiler would be installed with its own dedicated flue, external to the building and not reliant on the original chimney. A gas supply will be run from the mains gas network into the building and a gas meter installed. Gas is the most efficient fuel type for a building of this size with such large heating requirements. The efficiency will be greatly improved over the old system, with a boiler operating at far above 90% efficient when burning fuel, vs the current boiler which is well below 90% efficient.		
	With the improved efficiency of the boiler and the increased control over separate heating zones, they should see a substantial reduction in the energy bills. The boiler will burn less fuel to reach the desired temperature, and areas of the building that aren't needed can be isolated so that only the required areas are heating, again burning less fuel. There should also be a reduction in repair bills and service costs, as the new boiler will require far less maintenance outside of a yearly service.		
	The project will benefit everyone that has any connection to the public hall e.g cinema and theatre customers, performing arts groups, Brynamman Players group, local schools, snooker players, children and parents and the staff and volunteers at the cinema.		

	The central heating is a core necessity for the sustainable operation

SPF-RIF-05 The One Planet Centre

Project title: Sustainability Support Champions' Training Programme Amount requested: £ 37,000

One Planet Centre, based in Llandovery offer consultancy, tools and training to assist individuals and organisations in becoming measurably more sustainable.

The project aims to train a sample (5) of local graduates to become experts in helping organisations transform into ecologically sustainable exemplars leading to the potential attainment of the One Planet Standard

Stages:

- 1. Recruitment
- 2. Training
- 3. Testing in a real-world environment
- 4. Employment.

A number of young people will be recruited and trained on a hybrid, part time basis in the principles of ecological footprint (EF) analysis and reduction as exemplified by The One Planet Standard.

Recommendation:

Approve grant of £ 37,000 based on a project expenditure of £ 37,000 due to innovative nature demonstrated in the application which is well aligned with the fund criteria.



SPF-RIF-07 CETMA

Project title: Community Now/ Gymuned Nawr Amount requested: £ 43,079

CETMA (Community Engagement, Technology, Media & Arts) is a social enterprise that provides social engagement, training, health and well-being through the development of unique sustainable projects for individuals, organisations and businesses.

This project will help the community respond to life post covid and now the cost of living crisis by engaging with, collaborating with and empowering organisations, businesses and the people. By listening, we can give them the community they want now.

It is a partnership between the Community, organisations, villages/towns to:

There is a clear desire to find a sustainable co-created model for the centre to ensure its future, and ongoing place in the rural community around St Clears.

The project will fund further community consultation, free engagement events at the Leisure Centre and an officer to support the consultation and the wider project.

Recommendation

Approve grant of £ 45,000 based on a project expenditure of £ 45,000 due to innovative nature demonstrated in the application which is well aligned with the fund criteria.

SPF-RIF-09 Social Farms & Gardens

Project title: Carmarthen Machinery Ring Pilot Amount requested: £ 44,571

Social Farms & Gardens is a UK wide charity supporting communities to farm, garden and grow together. The project will test, pilot and trial establishing a machinery ring that will focus on the needs of horticultural food enterprises in Carmarthenshire. It would aim to provide the opportunity for existing small-scale horticulture enterprises to scale-up from market gardening to field-scale production support existing farm enterprises not currently producing fruit and vegetable production to diversify their production without the risks associated with large investment.



A booking system for the machinery will be provided along with training on how to use the equipment safely.

Recommendation

Approve grant of £ 44,571 based on a project expenditure of £ 44,571 due to innovative nature demonstrated in the application which is well aligned with the fund criteria.

SPF-RIF-10 Ynni Sir Gâr

Project title: Bwrlwm Amount requested: £ 39,950

The project aims to develop a pilot project to conceptualise and realise how Llandovery can become a vibrant, resilient and 'green' town - where electricity is generated and used locally/ The main outcome of Bwrlwm is to establish an Energy Local Club in the town, linking local renewable energy generators with local users, thereby ensuring a fairer cost for users and generators. The project will also support existing climate, energy and circular economy related projects (e.g. a proposed EV Community Car Club, the Repair Café, food growing initiatives, protection and enhancement of biodiversity and natural green spaces and the community orchard etc.), and support further ideas that have recently been discussed within the community (e.g. the creation of a coop owned, pop-up woollen mill and an electric bike club).

Prosiect Embrace will help organisation across 8 rural areas in Carmarthenshire (Garnant, Glanaman, Llandybie, Hendy, Llannon, Pontyberem, Llanfihangel -ar-Arth) to train key staff, trustees or volunteers within organisations and community groups to plan and map out their compliance processes in their organisations to identify new and innovative ways of working to be resilient and compliant. The training will include how to write Risk Assessments correctly in line with current guidance, help groups to understand their responsibilities for event Health & Safety and Fire Safety and what paperwork they need to complete along with helping them understand the new GDPR law and technicalities.

The project will run 100 sessions in a blended format offering from group and online training, webinars and surgeries and if requested 1to1.

SPF-RIF-12 Potential to Succeed CIC Project title: The INNOVATE & EVOLVE Project Amount requested: £ 24,750

The INNOVATE & EVOLVE Pilot Project aims to provide 28 Community Groups /



Organisations / Social Enterprises (with up to 84 members (3 per group) attending 121 or small group training and implementation support) from Whitland, Llanboidy, St Clears with Llansteffan, Laugharne Township, Cenarth and Llangeler, Cynwyl Elfed, Abergwili and Llandeilo with up to 6hrs dedicated digit-tech training and implementation time via Tech Implementors helping them to efficiently and effectively; use and embed innovative, digital technologies and systems into their set-up, day to day running of their Group / Organisation.

The project will provide support with Max Tax Digital, Data & GDPR, Marketing and Digital Media. 28 Groups / Organisations will be supported.

SPF-RIF-14 Tetrim Teas Cyf.

Project title: Tŷ Te Trimsaran Tea Hub Amount requested: £ 44,588

There are three main components, brought together through the $T\hat{y}$ Te (Tea House/Hub) project. These three components are:

1. Local Welsh language jobs for a local tea company. 50% funding is requested for three roles for one year: R&D Officer PT, Business and Community Development Officer FT and Community Officer PT (local support role).

2. Tŷ Te weekly club– this will be a weekly tea club based at Canolfan Plas y Sarn, through the medium of Welsh. A two-hour slot, once a week, Tŷ Te will be an opportunity for local people to receive support (primarily around health and well-being), with different advisors and speakers, linking in with the school, the Wellbeing Health Assessment Research Unit in Aberystwyth and other village groups.

3. Business development and continued research. This will involve social partnering and working closely with local growers and supply chains to develop partnership working that goes beyond pure commerce.

They also plan to develop new blends of health teas in the future where additional specialist staff will need to be employed.

Recommendation

Approve grant of £ 39,950 based on a project expenditure of £ 44,588 due to innovative nature demonstrated in the application which is well aligned with the fund criteria.

SPF-RIF-15 Kidwelly Hub CIC

Project title: The Pelican Amount requested: £ 11,000

The Pelican, a prominent building located in the town centre of Kidwelly opposite the Town Square, requires regeneration. The aim is to transform the building into a vibrant space, offering accommodation, retail space, space for street food pop-ups with a dining area to help start-ups, and a space for culture.

Initially, funding is required for a feasibility study, relevant surveys and architectural plans.



The study will also include further public consultation with residents, businesses and other stakeholders to ensure the project meets the needs of the community and a long-term strategy, with all the plans needed to move forwards with its transformation.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the application is not supported as does not align with the key criteria of the fund and applicant be signposted to other funding opportunities more suited to the project activity.

Project title: Regeneration of Trimsaran Miners Welfare Hall Amount requested: £ 45,000

The Miners Welfare Hall is held in trust by the Community Council and has a charity status. The hall is very much in need of renovation. Prior commencing to a capital grant application, the Community Council believe that a full and comprehensive study is needed of the building in order to calculate costs, sustainability future use and risks. Project activities will be to explore, calculate and plan the future regeneration of the much loved Trimsaran Miners Welfare Hall in order to return it to its rightful place at the heart of the community.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the application is not supported as does not align with the key criteria of the fund and applicant be signposted to other funding opportunities more suited to the project activity.

TEN TOWNS REVITALISING RURAL HIGH STREET FUND

RECOMMENDATIONS / KEY DECISIONS REQUIRED:

The purpose of this report is to approve the establishment of a new third-party grant scheme as part of the enhanced offer of the Ten Towns programme for the county's rural market towns. The Ten Towns Revitalising Rural Town Centre fund will provide an opportunity for town centre premises located on the rural high street to bid for funding to assist in refreshing and revitalising their premises frontages.

The purpose of the fund is to increase the vibrancy and visual perception of the 10 towns by creating an opportunity for high street premises to improve their overall appearance. The fund will be open to targeted premises within designated areas across the County's rural ten towns.

As part of the Rural anchor, £100k was ringfenced for strategic projects that would align with the needs of the town. The need to increase the appearance and vibrancy of the towns to encourage greater footfall has been identified by the growth plan teams across all towns which has been followed up by engagement with businesses across the Ten Town which saw significant interest in the proposed fund.

This fund will complement projects that will be developed and implemented as part of the Tackling towns programme, which is funded through the Place Anchor of the Shared Prosperity Fund.

The fund will be administered by the Rural programme team within Economic Development.

Fund Criteria

- Premises must be located within an identified 'high street' area of a respective 10 town.
- Applicants must ensure that projects align with the considerations and recommendations noted in Carmarthenshire Shopfront Design Guide 2022.
- Grant support of up to £2000 (at a maximum intervention rate of 80%).
- Statutory consents/landlord consent must be gained before approval of grant.
- Examples of eligible expenditure will include new bilingual signage, canopies, painting of building, lighting and associated costs for the completion of projects.
- All projects must be completed by no later than 30th September 2024.



Application Process

- Successful projects will either individually or collectively have the biggest impact for aesthetic appearance and vibrancy.
- Due to the excepted high volume of applicants, the fund will be published across existing networks but also information will be circulated to eligible high street premise by officers through a town walkaround
- Applications recommended for approval will be considered and authorised by the Head of Regeneration.

In order to demonstrate the impact of this and wider 10 towns programmes, the team will commission content creators to digitally document the appearance of each town before and after the completion of the above outlined intervention.

The fund aligns with the following intervention noted as part of the SPF framework and will achieve the following outputs;

W1: Funding for improvements to town centres and high streets

1. Policy, Crime & Disorder and Equalities

These funds will enable the County Council to deliver the County Council's Economic Recovery Plan and are aligned with each of the rural market town's economic growth plans which have gained support from town stakeholders.

The Programme will support the objectives of the Wellbeing & Future Generations Act by targeting interventions which aim to ensure that the rural market towns of the County remain vibrant and sustainable communities.

2. Legal

Successful applicants will be required to sign up to a Funding agreement which will set out the Terms and Conditions of the grant. The Funding agreements will be based on the standard third party agreement templates that have been developed for the South West region in relation to Shared Prosperity Fund third party applications. The Council's Corporate Services have been involved in this process. Applications recommended for approval by the funding panel will be considered and authorised by the Head of Regeneration.

3. Finance

£100K has been secured via the Rural Anchor as part of the UK Government's Shared Prosperity Fund. Applicants will be required to provide a minimum 20% private sector match funding as part of the application process.

Overall accountability for the fund will sit with the Rural programme team within Economic Development. Officers employed on the programme will ensure grant management processes and procedures are adhered to including the establishment of procedures for processing payments, monitoring of financial spend, audit requirements etc.



5. Risk Management Issues

When dealing with third party grants risk management issues will be dealt with by officers adhering to the grants manual and third party procurement rules.
