The Cabinet Member reviewed the changes made within the company as detailed in the circulated report and considered an application for assistance for £750,000.00 from the Carmarthenshire Transformational Commercial Property Development Fund to United Petfood UK Ltd (previously trading as Cambrian Pet foods Ltd).

Project Description	 The concept for Angor started over 15 years ago when it became apparent that there is a real need for a support service in Carmarthenshire for individuals when have been diagnosed with cancer or a life-altering diagnosis. Angor will offer practical, financial, legal, social, and emotional support to people who have been diagnosed with cancer or a life-limiting illness. Angor will practice in an environment that is welcoming, informal and non-institutional, enabling participants to connect with others to form new support networks. Angor will meer and signpost individuals and discuss the support available, as well as providing educational opportunities which encourage all participants to be proactive in their recovery and their future objectives. Funding is required to recruit a self-employed individual with a proven track record in several key areas i.e., community development, project management community consultation, marketing and fundraising. Angor wishes to employ an individual for 25 hours per week over the next 12 months to support the Trustees in coordinating key elements of the project including: Developing Angor's business model

	Angor believes:
	 The impact of cancer or a life-limiting illness is not just physical, a holistic approach is needed for recovery
	Recovery is assisted by attending to the needs of the whole person,
	mind, body, spirit and emotionsEmotional & practical support should be freely available to people who
	have been diagnosed with cancer or a life-limiting disease
	What is different about Angor? No other organisation in Carmarthenshire currently provides this signposting bespoke user-led holistic wellbeing service where the emphasis is on empowering the user to become proactive in their rehabilitation through education and support. There is a clear gap in provision which they intend to address. They will work with established organisations to signpost and support.
	The need for support for people with cancer or a life limiting illness has never been greater. According to figures published by Macmillan, there are over 160,000 people living with cancer in Wales alone. As treatments have improved, cancer is now often for many a "chronic condition". A Welsh Government survey in 2020 found that 35% of adults stated that they were living with a life-limiting illness.
	Once established, individuals will be able to access their new centre during office hours for advice and a chance to sign-up to a programme of support. Various activities offered will include mindfulness, cancer massage, reflexology, art therapy, relaxation classes, wig and hair advice, these will be developed as the programmes evolve. Other services such as financial, legal and probate advice will also available. These examples are not exhaustive, and wherever possible Angor will aim to respond flexibly to the range of needs, as and when they arise. The plan is that Angor will evolve and adapt to the identified needs of the client.
	Recently released figures from Public Health Wales identify an increasing number of people living with chronic liver, cardiovascular, and neurological diseases, especially in Carmarthenshire. If the number of people diagnosed with a life-limiting illness is added to the cohort of people living with cancer, the need for a service such as Angor is evident.
	The Trustees have engaged with Maggie's in Swansea, they fully recognise the need for Angor's services to the west of their operation. There is no duplication. Patients and their families deserve key support services on their doorstep.

	In March 2022, Angor conducted a survey of stakeholders in Carmarthenshire for their views on support following a cancer or life-limiting illness diagnosis. Surveys were distributed across the county and made available at numerous Doctors Surgeries and Pharmacies.
	Geographical areas included Ammanford, Burry Port, Carmarthen, Crosshands, Garnant, Glanamman, Kidwelly, Laugharne, Llandeilo, Llandovery, Llanelli, Llanybydder, Pontyberem, Newcastle Emlyn, St Clears, Tumble, Trimsaran and Whitland.
	Respondents felt that a service such as Angor was needed. Responses mentioned "a need for support", "holistic therapy", "networking with others", "Guidance". Angor will aim to meet these needs.

Project Description	Tregib Sports Facilities is a community managed, not for profit organisation managing the sports facilities on the Tregib School site Llandeilo Carmarthenshire since 2016. These facilities include an Astro turf, three football pitches, two rugby pitches, a running track, sports hall, gymnasium and changing facilities. The company is managed with the 20 clubs and organisations engaging around 1,000 community volunteers and participants of all ages in a wide range of sport and other physical activities. Recent Pitch Assessments of the Astro turf surface state it is at end of life and
	Recent Pitch Assessments of the Astro turf surface state it is at end of life and needs replacing by Summer 2023, risking the Astro turf being lost to the community. The groups have developed a strategy to work together, with local businesses, sports associations, and Carmarthenshire Council to raise finances to replace the Astro surface with a new Hockey Turf Pitch, with a 15-year life span, suitable for Football, Rugby, and Hockey and to install new energy efficient LED floodlights.
	The Astro Turf creates much of the income for the facility which then subsidises the rest of the facilities. As a result, all the other groups/users have the benefit of sustainable prices and the use of the Sports Hall, Gym, Changing room facilities etc. Thus, their fundraising campaign is entitled 'Save Tregib Sports

	acilities' as without a functioning Astro pitch the community run sports complex s not sustainable.
l l l l l l l l l l l l l l l l l l l	They will use this grant funding together with the other funds to replace the Astro surface, install new energy efficient LED floodlights and will also appoint a specialist Project Management consultant to oversee the project and all quotes have been obtained.
f ii c t r	Since they took over the management of the facilities in 2016, ensuring the facilities are affordable has been one of their main goals, they have not ncreased the prices since they have been running the facility, and after rependent after Covid, they used the Covid Support Funds given to initially open the sessions free of charge, and then reduced their prices by 50% over 6 months and then by 25% to ensure all the users were able to come back and that finance was not a barrier to their sporting activities.
a r c	Having a new Astro Turf will allow them to continue operating in this manner as approximately 50% of the income comes from the Astro Turf bookings. Having new LED floodlights will also help with economic stability as their energy demands will fall by at least 40%, an essential element, faced with increasing energy costs.
i	Without refurbishment the surface will not be safe to use after summer 2023. It s currently used by up to 670 players per week, users are representatives of he local community in terms of age and gender.
e r	The clubs using the Astro offer exercise and social contact to players who risk exclusion and declining wellbeing, including recent refugees, individuals recovering from significant illness, anxiety, and depression, they are also supporting players to stay active in sport into their late 60's.
a	Half of clubs and groups have male and female participants who are regularly active. The Astroturf offers exercise and social connections to individuals who risk exclusion or declining wellbeing:
k r 7 v c f t	There is an Astro Turf pitch at the local secondary school - Ysgol Bro Dinefwr but at present this facility is not available for community hire or use. It is also not a floodlit pitch which would limit its effectiveness. The nearest floodlit Astro Turf pitch is in Ammanford 8 miles away, if their users were to travel there would obviously be travel time and cost for all the participants. Also, there is a capacity issue as the Astro Turf in Ammanford is remarkably busy, with only a few slots available on a Monday and Friday evening. They are planning to undergo their own resurfacing exercise in October 2022, so the new surface is ikely to attract more users who are local to them.
/ f r	However, in a survey conducted in December 2021, 8 of the groups using the Astro reported that their 631 members would not regularly travel to less local facilities if the Tregib Astro were no longer available. The increases in costs of petrol during and the cost-of-living crisis mean that both Llandeilo adult and child players are now less likely to travel to other more distant facilities.
t s	Without a safe and functioning Astro Turf pitch, the community run Tregib Sports Facilities is unsustainable. The Sports Hall, Gymnasium users, running rack users and football and rugby pitch users may be unable to pursue their sporting activities.
	Eight of the groups using the Astro report they would not be able to organise activities for their existing 631 members using alternative facilities.

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	The club would cease to exist, many age groups and players would stop participating' - Llandeilo Junior Football - (170 members)
	It is highly likely that the club would not be able to continue in its current form' - Teigrod Tywi Hockey (170 members)

 What would it mean to you if the Astro Turf were not available for you to use? A lot as it is an exceptionally reliable place and area to play and teach sports. Being a very sporty person, I would think it would have an excessively substantial reduction in my sport participation level. I would be sad because I like playing with my football team I would be sad because I like to go to Tregib after school in school clubs
They also undertook a survey of the groups that use the Astro in Dec/January 2022 and have an online survey that they have promoted online and through their Facebook page
The Crowdfunding campaign was started over the summer holiday and despite most of their users being on holiday, they have already raised over £5,300 through 74 individual supporters even though the focus of their Crowdfunding is to take place during September.
 Comments received Glad to support this project, to ensure this essential facility is sustained and developed to provide sporting and leisure facilities for our community. Incredibly lucky to have this community resource and we want it to continue. Good luck with your efforts, it will be of great benefit for the local community, in a superb setting, Dymuniadau Gorau. A worthy cause, the community needs these facilities.

A cross section of the population and community of the area, from ages 6-76, use it for a variety of sports from junior football, walking rugby, hockey and of course training for senior football and senior rugby.

The lights have become unusable, due to age and a professional electrical company has confirmed replacement parts are no longer available, therefore, the floodlights are no longer fit for purpose.
	They have spent four winters without lights, both senior and junior teams, have been paying to travel and use other facilities, to train, and they are desperate to get the lights updated, so they can continue to use, the facilities, throughout the year.
	This project is to assist with new LED floodlights, to be erected on existing columns, no planning required, which they have secured funds of £26k. The new floodlights would enable them to build on current playing numbers, both at senior and Junior sections, also establishing a Youth side.
	Within the junior section there are teams at, under 9s, 10s, 13s, and 14s, which means they are missing a massive gap of age groups, at 7s, 8s, 11s, 12s, 15s and 16s, this is something that they must build on for the benefits of the Community and the Club.
	They are currently building a new committee, as over the past 12 months, they have had many younger members join, who are working hard to change the way the Amman United Rugby Club, is perceived within the community.

The Centre has an open-door policy and encourages people of all ages and abilities, also attracts visitors/tourists and businesses. This project is a result of review and evaluation of existing services and during our most recent public meeting with members of the community and Cwarter Bach Community Council, members expressed concerns about the air flow in our community Cafe. The main budgetary impact of the pandemic has been a reduction in income, but this is also intertwined with significantly less internal capacity and resources: 'The pandemic has been a disaster for the community centre, due to the loss of volunteers who assist with the day to day running of the organisation. Many of the members are elderly and are still worried about catching COVID. The Cafe is in the middle of the building therefore there is no ventilation. Project Description/ Community Benefit	The wide use of the stage has been the core of Brynamman Public Hall since the 1920s and has provided the community with a central hub of recreational activity for 100 years. The trustees wish to keep the stage up to a fully usable standard for the considerable number of schools, community groups and clubs that benefit from the facility. To do this, an overhaul and upgrade to the stage lighting system needs to take place.
	Adaptations and upgrades need to be put in place to secure the usability and longevity of this vital facility in the future. The Trustees also recognise that putting on live performances at the Hall is not an easy task due to the outdated facilities. Only very few staff members are trained to manipulate and operate the current equipment, and often more modern equipment needs to be sourced from outside, such as paying to hire equipment for a particular performance from an equipment rental company. Keeping the venue in line with expected performance equipment specification will also make the Hall more attractive to outside touring companies. Shows that are brought from outside the community to the Hall offer a chance for the community of Brynamman and the surrounding villages to enjoy entertainment right on their doorstep at a fraction of the cost of travelling to a town or city and visiting a larger venue.
	 The grant funding will be spent in three ways as part of this project: The purchase of new stage lighting equipment to be installed within the Public Hall, including electrical cabling and accessories, internally wired bars for the safe rigging of lights, and a package of modern, energy efficient LED stage lighting fixtures. The professional installation of the above equipment. Existing equipment and infrastructure will need to be removed and/or modified to accommodate the new equipment. Some minor structural work to the stage rigging area and a significant amount of electrical work will be undertaken as part of the project. The provisioning and testing of the new installation and equipment by a professional theatrical equipment installation and testing company.
	The project will see the installation of industry standard equipment and systems, which will enhance the current usability of the stage, but also future proof the venue for many years to come. Creating a solid foundation for a range of stage lighting equipment and adaptation is at the forefront of the planning process. The project will create a far more sustainable approach to live events at the

	 hall, and the application has demonstrated great awareness of this by looking to source the installation of a system built entirely around the use of LED fixtures, disregarding the need of older and outdated technologies that are not as flexible or energy efficient. Evidence of Need / Community Engagement	 Brynamman Public Cinema is the only venue of its kind in the area. Venues that survived demolition slightly further afield such as Pontardawe Arts Centre and Ammanford Miners Theatre are both examples of venues that were closed for an exceptionally lengthy period, and reopened years later after full refurbishment. Brynamman never once closed, and still to this day is completely independent and run by the committee of trustees who are descendants of the many ex miners and people of the community that helped to run the hall for the last century. For the Public Hall to be able to offer the stage as a facility, upgrades to this system need to be put in place. Environmental Sustainability	This project will ensure the operation of stage facilities in an environmentally friendly way, by choosing to convert to an LED based system, as opposed to the more traditional theatrical incandescent fixtures, a significant amount of electricity is saved. Fewer fixtures are also needed to create a similar effect, as LED fixtures can contain hundreds of colours, versus traditional lanterns which tend to have one or very few colours. The total power draw saving of the lighting system on a typical live show will be up to 75%.
	The project will also have a huge focus on recycling. Most materials removed will be recycled or reused. A lot of the cabling removed will be kept as stock to make trailing cable for other projects. The lanterns removed will also not be thrown away. There is a market for lots of the retro lighting fixtures that are currently installed, and whilst they are no longer suitable for mainstream use, there are retro themed clubs and venues or even antiques collectors who would be interested in obtaining the equipment to upcycle. It will not go to waste.
	The old lighting bars and steel rope, brackets and accessories will be given away locally. There will be next to zero waste from the old equipment being removed.

Roles and responsibilities within organisation	All team members at the Public Hall are playing a key role in the project. When the project was first envisioned back in 2019, a meeting was held to discuss in depth the requirements for the new installation. One thing that shone out was the new system needs to be easier to use and maintain. The Public Hall sees a fast turnaround in volunteers through the volunteering program. With an 'all first-hand deck' approach for everyone who joins, the systems in place need to be easy to manage, safe, and quick to learn. It is evident that when this project is a success, the simpler usability of the system alone will be of huge benefit to everyone involved. Tom Smith will be overseeing the project as project manager. With a background in technical theatre and 12 years at the Public Hall, who understands the complexities involved with a project of this scale for live performance.
Mapping of service/ facility within the area	Brynamman Public Cinema is the only venue of its kind in the area. The Hall has strong relationships with numerous members of the community who rely on the facilities available at the venue. Examples of current groups are Cylch Meithrin, Brynamman Primary School, Ammanford Community Theatre, Amman Valley School of Dance, and the halls Volunteering Programme.
Future Sustainability	This project will create a far more sustainable approach to live events at the hall. With the current outdated facilities, it has already been proving difficult for several years to successfully operate and use the existing equipment. There is no option to further carry the use of this equipment into the future. By installing a new system, with specific focus on future proofing electrical and physical infrastructure, the stage will be equipped to serve the needs of crew and performers for years to come. The evolution in theatre technology was rapid during the 20th century, and it continued to rapidly evolve well into the 2000s with the improving energy efficient LED technology. This project will see the installation of a system built entirely around the use of LED fixtures, disregarding the need of older and outdated technologies that are not as flexible or energy efficient. Full LED installations are at the forefront, and by installing a system of this type, there is a guarantee that the infrastructure and equipment will remain relevant and practical throughout its usable lifespan. It will be the backbone of the live performance facilities at the Public Hall for years to come. The equipment and infrastructure that is being installed will require general maintenance on a regular basis going forward. Most of this maintenance can be done by in house team members who are technically trained. This will include standard practices such as visual inspections and PAT testing, but also regular cleaning and maintenance of the lighting instruments. The motors and winches for lowering and raising the on-stage lighting bars will be inspected annually by a qualified company.

This will provide a catalyst for the development of the local creative, educational, environmental, cultural and arts economies.
