1. Introduction

The scrutiny function is a key element of the County Council's governance arrangements and decision-making process. Although not a decision-making body, Scrutiny is at its most effective when it grasps the potential to influence and inform decisions made by both the Council and partner bodies affecting the County.

Article 6.2 of the Council's Constitution requires all scrutiny committees to "prepare an annual report giving an account of the Committees activities over the previous year."

This report provides an overview of the work of the Environmental and Public Protection Scrutiny Committee during the reduced six-month committee cycle for 2020/21 municipal year. It aims to highlight the work of the Committee and reflect on the achievements identifying what worked well and where improvements could be made. This analysis is instrumental in developing scrutiny. In addition, this report may aid to facilitate discussions on items which could be identified for inclusion within future work programmes.

The Committee is chaired by the Councillor John James and is made up of 14 Elected Members. Support is provided to the Committee by the Democratic Services Team and other Council officers as and when required.

The Committee helps deliver a number of key outcome measures within the Council's Corporate Strategy 2018-23:

• Wellbeing objective 8 -

Live Well-Help people live healthy lives

Wellbeing objective 9 –

Live Well/Age Well – Support good connections with friends, family and safer communities

Wellbeing objective 12 –

Healthy and Safety Environment – Look after the environment now and in the future

Wellbeing objective 13 –

Healthy and Safe Environment – Improve the highway and transport infrastructure and connectivity

Some of the measures and actions within Wellbeing objective 12 overlap with Community Scrutiny, however the necessary information was also be provided to this Committee.

2. Overview of the work of the Committee in 2021/22

2.1 Management of Meetings

The Scrutiny Committee held 6 meetings during the 2021/22 municipal year.

All meetings proceeded in line with the Forward Work Programme as planned except for the first meeting of 2021, May which with the consent of the Chair was cancelled due a delay in the reports being presented and the last meeting in April due to it falling within the pre-election period.

In accordance with the provisions for section 47 of the Local Government and Elections (Wales) Act 2021 all meetings were held by virtually means via the platform Zoom. All members, by embracing the new way of working, continued to carry out their scrutiny role with confidence and professionalism.

2.2 The Role of the Cabinet Member

The Council, at its meeting held on the 22nd October, 2020 agreed a number of changes to its Scrutiny Procedure Rules and remits. The principal change was that the Cabinet Members would be expected to attend, present the reports placed on the Forward Work Programme by the Committee and answer questions raised by Scrutiny Members thus holding the Cabinet to account. Relevant Officers were called upon in order to provide additional information on operational issues.

Note: As of 16th August 2021 the Executive Board and Executive Board members was renamed Cabinet and Cabinet Members respectively. This report reflects the name known at the date of the meeting.

Environment –

The Committee has responsibility for monitoring the work of the Environment Department which includes the work of the Waste and Environmental, Highways and Transport, Property Services and Policy & Performance divisions.

One of the key roles of the Environmental & Public Protection Scrutiny Committee is its capacity as the Council's Crime & Disorder Scrutiny Committee. The Environmental & Public Protection Scrutiny Committee has specific additional Terms of Reference whereby it has exercise of powers relating to crime and disorder (6.4 within the Constitution).

In addition, the Cabinet Member for Resources attended meetings to present finance related reports including the budget monitoring reports and the Cabinet Member for Social Care and Health attended to present the relevant actions within the Corporate Performance Monitoring reports associated to substance misuse.

2.3 The Forward Work Programme

The Environmental and Public Protection Scrutiny Committee develops its Forward Work Programme with matters that fall within remit which covers:-

Waste and Environmental Services including:-

- > Refuse Collection,
- Street Cleaning,
- Grounds Maintenance,
- Building Cleaning (including Schools, where relevant),
- Public Toilets

Transport and Streetscene including:-

- Highways, Street Lighting,
- Bridges,
- Traffic Management,
- Parking Services,
- Cycle paths and Rights of Way;

Environmental Enforcement including:-

- Litter, Dog Fouling;
- Abandoned Vehicles etc:
- Planning Enforcement;
- Trading Standards;

· Community Safety issues including:-

Crime and Disorder Referrals (to include a power to make a report or recommendations to the County Council and/or the Council's Cabinet);

Environmental and Public Health Pest Control:-

- Social Inclusion:
- > the Community;
- Biodiversity;
- Zero Carbon.

In April 2021, the Committee at its annual Forward Work Programme development session developed its own Forward Work Programme (FWP) by identifying and prioritising agenda items for consideration during the next municipal year.

In addition to the standard items such as performance and budget monitoring reports as well as action plans and monitoring reports the Committee identified pre-decision reports from the Cabinet's Forward Work Programme 2021/22.

Whilst the Committee has the option to co-opt non-voting employees, officers or members of Responsible Authorities or co-operating persons or bodies in respect of its crime and disorder functions, [subject to the provisions of the Crime and Disorder (Overview and Scrutiny) Regulations 2009] did not do so during the 2021/22 municipal year.

2.4 The Gateway Framework and reports circulated under a separate cover

The Committee at its Forward Work Programme development session on 9th April 2021, utilised the Gateway Framework method in order to manage the number of reports being presented at each meeting. Considering the number of reports for consideration enables the Committee to undertake a quality scrutiny process.

The Committee, following the identification of the reports for the Forward Work Programme, further shaped their programme by taking each subject/report through the Gateway Framework.

In line with the Framework Members agreed to the following reports being circulated to members by e-mail. Members scrutinised the reports as they would in a formal meeting and forward any queries and/or concerns to the Scrutiny Support officer to arrange a response. Any queries raised together with responses were included within the Forthcoming Items report.

- Budget Monitoring reports
- Public Rights of Way Network Hierarchy

The Committee regularly reviews its Forward Work Programme and as a flexible working document on occasion reports were moved to manage the Scrutiny process accordingly.

2.5 Performance Monitoring

Departmental Business Plans (within the remit of this Scrutiny Committee) -

The following Departmental Business plans were presented by the respective Executive Board Members to Committee Members in April 2021:-

- Environment Departmental Business Plan 2021/22
- Chief Executives Departmental Business Plan 2021/22
- Department for Communities Departmental Business Plan 2021/22

During the consideration, Members raised several comments and concerns regarding the actions and associated measures presented in the departmental plans and after discussion, the Committee unanimously resolved that further information be included in the actions and measures and that the Departmental Business Plans 2021/22 be submitted to the next meeting for consideration [May 2021].

However, in order to enable Officers additional time necessary to act on the comments raised by Scrutiny Members, following consultation with the Chair, it was agreed to present the reports to the meeting in July and subsequently in respect of the light agenda the meeting in May was cancelled.

At its meeting in July 2021, the Committee was presented with the revised Departmental Business Plans which had been updated to include additional information to provide a summary of the key actions and measures required to support the delivery of the Corporate Strategy as well as an additional column to reference the measures/outcome to the relevant Council Well-being Objective.

Whilst Members had observed that the departmental business plans across the different sectors differed in their approach and in understanding that the detailed information were provided in Divisional Plans, Members expressed gratitude to officers for acting on the requests of the Committee providing more informative plans.

The Chair and Vice Chair continued to work with Officers to further improve the Departmental Business Plans in readiness for 2022/23.

In March 2022, the Committee received the Environment and Chief Executives Departmental Business Plans 2022/23 for consideration.

The Environment Departmental Business Plan had adopted a new-style which was applauded by Committee Members. The revamped version included more information, more readable, easier to understand, provided the direction of travel and what success would look like. Praise was expressed in the development of the new-style business plan. Appreciation was extended to the officers involved in the development of the plan. Members suggested that this version be consistent across other departmental business plans.

In March, a non-submission report was received in relation to the Communities Departmental Business Plan 2022/23 deferring the plan to July 2022 to enable the new Sustainability and Place Division to be established. This would be placed onto the 2022/23

Carmarthenshire Council Annual Report 2020/21 – In July 2021 the Committee was provided with a report which contained the Council's 15 Well Being Objectives and assessed the progress and adaptations made during 2020/21. However, Scrutiny Members focussed on the sections which were relevant to the Committee's remit. Members raised questions/concerns on pertinent matters including

- Active Travel and the funding for Safer Routes in the Community.
- > The proposed targets for the energy consumption towards Net Zero
- Implication of the reduced usage of public transport

The relevant Executive Board members supported by Officers provided Scrutiny Members with detailed explanations.

Outcome:

The Committee, feeling strongly about Safer Routes in the Community, resolved to write to the Welsh Government to express their support of the Safe Routes in the Community funding and seek the Deputy Minister's support in providing additional funding to help with the future development of safer routes to schools across all areas of the County. Letter was sent from the Chair on behalf of the Committee to Mr Lee Waters MS, 3rd September 2021.

A response from Mr Waters MS was circulated to Members by e-mail an extract of which is provided below:-

"We were pleased to be able to increase the funding in 2021/22 and allocate £6.5m to Safe Routes in Communities schemes this year. My officials are currently refining the application and guidance to enable local authorities to bid for funding for 2022/23. I am encouraged that you have received a positive response to the call for schemes for the next financial year."

2020/21 Performance Reports relevant to this Scrutiny - One of the principal roles of a scrutiny committee is to monitor the performance of services and functions within its remit. In October 2021, the Committee considered the performance report detailing the progress as at the end of *Quarter 1* of the deliverables linked to the Corporate Strategy and the 13 Well-being objectives. Quarter 2 report was considered at the meeting in December 2021.

Scrutiny Committee Actions Update – Throughout the municipal year, the Committees requests and referrals are logged and the action updates are then presented to Committee for information.

2.6 Revenue and Capital Budgets

Budget Monitoring Reports – were circulated to Environmental and Public Protection Scrutiny Committee members by e-mail in line with the Committee's 2021 decision to scrutinise outside of the Committees formal process.

The Committee, received quarterly reports on the departmental and corporate revenue and capital budgets in

- May 2021 in respect of the budgetary position as at 28th February 2021
- October 2021 in respect of the budgetary position as at 30th June 2021 and
- November 2021 in respect of the budgetary position as at 31st August 2021.

The reports enabled members to monitor the level of spend in each area and the progress made in connection with any capital works.

The budget monitoring report in respect of the budgetary position as at 31st October 2021 was included onto the agenda to be considered in February 2022.

Consultation - Revenue Budget Strategy 2022/23 to 2024/25 - In February 2022, the Committee as a statutory consultee received the Revenue Budget Strategy 2022/23 to 2024/25 for consideration and comment. The report provided the Committee with the current proposals for the Revenue Budget for 2021/22 together with the indicative figures for the 2022/23 to 2024/25 financial years.

The Committee raised a number of queries and concerns in regard to the proposed budgets including the

- > car parking charges and the proposal to introduce charges to additional car parks
- > Future Sponsorship in regard to Road Safety Innovation
- Lack of Maintenance and Aesthetic car of the infrastructure within Ammanford
- Financial position of Highways
- School Crossing Patrols
- Fixed Penalty Notices and charges

Outcome:

The comments, concerns and recommendations raised by the Committee helped to shape the Revenue budget strategy for 2022/23 – 2024/25 which was considered at full Council on 2nd March 2022.

2.7 Pre-Decision Scrutiny Reports

2.7.1 Emergency Flood Response – Storm Event Arrangements – October 2021

The Committee received the report prior to Cabinet consideration which provided detailed information on how the Council currently dealt with and responded to storm events that cause widespread flooding and included the actions that could be expected of the Council.

- Clarification was sought on the level of responsibility that Welsh Government and Natural Resource Wales (NRW) had on the river which caused the significant flooding in Pensarn, Carmarthen.
- what work was being undertaken to encourage communities and in particular vulnerable communities to have an emergency plan and trained emergency wardens?
- Ahead of the COP 26 Conference in Glasgow held in November 2021. A proposal was made that the Committee write to the First Minister and the Minister for Climate Change as the Welsh Government representatives attending the COP 26 Conference, requesting that they pursue to mitigate climate change.
- > Plans to improve flood defences
- Vulnerable coastal areas

Outcome:

Unanimously resolved that the Environmental and Public Protection Scrutiny Committee write to the First Minister and the Minister for Climate Change requesting that in support of Carmarthenshire County Council's ambition to cut carbon emissions by 2030 they pursue to mitigate climate change at the COP 26 conference in November 2021.

Letter was sent from the Chair on behalf of the Committee on 26th October 2021.

2.7.2 Future Waste Strategy – October 2021

The Committee received this report which provided information on the proposed future strategy, actions and considerations for the Waste Service, in order to achieve 70% recycling by 2024/25 and provide a base for improvements to achieve zero waste by 2050.

Responses to comments raised on the following main points were provided by the Cabinet member supported by Officers:-

- ➤ Comparison Performance other local Authorities in Wales
- Material to raise awareness and promote recycling
- > The future of glass recycling sites
- ➤ Concerns of the environmental impact of the proposed collection of 3 black bags every three weeks including nappies (Absorbent Hygiene Products).

Outcome:

The Committee unanimously resolved to recommend that the Cabinet that the recommendations set out in the report be approved.

2.7.3 Highways Asset Management Plan (HAMP) Maintenance Manual – November 2021.

The Committee was presented with a report requesting Members to consider and comment on parts 4.1 to 4.4 of the HAMP Maintenance Manual prior to adoption by the Cabinet. The main concern raised was in relation to the low priority of rural roads status and that rural roads were inspected only once a year. The Cabinet Member supported by Officers responded to the concerns and provided and thorough explanation of the prioritised system of assessment, inspection and repair.

Outcome:

Unanimously resolved to recommend to Cabinet that Parts 4.1 to 4.4 of the Highways Asset Management Plan Maintenance Manual be adopted.

2.7.4 Carmarthenshire County Council (CCC) Electric Vehicle Charging Infrastructure Strategy - Decarbonising Transport – November 2021

The Committee, ahead of Cabinet consideration, received a report which set out a proposal to adopt an Electric Vehicle Charging Infrastructure Strategy for Carmarthenshire. Following consideration of the 13 key policies the following main points were raised:-

- ➤ Electric Bikes if they could be added to the 13 key policies
- > Future plans for Charging facilities to be placed in rural areas
- > Funding applications and who bears the costs of the charging facilities
- Suitability of charging facilities for disabled users
- The consideration of the availability of wider facilities in relation to the charging facility
- > The provision of charging points through the planning process
- ➤ Queries raised in relation to the number of charging facilities being available for use by 2030.

The Cabinet Member supported by Officers provided comprehensive responses.

Outcome:

The Committee unanimously resolved to recommend to Cabinet that the proposed Electric Vehicle Charging Infrastructure Strategy for the Council be adopted.

2.7.5 Draft Planning Enforcement Statement – December 2021

The Committee considered a draft Planning Enforcement Statement which had been developed in response to the significant backlog of unresolved complaints within Carmarthenshire's Planning Enforcement service. Following consideration, Officers responded to matters raised in relation to enforcement staffing levels and unsolicited siting of caravans in woodland

Outcome:

The Committee unanimously resolved to recommend to Cabinet that the Draft Planning Enforcement Statement be endorsed.

2.7.5 Local Toilet Strategy Interim Progress Report – December 2021

The Committee considered this Strategy which included 10 key recommedations to enhance Carmarthenshire's long term toilet provision. Members in their scrutiny function raised the following main comments:

- Future changes to charges to access toilets
- Contract cleaning

Members commented that there had been a noticeable improvement on the cleanliness of the toilets within town centres and commended the Officers on a well written report.

Outcome:

The Committee unanimously resolved to recommend to Cabinet that the Local Toilets Strategy Interim Progress Report be endorsed.

2.7.6 Local Environment Quality Management Plan 2022-2026 – February 2022

The Committee considered the Local Environment Quality Management Plan which provided information on the direction of the Council's litter management within the County for the next four years and aimed to demonstrate how litter management would be undertaken.

- ➤ Enforcement staffing levels
- Publicity of information to encourage and aid Members of the public and Town/Community Council to engage in setting up groups to clean villages and rural areas
- > The provision to support adhoc letter picking
- Matters relating to dog fouling

The Cabinet Member supported by Officers provided comprehensive responses and clarified matters that were of concern with future plans to improve.

Outcome:

The Committee unanimously resolved to recommend to Cabinet that the Local Environment Quality Management Plan 2022-2026 be approved.

2.7.8 Extension of Public Space Protection Order (Carmarthenshire Dog Orders) – March 2022

This report was received by the Committee in respect of extending the current Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) which was due to expire at the end of June for a further 3 years. Members in feeling strongly about matters relating to dog fouling and irresponsible dog owners were keen to extend the current PSPO for a further 3 years.

Outcome:

The Committee unanimously resolved to recommend to Cabinet that the duration of the Carmarthenshire County Council (Dog Control) Public Spaces Protection Order 2016 be extended for a further period of 3 years with effect from the 1st July 2022 and that the Council makes an Extension Order to give effect to the above extension and endorses the 2016 Order with suitable wording to reflect the fact that the duration of the 2016 order has been extended.

2.8 Additional Reports and Update Reports

2.8.1 Air Quality Delivery Plan Consultation Draft – July 2021

The Committee received a report on the Air Quality Delivery Plan – Consultation which provided an update on the work undertaken in respect of Air Quality in Carmarthenshire, and to consult on the draft Air Quality Delivery plan. The Committee raised a number of issues in relation to the plan which was captured and included as part of the consultation, the main points were as follows:-

- ➤ Air quality around the school areas introduce a school street
- Progress of the Tywi Valley Cycle Path
- > Timeline to resolve legal issues in respect of locked shared footpaths
- ➤ Low Emission Zones what this looked like
- Clarification was sought on the installation of AQMA signage

2.8.2 Highways Asset Management Plan Annual Statement update – November 2021

The Cabinet Member for Environment presented the Highway Asset Management Plan (HAMP) Annual Statement Report 2021 to the Committee at its meeting in November 2021. The Committee considered information on the highway network and provided detail on the following three key

- Highways (carriageways, footways and cycleways)
- Bridges and Structures

highway asset areas:

Highway Lighting and Traffic Signals

The Committee considered the information contained on each of the above asset categories which provided the conditions and reported how the conditions had changed since the last report together with future changes based on funding scenarios.

The Cabinet Member supported by officers responded to a number of queries raised including the following:


- The low expenditure in comparison to other Councils; Concerns in relation to the failures of the new method of re-surfacing on some roads and the length of time taken to repair;
- ➤ The concerning data collected from drainage surveys and the impact that blocked pipes could cause impairment of road surfaces;
- A request in relation to the progress of Cardi Bach footpath;
- > Road impairments arising as a result of repair works by utility companies;
- Investment options and the continuation of Welsh Government Funding.

Outcome:

The Committee resolved to note the Highway Asset Management Plan – Annual Statement Report 2021.

2.8.3 Future Accessibility Options at Household Waste Recycling Centres (HWRC)

The Committee considered a report which provided an update position and future option for the Household Waste Recycling Centres (HWRC) and provided information in regard to a future strategy of accessibility for the HWRC service in Carmarthenshire. Members after consideration received the report for information.



2.9 Referrals

The Committee had received one referral during the 2021/22 Municipal Year. The referral was received by Community and Regeneration Scrutiny Committee which at its meeting held on 1st July 2021 had raised concern regarding the lack of provision of pavements in rural areas to facilitate increased levels of walking and cycling and the backlog of requests.

Committee members in accepting the referral as it resided within the remit of Environmental and Public protection Scrutiny requested a report providing more information.

The Committee recieved a report in March, 2022 which stated that there had been a longstanding pressure on the Council from the large number of requests received for highway improvements such as upgraded junctions, traffic calming, new sections of road and new footways. Members were informed that the requests being received far exceeded the available resources through the Council's annual capital budget allocated for Highway Infrastructure and Road Safety Improvements.

Members of the Committee in receiving the report acknowledged the limited resources available and emphasised that the current provision of pavement in rural areas continued to be a huge concern.

2.10 Public Engagement and Scrutiny Topic Suggestions

Listening to and giving the public a voice is key to scrutiny's effectiveness. It was important to the Committee to grant the people of Carmarthenshire (and beyond) an opportunity to shape the Forward Work Programme. The Communications department provided active involvement through social media throughout the municipal year picking up on various topics on the Scrutiny's Forward Work Programme.

In addition, complying with Legislation regarding promoting public awareness at Scrutiny, in April 2018, the Chairs and Vice Chairs of Scrutiny Forum agreed to send correspondence to Town and Community Councils which would contain information to encourage an increase in public attendance at Scrutiny Committees and also seek suggestions for future topics for consideration. In response to this the Environmental and Public Protection received requests direct from two Town and Community Council which was considered as part of the Scrutiny's Forward Work Programme development session in April 2021. One of the request went on to become a Task and Finish review – see section 3.1 for more information.

3. Scrutiny Committee Activity

3.1 Scrutiny Investigations (Task and Finish)

The Committee at its Forward Work Programme Development Session held on 9th April 2021, considered a topic suggestion received from Llandyfaelog Community Council suggesting that the Committee consider the issues in relation to fly-tipping in Carmarthenshire. Committee Members in recognising that fly tipping was an increasing problem in Carmarthenshire and that the consequence of fly-tipping had a detrimental effect on the environment and communities suggested to consider this matter be a review for the Task and Finish Group.

The Committee, in ratifying its Forward Work Programme on 2nd July 2021 unanimously resolved that its Task and Finish arrangements for 2021-22-23 would be as follows:

- 1) *Review on the Fly tipping within Carmarthenshire
- 2) Review on Dog Breeding in Carmarthenshire.

*The Committee in making the above decision superseded the Committee's previous decision made at its meeting held on 15th November 2019 – "unanimously resolved that dog breeding in Carmarthenshire be the subject for Committee's next Task and Finish review in 2021".

The Committee, having agreed to undertake a Task and Finish on the issues of fly-tipping, received the Task and Finish Draft Planning and Scoping Document on the Management of Fly-tipping within Carmarthenshire and agreed the politically balanced Membership of the Task and Finish group. The Task and Finish Group commenced the review in September 2021.

However, the Task and Finish Group at its first meeting on 8th September, 2021 received an unexpected update from the Director of Environment on internal matters that had arisen since the Scrutiny Committee agreement on its Task and Finish arrangements and the endorsement of the review planning and scoping document in July. Considering the information received, the Group unanimously agreed to defer the review on Flytipping to 2022 following the Election process.

At its meeting in November, the Committee received an update report from the Task and Finish Group which outlined the Groups decision and reasons

Outcome:

The Committee unanimously resolved that the Group's decision to defer the review of the Management of Fly-tipping within Carmarthenshire until after the 2022 elections be accepted.

3.2 Member Development and Site Visits

The following all-member development sessions /seminars were held during 2021/22, to which Committee members were invited:-

- Microsoft Teams Training for online meetings numerous sessions in June 2020
- Historic Buildings and Carmarthenshire's Net Zero Carbon Commitment (May 2021)
- The Circular Economy and Resource Efficiency (June 2021)
- Hywel Dda University Health Board Covid Briefing (September 2021)
- Planning Services Seminar (September 2021)
- Welsh in Education Strategic Plan Workshop (October 2021)
- Planning Service Phosphates Briefing (November 2021)
- Digital Connectivity Event (January 2022)

In addition to the above, several budget seminars were held during January as part of the Council's consultation process on the 2021/22 Revenue Budget and the five-year capital programme.

Due to the restrictions associated with the Pandemic the Committee was unable to carry out site visits during 2021/22.

4. Challenges

As with the previous year due to Covid, the past year has been a challenging period for both the Authority and the Committee but has continued to undertake a constructive role in scrutinising performance and contributing to policies and decisions. The Committee recognise that departments have been subjected to significant pressure during the Coronavirus pandemic, but everyone involved performed over and above expectations to ensure the continuation of business as usual.

Committee members continued to embrace the virtual way of undertaking their role of Scrutiny and have operated professionally in the webcast environment to provide a way of open and transparent scrutiny. Whilst virtual platforms have enabled scrutiny to continue Members are hoping return to physical meetings in the near future.

In respect the Task and Finish review on Fly-tipping, whilst Members were disappointed to have to defer a matter of significant importance to communities, it was recognised that a short deferment would enable a successful review.

5. Committee's Future Work

There is no doubt that the Committee has continued to make progress during what has been another challenging year for all involved. It is hoped that following the Elections in May 2022, the new cohort of Committee Members would continue to concentrate on topics where Member's input would result in positive outcomes to drive forward service improvement.

The future work of the Committee will be considered regularly as part of the Forward Work Programme and will continue to be monitored during the course of the year.

As part of the development of the forward work programme, the Gateway Framework will aid Committee members to develop a Forward Work Programme to enable focused Scrutiny to take place ensuring that there is a more equitable distribution of reports, that statutory responsibilities are focussed and are properly aligned with the council's strategic priorities.

The Committee will continue to seek topics for discussion from Town and Community Councils annually more information on how to submit a topic for consideration and ask questions at a Scrutiny meeting is available on our Scrutiny webpage:

TASK & FINISH REVIEW:

The Committee at its FWP Development Session held on 9th April 2021, considered a topic suggestion received from Llandyfaelog Community Council suggesting that the Committee consider the issues in relation to fly-tipping in Carmarthenshire. Committee Members recognised that fly tipping was an increasing problem in Carmarthenshire and that the consequence of fly-tipping had a detrimental effect on the environment and communities.

The Committee at its meeting on 2nd July 2021 unanimously resolved that its Task and Finish arrangements for 2021-22-23 would be as follows:

- 1) *Review on the Fly tipping within Carmarthenshire
- 2) Review on Dog Breeding in Carmarthenshire.

Update: The Task and Finish Group at its first meeting on 8th September, 2021 received an update from the Director of Environment on internal matters that had arisen since the Scrutiny Committee agreement on its Task and Finish arrangements and the endorsement of the review planning and scoping document in July. Considering the information received, the Group unanimously agreed to defer the review on Flytipping to 2022 following the Election process. The Committee at its meeting on 25th November 2021 received and noted a report from the Task and Finish Coup which outlined the reasons for the deferral.

*This decision supersedes the Committee's decision made at its meeting held on 15th November 2019 – "unanimously resolved that dog breeding in Carmarthenshire be the subject for Committee's next Task and Finish review in 2021".

The Council's first Environment Act Forward Plan was published in March 2017, and delivery of it was reported to Welsh Government in December 2019. The following report refers to the Council's second three-year plan which runs from Jan 2020 to Dec 2022. The actions it contains are monitored in June and December each year via the Council's Performance Improvement Management System.

2. Legal

The delivery of the Environment Act Forward Plan 2020 – 2023 is consistent with the Section 6 Biodiversity Duty placed on all public bodies in Wales under the Environment Act (Wales) 2016. Delivery of the actions set out in the Report evidences the Council's commitment to fulfilling this duty and its compliance with this Act. It is also consistent with its responsibilities under the Well-Being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015 and in particular the Resilient Wales goal.

3.Finance

While the action plan identifies actions that will result in costs, these costs will be met by the budgets linked to these projects e.g., in Section 5 of the report all the site management works proposed are covered by existing budgets and grant aid. In both Section 6 Caeau Mynydd Mawr project and Section 7 Delivering Biodiversity on Development sites, all the actions proposed will be delivered via S106 agreements funded by developers.

NET ZERO CARBON PLAN PROGRESS REPORT

Overview

- 1. The County Council approved a Net Zero Carbon (NZC) Plan on 12th February 2020.
- 2. Action NZC-28 of this NZC Plan requires performance reports on progress towards becoming a net zero carbon local authority by 2030 to be published annually.
- 3. The first Progress Report (March 2021) reflected on our 2019/20 carbon emissions.
- 4. This second Progress Report reflects on our 2020/21 carbon emissions.
- 5. In 2020/21, our overall carbon footprint reduced by 14.1% compared to 2019/20, with all four areas showing a reduction in both consumption and carbon emissions i.e., Non-Domestic Buildings; Street Lighting; Fleet Mileage; and Business Mileage.
- 6. Whilst these reductions are in part attributable to the impact of COVID-19, the continuation of staff home working, together with changes in working practices such as an increased use of video conference facilities and online communication, should see a lasting reduction in carbon emissions in the longer term.
- 7. This Progress Report is a comparatively focused document as we will be publishing a revised NZC Plan by 31st March 2023 to incorporate recent NZC-related developments and guidance, plus the Nature Emergency declared by the County Council on 9th February 2022.
- 8. Some of our wider actions that contribute towards addressing the climate emergency are currently being collated in advance of the Cabinet meeting.

Net Zero Carbon Plan Progress Report



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1. Context

Recent reports by the <u>Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change</u> have painted a bleak picture of the present, with potentially devastating effects in the future - <u>'now or never' if world is to stave off climate disaster</u> (April 2022).

2. Introduction

The County Council approved a Net Zero Carbon (NZC) Plan on 12th February 2020.

Action NZC-28 of this Plan requires performance reports on progress towards becoming a net zero carbon local authority by 2030 to be published annually.

The first Progress Report (March 2021) reflected on our 2019/20 carbon emissions.

This second Progress Report reflects on our 2020/21 carbon emissions and should be read in conjunction with the earlier NZC documents.

Much has happened in the last twelve months in relation to climate change, notably the <u>UN</u> <u>Climate Change Conference (COP26)</u> in Glasgow (November 2021), plus the publication of numerous guidance documents, including:

- Welsh Public Sector Net Zero Carbon Reporting Guide (May 2021)
- Net zero carbon status by 2030: A route map for decarbonisation across the Welsh public sector (July 2021)
- Welsh Local Government Decarbonisation Planning: Review (September 2021)
- Net Zero Wales Carbon Budget 2 (2021-25) (October 2021)

Audit Wales also published <u>Public Sector Readiness for Net Zero Carbon by 2030</u> (July 2022) based on a baseline review completed by all public bodies pre-Christmas 2021.



COVID-19 has continued to present many challenges since March 2020, which have been further exasperated by Brexit, escalating energy costs, and war in the Ukraine. Notwithstanding this, considerable progress has been made on delivering the actions in our NZC Plan.

Our NZC Plan mirrors the <u>Notice of Motion</u> unanimously agreed by County Council on 20th February 2019 to declare a Climate Emergency and to become a NZC local authority by 2030.

The Plan is a living document, and whilst we have consciously adopted a pragmatic approach that focuses on measurable, operational issues within our control, it also recognises some of the wider actions that are taking place across the Council that contribute towards addressing the climate emergency.


This second NZC Plan Progress Report is a comparatively focused document as we will be publishing a revised NZC Plan by 31st March 2023. This will incorporate recent NZC-related developments and guidance, plus the <u>Nature Emergency</u> declared by County Council on 9th February 2022 (Agenda Item 10.2).



In 2020/21, our overall carbon footprint reduced by 14.1% compared to 2019/20, with all four areas showing a reduction in both consumption and carbon emissions i.e., Non-Domestic Buildings; Street Lighting; Fleet Mileage; and Business Mileage.

Whilst these reductions are in part attributable to the impact of COVID-19, the continuation of staff home working, together with changes in working practices such as an increased use of video conference facilities and online communication, should see a lasting reduction in carbon emissions in the longer term.

The Welsh Public Sector Net Zero Carbon Reporting Guide (May 2021) introduced a voluntary annual reporting process. This aims to provide a consistent reporting framework across the Welsh public sector to help monitor progress

towards achieving Welsh Government's ambition for a carbon neutral public sector by 2030.

Our NZC Plan (February 2020) predates this Reporting Guide; consequently, there are differences in the reporting methodologies.

Total carbon emissions reported under our NZC Plan effectively equate to the Reporting Guide's 'Operational' emissions which additionally include:

- Landfill of municipal waste;
- Well-to-Tank emissions; and,
- Water supply & treatment

Note: A Well-to-Tank emissions factor, also known as upstream or indirect emissions, is an average of all the GHG [Greenhouse Gas] emissions released into the atmosphere from the production, processing and delivery of a fuel or energy vector.

Operational emissions reporting is established, generally well understood, and measurable; whilst the reporting of Supply Chain emissions is a comparatively new, blunt instrument that is based on £ spend plus assumptions rather than accurate data. Welsh Government recognise that Supply Chain reporting is an iterative process that is currently in its relative infancy, with current reporting aimed at identifying and quantifying major spend categories so that more work can be focussed on these areas in future.


Whilst public bodies are requested to submit annual carbon reports in a prescribed format to ensure consistency, the methodology adopted by an organisation for developing and tracking its own NZC Plan is for each individual organisation to determine.

This NZC Plan Progress Report reflects on our 2020/21 carbon emissions based on the same methodologies that we have been applied in previous years to provide consistency and continuity. In future, we will:

- Report annual emissions to Welsh Government in accordance with the Reporting Guide
- Continue with the existing scope of our NZC commitment but adopt the corresponding methodologies prescribed in the Reporting Guide.

Welsh Government published a revised <u>public sector net zero reporting guide</u> on 21st June 2022; consequently, the figures quoted above will change as reporting methodologies are refined.

Progress

Whilst COVID-19 delayed on-site commencement of our Phase 1 programme, works were able to commence in September 2020 with most of the work completed by 31st March 2021. The solar PV system at our Parc Dewi Sant offices was outstanding due to additional bat surveys being required to secure planning permission. Planning permission was unanimously granted in January 2022 and the works have now been completed.

Phase 1 is projected to save £315,726 and 675 tonnes of carbon equivalent (tCO_2e) each year – these savings being guaranteed by Ameresco, our Re:Fit Cymru service provider, under an Energy Performance Contract. Working with Ameresco has allowed us to accelerate the roll-out of our energy efficiency programme in a more comprehensive manner and at a greater pace than could be achieved using limited in-house resources.

Progress

We are developing a 'Fabric First' methodology to new build construction projects to ensure a high level of energy efficiency for new facilities entering our building portfolio. This is underpinned by a commitment to incorporate the quality assured 'Passivhaus' Standard.

The following new schools currently under construction have been designed to achieve Passivhaus Standard certification and thus deliver enhanced performance in terms of energy usage and internal environment: Gorslas Primary School; Ysgol y Castell; and, Pembrey Community Primary School

In July 2021 confirmation was received that Ysgol Parc y Tywyn had formally been accredited as achieving the Passivhaus standard.

Other non-educational buildings also designed and built to achieve the Passivhaus Standard are: Carmarthen Archives and Repository (completed); and, Pendine Attractor Project – Eco Hostel building (currently under construction).

Progress

We will continue to explore solutions and methods to maximise renewable energy solutions. A further emphasis will be put on establishing optimised solutions in new buildings with calculated investment against the performance level of the building fabric and aimed to provide best value in terms of capital and operation expenditure. We will continue to explore a flexible model to best suit the needs of the Net Zero Carbon agenda on any given project.

Examples of how renewable and low energy specifications are being continually developed and adapted include:

- All major new build projects incorporate renewable energy technologies where appropriate with solar photovoltaic (PV) installations being incorporated into many recent Modernising Education Provision 21st Century Schools projects (e.g. Ysgol Pum Heol 12kW PV array completed January 2021; Ysgol Rhys Pritchard 27 kW PV array completed February 2021) and new housing developments (e.g. Garreglwyd and Dylan sites).
- The new housing development currently under construction at Glanmor Terrace, Burry Port includes battery storage to maximise the use of the electricity generated by the solar PV installed on each dwelling. Electric vehicle charge points are also being provided for each property. Also features Mechanical Ventilation Heat Recovery (MVHR) units in each dwelling. As part of the move towards limiting the use of fossil fuels these properties are totally electric.
- Air Source Heat Pumps have been installed to provide heating at each of the flats and communal areas at Llys yr Ysgol Sheltered Housing Complex. These heat pumps replaced inefficient and expensive to run electric storage heaters at the Complex. Air Source is currently being explored on a larger scale in respect of the new development for Ysgol Heol Goffa.
- Specifications for all new school developments now include for the installation of Electric Vehicle Charging Points.
- LED lighting now being specified as standard.
- All new solar PV systems include technology specified to enable web access to generation data that allows more detailed real-time data for the analysis of electricity generation.

Progress

A major audit of all our electricity and gas fiscal meters has enabled the roll-out of a comprehensive programme of 'smart' meter installations. We are also doing likewise for our water meters.

Gas Metering: Day+1 Half Hourly (HH) data flowing from 209 meters including all the 197 supplies at sites to be retained (100%). Complete.

Electricity Metering: Day+ 1 HH data flowing from 256 of 574 known supplies **(44.6%)**. Work in progress, with Western Power Distribution, our distribution network operator, currently installing meters. EDF, our electricity provider, need to action 233 (D0142) upgrades to complete the bulk of our remaining meters. This has been delayed by EDF staff absence, progress anticipated shortly.


Water Metering: Day+1 Quarter Hourly (QH) data flowing from 4 of 336 known supplies (1.2%). Work in progress to confirm site list with Welsh Water Dwr Cymru before arranging for data loggers to be installed.

This HH and QH data is automatically imported daily to our <u>SystemsLink</u> energy management software system to provide enhanced data accuracy that enables us to better identify opportunities for savings.

4.2 Carbon Footprint: Street Lighting



We have completed the conversion of almost 100% of our 20,000 streetlights to low energy light-emitting diode (LED) lighting, funded by the Welsh Government's interest-free Wales Funding Programme. The remainder will be converted at their end of use.


We have also completed a project to upgrade 5,000 community street lighting units to incorporate LED lighting on behalf of the town and community councils which has reduced energy consumption and improved lighting quality in local communities.





5. Renewable Energy Generation + Carbon Offsetting



Whilst we are committed to significantly reducing our carbon footprint, we recognise that however energy / carbon efficient our Services become, we will inevitably still have a residual carbon footprint. This situation is acknowledged by the 'Net' in the Net Zero Carbon equation, which enables our residual carbon footprint to be compensated / offset by the generation of renewable electricity and through carbon sequestration (such as through the planting of trees).

However, we continue to pursue the carbon mitigation hierarchy approach as we do not consider compensation / offsetting as a 'get out clause' for reducing our carbon footprint:



We have continued to add further solar PV installations on our non-domestic buildings, including schools, and currently have a total installed capacity of 1.8 MWp.

Note: Solar PV systems installed as part of our Re:Fit Cymru Phase 1 project are not included as operational after 1st April 2021.

The continuing decarbonisation of the electricity distribution network - National Grid - means that emission conversion factors for electricity are decreasing. Whilst this has a positive impact in reducing our carbon footprint, it conversely has a negative impact in reducing the equivalent carbon savings from renewable energy generation, thus requiring more solar PV panels to offset our (reducing) carbon footprint.

Note: The Council spends in-excess of £5m annually on energy. As is currently very evident, the procurement of energy has become increasingly complex with prices volatile and linked to both UK and global factors. To minimise risk, we procure our energy using <u>Crown Commercial Service</u> Framework Agreements for most supplies. All this electricity is procured from renewable energy sources. Unfortunately, as the consumption of this 'green' electricity is reflected in the UK emission conversion factor for electricity, we are unable to directly benefit from carbon savings resulting from the procurement of 'green' electricity as this would effectively be double counting.

We recently commissioned <u>Land Use Consultants Ltd</u> to deliver a strategy that sets out how to enhance <u>Green and Blue Infrastructure</u> in eight selected towns across the County, and to also analyse our own land holdings to determine the potential for carbon sequestration. This work will inform the development of our new Decarbonisation / NZC Plans, as will the recent declaration of a Nature Emergency by the County Council.

5.71ha of native broadleaved woodland will be planted on Council land over winter 2022/23 under the Welsh Government Glastir Woodland Creation (GWC) scheme. The area comprises three fields in Tregib, Llandeilo; Pendre, Kidwelly and Maesdewi, Llandybie previously used for grazing purposes. These areas were identified as potential tree planting sites from bare land holdings (i.e. those not in long-term tenancy) owned by the Council. Sites were first screened to exclude those that held unimproved grassland of high biodiversity habitat, then sites of suitable size close to urban or rural communities were prioritised to maximise social benefits. Applications were made to the GWC scheme and three of the sites were selected by Welsh Government for funding under this scheme. The planting will use a range of site suited native broadleaved species to maximise biodiversity benefits. Planting will be designed to allow public access through the sites and community planting days will be held to encourage local people take part in the project.

Carbon sequestration over the lifetime of the project will be 2,999 tCO₂e (based on the <u>UK Woodland Carbon Code</u> Small Project Carbon Calculator).

In May 2021, the Healthy Environment Delivery Group discussed the report commissioned by Natural Resources Wales on climate change risks. This report considered the impact on local communities, and how communities can be better prepared for the effects of climate change with specific reference to Newcastle Emlyn. The report recommended the following priority actions: (1) Community-Led Emergency Response Plan; (2) Citizens' Jury; (3) Newcastle Emlyn 2050 Future Scenario; and, (4) Climate Risks and Assets Map.

At its meeting on 29th September 2021, the PSB was unable to progress priorities (2) and (3) due to capacity issues. However, priority (1) - Community Lead Emergency Response Plan – is being supported with links to the 10 Towns project, and priority (4) - Climate Risks and Asset Map – is also being supported with the assistance of University of Wales Trinity St David students.

Natural Resources Wales (NRW) held a virtual SW Wales PSBs Net Zero Workshop on 29th September 2021. This event included speakers from Welsh Government and their consultants who provided an overview of the Public Sector Net Zero Reporting Guide (May 2021). NRW also shared their experience in determining baseline emissions and developing carbon reduction strategies through their Carbon Positive Project.

Hywel Dda University Health Board have secured Welsh Government grant funding to construct a solar farm at their Hafan Derwen site. We had been negotiating a possible power purchase arrangement whereby some of the generated electricity would be available to supply our adjoining Parc Dewi Sant offices. Disappointingly, technical issues associated with the local grid connection meant that this has not been possible.

The <u>South West Wales Energy Strategy</u> (March 2022) was commissioned by the Welsh Government and supported by the Welsh Government Energy Service. It has been developed by the South West Wales Energy Core Group, a sub-group of the Regional Directors' forum from the four constituent local authorities, with additional support from an Advisory Panel and regional stakeholders. It sets a strategic framework to guide the transformational interventions needed to help achieve a net zero Wales by 2050. It has been a collaborative exercise developed by WGES and the four local authorities, with input from a wide range of stakeholders - public, private, and voluntary.

Undepinning this regional Strategy will be four <u>Local Area Energy Plans</u> (LAEPs) for each local authority area. <u>Energy Systems Catapult</u> have been appointed by Welsh Government to help support the development these LAEPs which will involve significant coordination across the public, private and third sectors with the involvement of businesses, communities, and agencies. In Carmarthenshire, this will be led by the Place and Sustainability Division.



1. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Apologies for absence were received from Councillors P. Edwards and A.D.T. Speake.

2. DECLARATIONS OF PERSONAL INTEREST INCLUDING ANY PARTY WHIPS ISSUED IN RELATION TO ANY AGENDA ITEM.

There were no declarations of any prohibited party whips.

There were no declarations of interest made.

3. PUBLIC QUESTIONS (NONE RECEIVED)

The Chair advised that no public questions had been received.



4. EXTENSION OF PUBLIC SPACE PROTECTION ORDER (CARMARTHENSHIRE DOG ORDERS)

The Committee received a report presented by the Cabinet Member for Public Protection in respect of extending the current Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) which was due to expire at the end of June for a further 3 years.

The Cabinet Member explained that subject to a number of exemptions and restrictions, the Original Order required that people:

- Clean up after their dogs on all public land in the County.
- Put and keep their dog on a lead by direction.
- Not to take their dog onto or permits their dog to enter or remain on any enclosed children's play areas in the County.

The Cabinet Member further explained that a targeted consultation period on the extension of the PSPO had taken place with a number of statutory consultees and other relevant stakeholders, a list of which was included within the report. However, it was evident several responses had been received from individuals and organisation who had not been invited to respond. 43 responses were received with 85% of those respondents supporting the extension of the current PSPO for a period of 3 years.

It was reported that a number of respondents had made suggestions comments through the consultation exercise and that the comments and responses were appended to the report at Appendix 8 of the report.

Committee Members noted that this report sought to extend the duration of the 2016 Order whereby a new Extension Order would need to be made, a draft order was appended to the report at Appendix 2. It was reported that the Authority, subject to a separate consultation, would be able to consider additional controls and conditions to be added to the current PSPO in future and that an engagement exercise was currently being carried out to seek wider views.

The following comments/queries were raised in relation to the report:-

- In response to a query raised regarding Fixed Penalty Notices, the Cabinet Member for Public Protection explained that as stated in 3.1 of the report since the 2016 Order came into force there had been 3002 (Up to 31/12/2021) complaints received in relation to dog fouling. 100 fixed penalty tickets had been issued and 6 prosecutions had been implemented for offenders who had failed to pay the fixed penalty notice. It was emphasised that the difficulty was that an enforcement officer would have to witness the incident at the time of the offence for a fixed penalty notice to be issued.
- It was asked if the PSPO was enforceable outside of an enclosed space and if
 pavements were included? The Head of Waste and Environmental Services
 clarified that the PSPO covered any public land and that enclosed fenced off
 spaces such as a children's playground would include a no dog zone. It was
 clarified that footways were included as public land and therefore covered by
 the PSPO.



- In reference to the response from the Kennel Club as part of the consultation, it was commented that farmers in order to obtain insurance must provide documentation to prove that they worm their dogs. However, it was raised that dog owners were able to work their dog on public footpaths crossing agricultural land thus causing a concern of passing on worms to cattle and sheep. It was asked if it was possible to include that the landowner has a right to enquire with the dog owner if their dog had been wormed. The Cabinet Member for Public Protection acknowledged the query as a concern and agreed to include the matter as part of the future consultation. The Cabinet Member acknowledged the concern and would feed it into the consultation.
- In response to a query, the Cabinet Member for Public Protection, corroborated by the Head of Waste and Environmental Services confirmed that PCSO's were equipped with the power to issue fixed penalty notices to dog fouling offenders which supplements the Council's enforcement officers.

UNANIMOUSLY RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND TO CABINET:

- 4.1 that the duration of the Carmarthenshire County Council (Dog Control) Public Spaces Protection Order 2016 be extended for a further period of 3 years with effect from the 1st July 2022;
- 4.2 that the Council makes an Extension Order to give effect to the above extension and endorses the 2016 Order with suitable wording to reflect the fact that the duration of the 2016 order has been extended.

The Cabinet Member for Communities and Rural Affairs presented the report explaining that the Communities Departmental Draft Business Plan 2022/23 only included extracts of the Chief Executive's Department Business Plan for the ICT & Corporate Policy Division relevant to this Scrutiny Committee which was community safety.

Committee Members considered the extracts relating to Community Safety.

The following comments/queries were raised in relation to the report:-

In response to a query which sought clarification in relation to the similarities of the descriptions in Key Actions and Measures Reference 1, 2, 4 and 7, the Corporate Policy and Partnership Manager explained that the extract included actions from the departmental plan as well as the divisional plan in order to provide more context. In acknowledging that the wording was very similar in nature, the reason for the similarities was due to the duty in regard to the antiterrorism element of the Contest Strategy and that there was a new requirement specifically in terms of the 'protect duty'. Furthermore, in accepting the point raised regarding the wording the Corporate Policy and Partnership Manager agreed to rephrase to provide clarity.

UNANIMOUSLY RESOLVED that the Community Safety elements of the Communities Departmental Business Plan 2022/23 relevant to the remit of this Scrutiny Committee be received.



6. ENVIRONMENT DEPARTMENTAL BUSINESS PLAN 2022/23

The Committee Members considered the Environment Departmental Business Plan 2022/23 presented in turn by the Cabinet Members for Environment, Public Protection and Communities and Rural Affairs in respect of the areas falling within their portfolios and the Committees remit.

The Cabinet Member for Communities and Public Affairs explained that whilst Net Zero Carbon transcended across all areas of the Council's work, the responsibility had been transferred under the Environment Department and therefore the appropriate actions and measures had now included the Environment Departmental Business Plan.

The following comments/gueries were raised in relation to the report:-

• Reference was made to the Planned Improvements for 2022/23 in relation to the introduction of the 20mph speed limits as a national default in residential areas. It was raised that there were a number of villages which did not have any limit set under the national speed limit of 60mph, it was asked how would these be affected? The Cabinet Member of Environment explained that the Welsh Government were currently looking at those areas with limits of 30mph and that they would be looking at urban areas as opposed to rural areas. In response to a further query regarding residential areas where no limits were currently set, the Highways and Transportation Manager clarified that the proposed Welsh Government legislation related to the term 'restricted roads', whereby the speed limit would be governed by a system of street lighting. Where street lighting exists on roads currently set with a 30mph limit, the new legislation required these areas to be reduced to 20mph. Therefore, those villages that do not have street lighting or a 30mph speed limit they would not be affected by the new legislation.

In response to a further query regarding residential areas with no current speed limit, the Highways and Transportation Manager stated that whilst these areas would not be considered under the legislation, settlements that may benefit from the introduction of a speed limit could be considered as part of the project.

• Reference was made to the measure cited on page 29 of the report ref E11 – "we will expand this successful approach and use S106 agreements and developer contribution to deliver other necessary biodiversity benefits where this is appropriate. (September 2022 & March 2023)". It was commented that Members had recently been informed that they could apply for the S106 money to be used in their community. Clarification on the measure was sought with concern that communities would lose out on this S106 money. The Biodiversity Officer explained that for development where there was a significant impact on biodiversity, which could not be mitigated on site or where it was complicated to do so, the Council had successfully adopted an approach where S106 funding for CCC was accepted to undertake appropriate mitigation/compensation for the developer on site or offsite through an agreed funded management plan. This would allow for no net loss of biodiversity, whilst allowing the development to take place. The Biodiversity Officer provided relevant examples to the Committee.



- Reference was made to page 41 of the report Ref 43 Improve Active Travel Routes for Communities. The Highways and Transportation Manager, in response to a query of the non-inclusion of the Cardi Bach footway stated that the Active Travel initiative was in the main aimed towards a model shift away from vehicles thus encouraging walking and cycling It was explained that the Cardi Bach project was still in its formative stage in terms of development and that the Council was working with Sustrans and Pembrokeshire County Council regarding the feasibility of the project. Not until the feasibility studies were in a position to provide a definitive proposal together with secured funding for the scheme would it be included within the business plan which would include the necessary milestones for the project.
- Praise was expressed in the development of the new-style business plan, which include more information, more readable, easier to understand, provides the direction of travel and what success would look like. Appreciation was extended to the officers involved in the development of the plan.
- Reference was made to the upcoming agenda Item 9 Non-submission report
 which provided an explanation of the non-submission of the Communities
 Departmental Business Plan 2022/23. It was raised that in line with the
 explanation, the items would be placed within the Environmental Departmental
 Plan. It was asked when this would be included? Head of Homes & Safer
 Communities reported whilst the new Sustainability and Place Division was
 being established, it would be prudent to consider the current synergies with
 Public Protection. Following this piece of work, the Communities
 Departmental Business Plan would be presented to Committee Members in
 July 2022.
- In response to a query regarding the future plans to start the waste amnesties in the North of the County, the Environmental Services Manager explained that there would be a review of practices as part of the pandemic recovery. The number of amnesties and locations would also be subject to review, communication with local Members be priority whilst moving towards normal working practices.

UNANIMOUSLY RESOLVED that the Environment Department Business Plan 2022/23 be received.

7. FUTURE ACCESSIBILITY OPTIONS AT HOUSEHOLD WASTE RECYCLING CENTRES (HWRC)

The Committee received a report for information presented by the Cabinet Member for Environment which provided an update position and future option for the Household Waste Recycling Centres (HWRC).

This report provided information in regard to a future strategy of accessibility for the HWRC service in Carmarthenshire, which would ensure an efficient and accessible service for Carmarthenshire residents whilst maximising our recycling performance in the delivery of this service in the long term.



Members considered the report which provided the current position and the service impacts together with the proposed options that would enable the success of the booking system with the development of an Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) system across the network of HWRC's as follows:

- Retain the IT based appointment system as is currently in place for the next twelve months.
- Retail the IT based appointment system for the next twelve months and pilot a hybrid approach of bookings
- Remove the IT based appointment system
- In 12 months introduce an Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) and resident registration access system at all four HWRCs.

The following comments/queries were raised in relation to the report:-

• It was commented that residents have reported that residents were happy with the current booking system however, clarification was sought on the method of use. The Cabinet Member agreed that the reports suggest that HWRC users across the County were satisfied with the current booking method both online and telephone. What was being proposed was that the current booking system continue for 12months whilst the ANPR option was being explored.

UNANIMOUSLY RESOLVED that the Future Accessibility Options at Household Waste Recycling Centres (HWRC) report be received.

8. PROVISION OF PAVEMENTS IN RURAL AREAS

The Committee received a report on the Provision of Pavements in Rural Areas presented by the Cabinet Member for Environment. This report had been written at the request of the Committee following a referral from Community and Regeneration Scrutiny Committee regarding the lack of provision of pavements in rural areas and the backlog of requests.

The Community and Regeneration Scrutiny Committee at its meeting held on 1st July 2021 raised a concern regarding a lack of pavements in rural areas to facilitate increased levels of walking and cycling and made reference to the outstanding pool of requests for pavements

The report stated that there had been a longstanding pressure on the County Council from the large number of requests received for highway improvements such as upgraded junctions, traffic calming, new sections of road and new footways. The requests received far exceeded the available resources through the Council's annual capital budget allocated for Highway Infrastructure and Road Safety Improvements. The level of capital funding available was £250k per annum. The level of funding enabled delivery of a maximum of three schemes per year.



Committee members, in considering the information provided within the report the following comments/queries were raised:

In acknowledging the limited resources available it was emphasised that the
current provision of pavement in rural areas continued to be a huge concern.
Similar to other development schemes, it was asked if there was a way to sort
the ongoing issue of pavements through borrowing money? In response, the
Cabinet Member advised would be best discussed as part of the Forward
Work Programme following the elections.

UNANIMOUSLY RESOLVED that the Provision of Pavements in Rural Areas report be received.

9. NON-SUBMISSION OF SCRUTINY REPORT

The Committee received an explanation for the non-submission of the following scrutiny report:

• The Communities Departmental Business Plan 2022/23

Members noted the revised submission date would be after the election period.

UNANIMOUSLY RESOLVED that the explanation for the non-submission be noted.
