EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

ENVIRONMENTAL & PUBLIC PROTECTION SCRUTINY COMMITTEE 12th NOVEMBER 2015

Revenue & Capital Budget Monitoring Report 2015/16

The monitoring exercise for the period to the 31st August 2015 is attached and indicates that:

Revenue Budgets

Environment Service (Appendix A)

The Environment Service is showing an anticipated overspend of £343k at year end.

The Transport & Engineering Division is showing a net overspend of £80k for the year. Civil design is showing an overspend of £48k due to under recovery of income as a result of a vacant post, Car Parks an overspend of £25k due to a delay in implementing the increased charges that were included in the efficiency proposals and Park and Ride is overspent by £40k. Public Transport is anticipating a £32k underspend following service adjustments to manage budget pressures elsewhere within the division.

The Property Services Division has an overall anticipated overspend of £209k. Building Maintenance is expecting to be £394k overspent due to not achieving their income target as a result of a reduction in the Carmarthenshire Housing Standard related work. This is offset by a £200k underspend in the Grounds Maintenance section due to ongoing efficiency savings.

The Street-Scene Division is expecting to break even at year end.

The Policy & Development Division is anticipating a £53k overspend mainly due a £36k severance efficiency not being delivered as well as a £3k overspend on out of hours allowances.

Public Protection (Appendix B)

The Public Protection Service is projecting that it will be over its approved budget by £27k mainly due to under recovery of income.

Community Safety (Appendix C) – The Community Safety Service within the Chief Executive's Department is projecting a net overspend at year end of £4k.

Environment (Appendix D) – No variances

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Heads of Service Overview

This is a brief overview of performance from each Head of Service who reports data to this Scrutiny

Wendy Walters – Assistant Chief Executive (Regeneration & Policy)

Crime statistics

Crime levels have increased overall this year compared to the same period last year. During April – September 2015, levels of recorded crime went up by 7.1% amounting to a rise of 267 crimes from 3,786 to 4,053. Increases were seen across Dyfed Powys, with the change in Carmarthenshire being the lowest percentage increase across the Force area.

Reductions have been seen in vehicle crime (down 21% and 45, to 169), miscellaneous crimes against society (down 36.9% to 41, a fall of 24), public order offences (down 63 and 32.3% to 132) and drug offences (3.4% fall and down 19 to 542). Increases have been seen in domestic burglary levels (up 4.2% to 125, an increase of 5), burglary non dwellings (up 20 to 166, an increase of 13.7%), sexual offences (up 29 to 156, an increase of 22.8%), arson and criminal damage (up 49 and 7.2% to 727) and violence against the person (up 177 crimes and 20.3% to 1.051).

Increases seen in certain reported crimes continue to be in line with national trends and, it is believed, are as a result of the introduction of a new way of recording crime more accurately from January. For example, the rise in violent crime generally relates to recording of counter allegations, and the rise in sexual offences is a mixture of historic offences being recorded together with increased confidence leading to an increase in current reporting levels.

The police are now required to record crimes within 24 hours compared to the previous 72 hours. This has impacted on crime figures as more allegations are being recorded before officers may have been able to prove that the crime did not occur. Forces are also no longer measured against detection rates and a wider range of 'outcomes' for dealing with a crime has been introduced nationally to ensure more accurate recording.

Anti-social behaviour (ASB) incidents have continued to fall but in the last six months, a dramatic reduction has been seen. There were 3,435 incidents reported, a fall of 24.3% and over 1,000 incidents (1,101) compared to the same period last year.

Progress to date on Community Safety Partnership (CSP) initiatives

CSP action groups continue to be proactive tackling key priorities and progress made in relation to some of these include:

Reducing reoffending remains a key priority and collaborative work across agencies has continued to mature and improve as a result of the co-located police and probation Integrated Offender Management (IOM) team. The IOM scheme to tackle our key offenders - `Trawsnewid/Transform` has continued to perform well this quarter with the team of Police and Probation officers working with a number of partner agencies to focus on the identified cohort of offenders.

Developments this quarter have included regular criminal justice meetings with local substance misuse service providers and the launch of `Supported Compliance` in the county which is a programme of early intervention visits to offenders sentenced to Community Orders, Suspended Sentences and Prison Licences, carried out by Neighbourhood Policing Teams. The latest performance data (12 month period ending in June) for the IOM cohort recorded crime shows that crimes reduced by 231 committed by the cohort, with an associated cost of crime saving of over £1.2 million.

- ➤ The CSP is also working with partners to ensure the effective implementation of the powers which came into place with the introduction of the ASB, Crime and Policing Act in October 2014. This Act introduced fundamental changes to ASB powers, repealing a number of existing powers, and replacing them with new powers. Discussions are taking place between partners currently relating to implementing process for the new Community Protection Notice, Public Space Protection Order and Community Trigger.
- There has been promotion of campaigns and current initiatives progressed by the CSP's multi-agency action groups to tackle local priorities. There has been good media coverage of work to raise awareness of cyber crime, a violent crime campaign and an initiative for people going away on holiday. The Police are urging people to support a campaign calling time on violent crime by making an online pledge to 'never commit or condone alcohol-fuelled violence or aggression, or any violence fullstop'. #PaulsPledge campaign is led by Paul Pugh, a 34 year old man still suffering the effects of a vicious, unprovoked attack that happened on a night out eight years ago. The initiative aims to encourage people to stop and think about the consequences of violence for the victim and the offender. This Ammanford initiative has now been rolled out across Dyfed Powys and into South Wales. Another initiative, Holiday Watch', is a security equipment loan scheme established by the Police with the support of the CSP. The scheme aims to reduce burglaries and the fear of crime. Boxes containing security equipment are loaned to members of the public who have poor security measures or a high level of fear of a crime happening when they are away on holiday. In relation to cyber crime, Trading Standards Officers continue to offer advice and investigate cyber crimes through the Council's digital forensic unit – the only one in Wales. This has included raising awareness about only using secure websites, not clicking on links you are not sure of and not providing personal data.
- Consideration is being given to the duties placed on partner agencies by new legislation Violence against Women, Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence and the Counter-Terrorism and Security Act. These are key areas which will be progressed in partnership over the next six months.

The well-established local partnership working continues to effectively target resources and multi-agency working to help keep crime and disorder low. Ongoing collaborative working remains essential and the commitment of partner agencies to such an approach will, no doubt, continue to bring benefits for our communities.

Mario Cresci - Head of Street Scene

Waste Management

It is pleasing to note that our landfill diversion figures have significantly exceeded the set target, primarily due to the switch to a residual waste treatment process, placing the Authority well within its statutory landfill allowance limit.

However, the recycling performance for Q2 is lower than expected with respect to the headline overall recycling performance at an actual figure of 58.06% against a target of 60%. This position can be attributed to three main factors: the temporary loss of wood recycling as a result of a declaration by the regulators that our wood recycling outlets are no longer fully compliant with recycling protocols; temporary difficulties with delays to the exportation of residual waste for incineration; a delay in the treatment of hardcore at our Household Waste Recycling Centre (HWRC) sites. It is expected that these issues will be addressed in the 3rd and 4th quarter to bring us back on target by the end of the year.

Following on from the food recycling participation surveys undertaken in 2013/14, we are currently rolling out a pilot scheme to assess if the use of food bin liners will increase the level of participation in our food waste recycling scheme; participation is currently estimated at about 39%. This pilot scheme will run from October 2015 to March 2016 initially, with about 15,000 properties included across the County. We will also continue to undertake a programme of door stepping work to encourage more of our residents to participate in all of our recycling initiatives.

Street Cleansing and Enforcement

The Q2 performance figures for the local environment quality indicators have exceeded the set targets. The percentage of highways and relevant land inspected that is of a high or acceptable standard of cleanliness is reported at 99.9%, which is an excellent result. Similarly, the independently assessed Cleanliness Index indicator (LEAMS survey) is at 73% against a target of 67%. Both figures demonstrate that the service continues to perform to a high standard and strives to clear instances of fly-tipping as soon as practicable, with 98.9% of fly-tipped incidents dealt within 5 working days. Our response to clearing up incidents of dog fouling is also pleasing to note – an average response of 1.29 days against a target of 1.4 days.

The service continues to promote education, awareness and engagement initiatives, as these are viewed as proactive measures to tackle environmental blight. Also, the Enforcement Unit has continued its zero tolerance approach towards offenders and has achieved a high level of well publicised successes with respect to fines and prosecutions, often working in difficult circumstances. These proactive measures will become increasingly important as budget reductions will inevitably impact on the street cleansing function.

Public Lighting

It is disappointing to note that the figure for the average number of days taken to repair lamp failures is greater than the set target. This position is principally attributable to temporary mechanical issues with our fleet of specialist mobile platform access vehicles resulting in two out of four vehicles being unavailable for a period of time, whilst the problems were being resolved. Members will be aware from previous reports that this target has been consistently exceeded in previous years, and it is envisaged that we will close the performance gap by the end of the year.

The Public Lighting section continues to replace defective columns on an ad-hoc basis, as problems are encountered. This includes the installation of LED lighting units (within available budget) as part of its long term investment strategy, thereby increasing the performance and service life of our lighting stock, whilst reducing energy consumption and maintenance costs.

Stephen Pilliner – Head of Transport & Engineering

The Transport and Engineering Division has continued to focus its work to facilitate the expeditious, safe movement of goods and people on the highway network. Progress has been made with actions outlined in the improvement plan relating to road safety, infrastructure development and sustainable transport developments.

The progress of a number of actions is dependent on influencing behavioural change with road users. We work with partners and stakeholders to deliver improvements on a highway network that is the second highest length of county network in Wales and where traffic volumes are the third highest in Wales.

Achieving success across the key themes is challenging. Nevertheless, the teams continue to strive to:

- make a reducing resource base go further
- secure external funding wherever possible by submitting quality bids that are based on effective use of research, innovation and engagement with communities.
- Working in collaboration with neighbouring authorities through the Local Transport Forum and other organisations such as the Dyfed Powys Police, Go Safe Wales and the Mid & West Wales Fire Service.

The 2015/16 Improvement Plan includes a mix of engineering and behavioural change measures, and incentives to facilitate the safe movement of goods and people. A summary of the interventions are set out below for members.

1. Road Safety.

The Wales Government has established an All Wales Strategic Road Safety Group to support partnership working to deliver the Road Safety Framework for Wales, which was published in 2013. The group brings all partners together to develop a strategic approach to improving road safety by targeting and measuring educational, engineering or enforcement measures that can be monitored and measured for effectiveness.

The Authority is currently developing a Road Safety Plan which will reflect the national casualty reduction targets, as set out in the Road Safety Framework Wales.

Our work in partnership with the Police and other agencies will continue, as we seek to build on our previous success in reducing the number of people killed and seriously injured on Carmarthenshire roads. We will also invest in computer software to improve the quality of management information that we will use to target education, engineering or enforcement interventions. Generally, there has been a reduction in the number of casualties on the highway network with 557 casualties in 2014 compared to 619 in 2013. There are certain groups of road users that do however remain a concern.

For example, the number of motorcyclists killed and seriously injured in Carmarthenshire remains stubbornly high at 24 deaths at the end of 2014. The figure reduced from 28 in the previous year. The All Wales Road Safety Framework has set the following targets to 2020:

- A 40% reduction in the number of killed and seriously injured for older adults aged 65+
- A 40% reduction in the number of killed and seriously injured for young adults
- A 25% reduction in the number of killed and seriously injured for motorcyclists.

The performance at the end of 2014 for Carmarthenshire was:

- A 36.7% reduction in the number of killed and seriously injured for young adults
- A 40% reduction in the number of killed and seriously injured for older adults aged 65+
- A 31.9% increase in the number of killed and seriously injured for motorcyclists.

Further reductions have been achieved in the first half of the year for the number of motorcyclists and older persons killed and seriously injured. The Authority continues to strive to make further improvements through partnership working with the respective agencies.

2. Infrastructure Investment.

Working with the former SWWITCH partners, moneys secured through the Local Transport Fund, Safe Routes in the Communities, Local Road Safety Grant has enabled the Authority to make investment in infrastructure. The investment has improved transport infrastructure to provide access e.g.

- Carmarthen West Link Road
- Public transport infrastructure
- Walking and Cycling Infrastructure
- Phase 2 of the Cross Hands Economic Link Road.

3. Passenger Transport

Despite significant reductions in funding for public transport, the uptake of concessionary bus passes is still seeing a high uptake. The performance for the first half of the year of 80.5% is above anticipated target of 79%. The ongoing challenges relating to public transport, is likely to have a negative impact on this sector of users in the future.

To date, the authority has worked together with the bus operators, our neighbouring authorities and the Wales Government to provide and sustain the network as much as possible.

4. Internal Interventions

The Division continues to use a number of internal measures in promoting and developing sustainable travel options. Collaboration on the fleet replacement programme between our fleet section and service users aims to reduce the fleet by a further 2% by the end of the year. The replacement programme will also provide an opportunity to introduce more efficient vehicles, in terms of emissions and fuel use. Over £6 million has been committed to date on replacement of heavy commercial vehicles.

The light commercial vehicles have also been ordered. In 2014/15 the authority has reduced the number of vehicles by 42, a further 20 vehicles are due to be removed from service in the forthcoming twelve months.

Robin Staines – Head of Housing & Public Protection

Public Protection services aim to improve public health, animal health and fair trading by the application of the National Enforcement Priorities for Wales and through developing, coordinating, educating and implementing public health, animal health and consumer protection policies. These ensure that everyone has an equal chance of a better quality of life in a healthier society and that animal health and welfare is preserved.

It is split into two Sections, providing the following services:

- Environmental Health and Licensing Services, and
- Trading Standards Services.

Overall performance to date is satisfactory albeit with more pressures and demands. The teams ensure that work is prioritised according to risk.

Environmental Health and Licensing Services

Pollution and Public Health

There have been 1882 Service requests received dealing with Pollution (including complaints regarding odours, drainage, noise, fly tipping on private land, stray dogs etc); an increase of approximately 100 from the previous year. Officers have been flexible in approach to their work and have been undertaking training to enable them to utilise additional legislation as appropriate for anti social behaviour.

In addition to the response to service requests, officers are continuing with ongoing programmes of work such as the compliance checks for individuals and businesses requiring air pollution permits, private drinking water, bathing water and shellfish sampling.

The officers have found that there has been an increase of enquires for screening and scoping prior to planning applications for highly technical and complex businesses such as wind turbines or larger scale developments. We had received 66 planning consultations, 12 Pre-Planning consultations and 24 Screening and Scoping assessments. Each consultation and assessment takes considerable resources to ensure that the information is correct to avoid any future complications or issues.

The team have provided evidence that there is a requirement for the declared Air Quality Management Areas in both Carmarthen and Llanelli. The consultation is currently being undertaken. The Air Quality Management Area action plan for Llandeilo is being implemented where possible and monitored.

The Contaminated Land Strategy was approved by full Council earlier this year.

There have been some lengthy investigations carried out by the team including Gestamp and enforcement leading to 2 court cases. These include a case involving a nuisance caused by dogs and an appeal privately owned wind turbine which was heard in Crown Court. We won both cases.

Food Safety and Health

At the 6 month point, the team have been instrumental in completing 81% of all due programmed food hygiene inspections.

In terms of Food Hygiene Ratings, Carmarthenshire stands firmly with 98% achieving a rating of 3 (generally satisfactory) or greater with only 37 premises scoring 0,1 or 2, all of whom have been subject to multiple visits by enforcement officers and enforcement action where appropriate in securing broadly compliant standards.

New legislation has been embraced, making it illegal to smoke in private vehicles when someone under 18 is present. Effective partnership working with Education, resulted in all schools being requested to deliver the message to in excess of 26000 pupils across the county. Working in conjunction with Leisure, over 62 information packs have been issued to local sporting clubs regarding goal post safety. The main aim being that to assist clubs in implementing risk based maintenance programmes, in order to safeguard those accessing such facilities.

Officers have been drawn into substantive investigations involving a motorbike racing circuit fatality; a serious incident involving a fall from height from a residential home; the use of a deferred action notice in respect of structural stability to a floor in a high street retail store; and also significant breaches observed in a local Butcher Shop.

The section has been successful in obtaining funding for the delivery of a day's training seminar in relation to Haccp Validation and verification, effectively working with some of our well known producers, striving to further improve food safety procedures, which will be delivered in the run up to Christmas. The team have also been involved in a National risk based consistency exercise.

Investigations have commenced and continue into allegations of shellfish poaching, particularly in the Three Rivers area of the County. This in turn has seen the division partake in a Welsh Government Joint Working Task Group. Commercial shellfish beds and shellfish waters continue to be sampled on a monthly basis and has recently been expanded to include dived hand gathered razor clams undertaken as part of a sanitary survey application in conjunction with CEFAS, FSA and Pembrokeshire.

The section has also made inroads into the investigation of 2 alleged illegal tattooists operating within the County, in addition to entertaining additional applications for both new tattoo and piercing premises and operators.

Officers have investigated 104 notifications of food borne infections and 9 associated outbreaks, all of which were perceived to be of viral origin.

Licensing

The section has completed consultation exercises for both the Licensing Act Policy and the Gambling Policy. The reviewed documents are in the process of being approved through the political process.

Licensing Act

Between April and September 2015, we have processed 144 applications under the Licensing Act 2003 in relation to Premises and Clubs, 268 Temporary Event Notices and 54 applications for personal licences. We continue to hold regular Licensing Action Group meetings at which the Police, Licensing Officers and representatives of Public Health agree actions to tackle problems associated with licensed premises.

Taxi Licensing

Since April 2015 we have processed and issued 326 Dual Drivers Licences, 200 Hackney Carriage Licences, 59 Private Hire Vehicle Licences and 20 Private Hire Operators Licences. We have undertaken 245 spot checks on vehicles.

Gambling Act

Administer 324 Lotteries. 32 new applications processed Administer 71 Gambling Related Premises. 52 annual fees processed.

Street and House to House collections

Since April 2015 the section has processed and issued 94 Street and House to House Collection licenses and Permits.

There have been exercises in implementing the licensing toolkit to calculate fees for services with locally set fees and a report with the reviewed fees is being prepared.

Trading Standards/Animal Health Services

Trading Standards have successfully completed 38% (60 visits) of high risk enforcement programme visits over the period; this is on the scheduled target. A further 275 medium risk visits were completed as programmed inspection or alternative inspection activity to the inspection regime.

We are also pro-actively promoting fair trading and Consumer Safety via our "e"- commerce monitoring strategy. We made 712 campaign and project based visits. This is mostly proactive work designed to supplement our routine inspection strategy and comprises internet site monitoring and intelligence based 'e-visits' (377 E-visits have been completed) which have resulted in a number of entry warrants being executed. Investigations carried out involve fraud, unsafe consumer goods, counterfeit goods, illegal dog breeding and pyramid selling schemes.

Significant criminal investigations are underway in the following areas of Consumer protection namely: Product Safety, Financial exploitation and scams and Unfair Trading, which will result in court proceedings.

A total of 1,674 complaints and service requests were also made by members of the public to Trading Standards and Animal Health and acted upon within the Division's standard response time of 10 working days. 92% of these complaints and service requests were responded to within 10 working days.

The section has successfully completed 35% (64 visits) of high risk enforcement programme visits over the period; this is on the scheduled target.

There were 193 livestock mart visits completed, and this work continues to be a priority.

A total of 53/55 animal welfare licences were determined in the standard response time of 8 weeks, representing 96% success and 100% (15) complaints of animal suffering were dealt within 1 working day.

A total of 106 service requests for Animal Health were made by members of the public, 104 of which were acted upon within 10 working days.

The Animal Licensing section processed 20,976 Animal Movement Licensing forms between April and September 2015/16.

Staffs of the Animal Health section have worked diligently in developing a new Licensing Fee structure for all licensed premises and approval is going through the political process at the moment. The intention is that this will result in the recovery of all our costs in relation to the Licensing process.

151 critical interventions have been completed, where an immediate response is required to ensure public protection. These interventions are mainly focused on incidents where itinerant traders were exploiting vulnerable and elderly residents and where there is immediate danger to the public and /or animals (e.g. stray horses).

Trading Standards continues to conduct numerous other initiatives outside the scope of the performance indicators and has led many projects.

These include Money wise on- line, a Financial Literacy in schools, Door Step Crime / No Cold Calling Zones, second hand car safety project. It also continues to administer the service level agreement between the Authority and the Citizens Advice Bureaux.

In the last few years our department has seen as increase in complaints received regarding nuisance telephone calls. As a result we became the first authority in Wales to pilot a device known as 'Truecall' and the launch of this initiative took place this year. Truecall is a device which is attached to telephone lines and blocks nuisance telephone calls to vulnerable clients, and we continue to expand and market this scheme. Truecall is offered to consumers that have been victims of telephone scams and/or are vulnerable.

Truecall Nuisance call Blocker Project -

Blocked 99% of Nuisance calls since scheme started in 2013, 17'000 nuisance calls blocked in total.

We have 42 devices installed in consumers homes at present and have a further 178 devices to install

Figures from Ofcom indicate that each nuisance call costs consumers 46 pence as proportion of national consumer detriment.

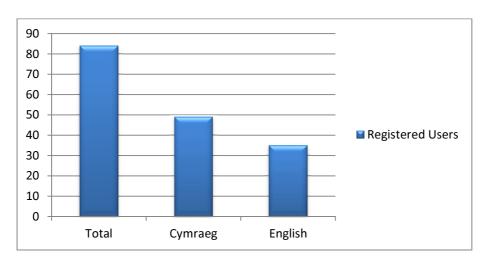

- National Trading Standards Board (NTSB) Scams Hub Intelligence Operating Model Led visits
- TrueCall Nuisance Telephone Call Blocking and Monitoring
- NTSB Royal Mail Staff Training Programme
- Local Authority No Cold Calling Zones
- Consumer Awareness and Education Campaigns
- Vulnerable Consumer Advice Interventions
- Moneywise Financial Education/ Literacy Programme
- Debt & Mental Health Interventions
- Financial Services and Public /Private/ Third Sector Safeguarding Protocols
- Intelligence led mapping/ forensic profiling

FESS enables these measures to be taken further by creating clear pathways and working relationships between social care services, public protection and the private sector extending the support offered to victims beyond the offering of any one given organisation/agency. The scheme thus provides for a multi disciplinary response to financial abuse and a package of measures that provide for more joint up and comprehensive social care interventions. The scheme is particularly timely in light of impending legislation and provides for the early detection, intervention, prevention and collaborative working in line with the Social Services and Wellbeing (Wales) Act 2014 and the implementation of a support package containing both Trading Standards protective/preventative measures and those of other social care departments to promote health, wellbeing and independent living.

Money Wise online

Our online financial education resource http://adnoddau.canolfanpeniarth.org/GW_TSA/, was launched in Carmarthenshire during a series of teacher training sessions held in December 2014 and January 2016, with 84 users registering over 69 out of 106 primary schools in the county.



REPORT A

In July 2015 we exhibited and presented the resources at the Chartered Trading Standards Institute (CTSI) National conference in Bournemouth, and were awarded the prize for Best Local Government Exhibitor. The prize was awarded by the President of the CTSI, Baroness Christine Crawley and CTSI Chairman, Mark McGinty, who commended the team for their innovation.

In addition, we also won a free advert for the project in TS Today, the CTSI's monthly publication which featured in the October edition. Since the advert went to press, we have begun to receive enquiries from other local authorities looking to purchase a licence to use the website in their areas. The website is currently being trialled at a primary school in East Sussex.

As a result of exhibiting at the conference we received a request from the Chief Executive of CTSI, Leon Livermore to visit Carmarthenshire to see the resources in use in a class room. He will be accompanied on this visit by the Regional Policy Officer from WLGA, Simon Wilkinson. This is a great opportunity to also showcase our other projects.

With a view to expanding the reach of the Money Wise project, we have been working closely with a family centre, who has agreed to trial the website with their adult users.

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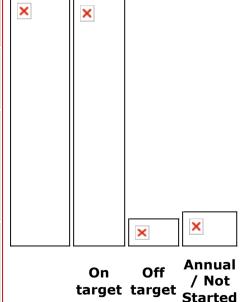

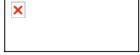

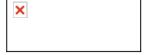

The participation rates still remain at approximately 80% for the blue bag recycling scheme and 40% for the food recycling scheme. In order to increase the recycling of food waste, a food waste bin liner trial is being introduced to 15000 properties throughout the county. Each property selected will be issued a supply of food waste liners (7 litres) together with an information leaflet; the scheme will be advertised through the normal social media channels. A pre-monitoring exercise was carried out over a period of 2 weeks in the early part of October to establish a benchmark with delivery of the bags taking place during the latter weeks of October. A post monitoring exercise will take place during November 2015 and February 2016 to determine if the liners have increased participation; the success of the trial will conclude the outcome of the possibility of providing liners to all properties in the county, subject to funding. During the pre & post monitoring process, flash surveys were carried out by the awareness team to establish participation in both the food and recycling scheme and subsequent visits to non participating properties will be carried out to by the team. In order to increase the level of knowledge for the contact centre staff they were included in the initial premonitoring exercise. The awareness team will be carrying out flash surveys throughout the year and will also be concentrating on large family households and new housing developments.

3. Summary of findings

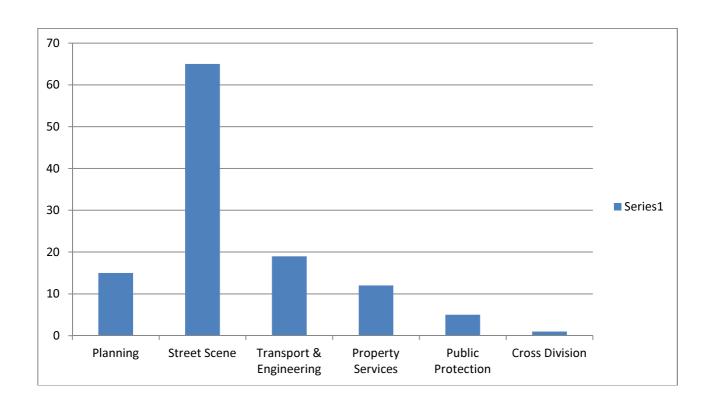
- 117 complaints were investigated during this period, compared to 135 complaints during the previous year's Q2
- 70 of these complaints (60%) received a response within the allocated time period. This reflects a decrease from the same period, with last year's percentage of 69%.
- 5 Public Protection complaints were recorded, there were none last year.
 Planning has seen a slight decrease from last year's figure of 19 to this year's total of 15.

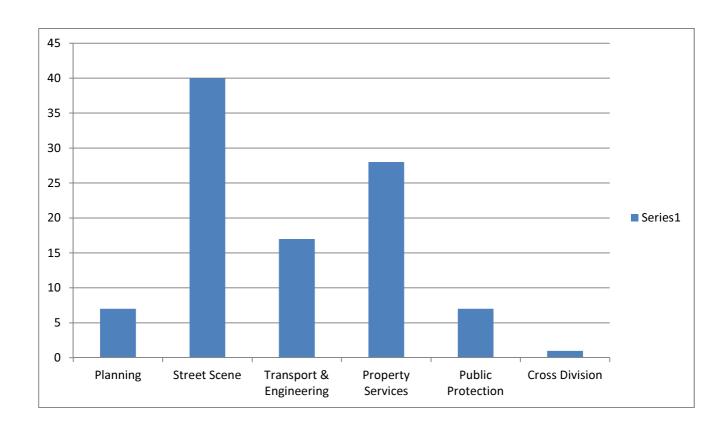

Analysis of the trends

Property Services

Three complaints were upheld in relation to Grounds Maintenance. Two involved grass cutting (not clearing up litter beforehand and clearing cut grass) and one involved the parking of a van near to a school entrance. A complaint regarding communication was partially upheld.

Two complaints regarding Building Maintenance were upheld. A Stage 2 complaint involved concerns with lack of permission and quality of work on a chimney stack that was in shared ownership. The second related to delays in addressing damp issues in a property.

Four complaints were partially upheld. These related to the tidying of rubble and fencing in a garden, delays in addressing repairs to a shed roof that was in shared ownership and also delays to work following a visit from a Building Inspector. A complaint about the standard of work carried out at a property was partially upheld because of a minor element concerning communication issues around the way Housing Services allocated the disruption payment.

Street Scene

One complaint was partially upheld for the Enforcement Team regarding concerns with the way a fly tipping referral was addressed. It was actioned and the resident was happy with the outcome.

Four complaints were partially upheld for Highways. They concerned the timing of road works, the manner of a member of staff whilst spraying weeds and delays to works to a pavement. A Stage 2 complaint addressed enforcement action taken because of road safety concerns.

18 complaints were upheld for Refuse, Recycling & Street Cleansing and 22 were partially upheld. The issues raised addressed subjects such as the poor quality of garden waste sacks, mess being left behind after a collection, damage to bins, not abiding to advertised Bank Holiday collection days and

a delay in collecting a dead rat.

• Transport and Engineering

Parking Enforcement had one complaint that was upheld (the manner of a member of staff) and three that were partially upheld (manner/ conduct of staff and a payment machine in a car park). A complaint was upheld for School Transport. It looked into the way issues concerning Passenger Assistants are investigated.

Three complaints were upheld for Traffic Management. They concerned crossing points not being flush with the pavement, issues with correspondence and a delay in passing on details of a traffic survey. One was partially upheld. This involved concerned with correspondence not being addressed.

Planning

Three Planning complaints were upheld. They concerned a delay in processing an application regarding height of trees in a neighbouring property obscuring light and two complaints regarding delays in answering correspondence. The three partially upheld complaints related to guidance on lobbying Members around Applications, clarity around the withdrawal of an Application and subsequent updating of the website and a Planning Enforcement matter.

Cross Divisional

Concerns were raised regarding signage, hedges and Authority vehicles using an access only lane.

At its meeting on the 24th July 2015, the Policy & Resources Scrutiny Committee considered its End of Year Departmental Performance Management Report for the period 1st April 2014 to 31st March 2015.

During consideration of the report, concerns were expressed about the format and length of Report B. It was also felt that the information was out of date by the time the Committee considered it. The Performance & Information Manager advised that members had requested a move from exception based reporting to a balanced and comprehensive format several years ago. He would however accept changing the format back to exception based although this would need to be agreed by the Chairs & Vice-Chairs of Scrutiny Forum following consultation with other committees. He reminded members that they had full access to the PIMS system at any time and could generate reports within it. The roll-out of tablets to members would also improve matters and he could review PIMS with IT services to see how the format of the report could be improved in the longer term.

The Policy & Resources Scrutiny Committee therefore unanimously resolved that "other Scrutiny Committees are offered the opportunity to receive Performance Management Report B on an exception basis".

Following the meeting, the Performance & Information Manager met with the Chairs & Vice-Chairs of Scrutiny Forum on the 27th July. The Forum asked him to look at alternative formats for the Performance Management reports.



On the 21st September, the Performance & Information Manager demonstrated a prototype "dashboard" report format to the Forum which facilitates drilling down into the PIMS system so that off- target Improvement Plan deliverables are easily identified as well as those that are on-target. Further development on this is required to enable access via Councillors' i-Pads.

An all-member seminar has therefore been organised for 2:00pm on 14th January 2016 in 'Y Ffwrnes to demonstrate to and consult with members on the revised format. Further details about the seminar will be circulated in due course.

It is hoped to introduce a new format later in the New Year.

6. COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP ANNUAL REPORT 2014/15

The Chair welcomed Councillor P.A. Palmer (Chair of the Community Safety Partnership) and Chief Inspector C. Templeton (Dyfed-Powys Police) to the meeting.

The Committee received the annual report from the Carmarthenshire Community Safety Partnership (CSP) which was presented by the Executive Board Member with responsibility for Police Liaison, Community Safety, Social Justice / Crime & Disorder (and Chair of the Partnership). The report included progress made in tackling crime and disorder during 2014/15 and updates from two key partners, namely the Mid & West Wales Fire and Rescue Service and Probation Services. It also highlighted key areas of partnership working and current priorities for the multiagency action groups which were driving forward the community safety agenda.

The following issues were raised during consideration of the report:

Reference was made to safety risks in and around inland waterways and it was asked who had responsibility for leading on such matters as the RNLI did not have sufficient manpower to carry out this work. The Executive Board Member for Communities informed the Committee that she had recently held a meeting with a new group in Carmarthen (the Carmarthenshire Water Safety Partnership) and the matter was due to be discussed at the next Community Safety Partnership meeting. Issues that needed addressing included clarifying which organisation took responsibility for maintenance of safety equipment such lifebuoys. She reassured the Committee that the various organisations would work in partnership to address this and was happy to provide an update at a future meeting of the Committee.

In response to a question about the amount of data from CCTV cameras had been used to solve crime, the Community Safety Manager informed the Committee that this information had previously been included in the annual report. However, as of

June 2015, there was no longer any statistical collation following the end of live monitoring.

It was asked whether volunteers could be used to monitor live CCTV cameras from their own homes. The Community Safety Manager stated that operators had to abide by Regulation of Investigatory Powers Act (RIPA) and Data Protection requirements and that it would be inappropriate for untrained volunteers to view live images of members of the public. However, discussions were on-going with Police representatives as to the future and best use of the cameras.

A question was asked about the '#PaulsPledge' campaign and clarification was sought as to what support Paul Pugh was receiving from the Partnership. The Community Safety Manager informed the Committee that Dyfed-Powys Police were leading on this campaign and that the Authority provided travelling expenses for Mr. Pugh when promoting his campaign at events throughout the county. Other charities were also supporting Mr. Pugh's work.

The reduction in most categories of crime was welcomed but concern was expressed about seasonal crime in rural areas (e.g. sheep rustling during lambing season), as it was suggested that many residents in rural areas felt somewhat alone in facing these problems. The Chief Inspector acknowledged that whilst crime figures had reduced, the Force understood that it still needed to improve its operations and understand its communities, especially those in the rural areas. The introduction of mobile police stations was an element of this work.

Reference was made to speeding on roads in the vicinity of the first phase of the Cross Hands East development (e.g. Black Lion Road) and that signage needed to be improved to remind drivers of the 30mph limit. The Chief Inspector agreed to feed this information back to the relevant officers in the Police Force.

It was asked whether there had been a change in the types of crime being reported and recorded. The Chief Inspector informed the Committee that offences relating to historical sexual abuse had increased significantly during the past 12 months. It was particularly encouraging that victims were prepared to come forward and the Police was prepared to deal with this increase.

Concern was expressed at the number of high number of fatalities amongst motorcyclists and it was suggested that the many initiatives in place were not reducing these figures. The Road Safety & Traffic Manager and Chief Inspector acknowledged that the number of fatalities was of great concern and that education was key. The Road Safety & Traffic Manager reminded the Committee that the engagement initiative in Llandovery was only introduced during 2015/16 and its impact would be reviewed in due course. This was a partnership approach alongside the Police and the Fire Service where officers met motorcyclists and discussed road safety issues as well as offering opportunities to attend the Authority's road safety course. He also added that the Welsh Government was currently investigating innovative approaches to target the problem and more details were expected early in the new year.

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In response to a question about the Rural Route Treatment initiative, the Road Safety & Traffic Manager informed the Committee that this initiative which had commenced in 2007, focused on high-speed routes with a history of accidents rather than just simply improving specific junctions or bends. The projects typically involved engineering works, new signage and road markings and revised speed limits. The initiative had been recognised by the Welsh Government as an example of best practice and the Authority had been successful once again in securing funding from the Welsh Government for specific schemes in 2015/16.

A question was asked about the A40/A48 routes in and around Carmarthen. The Road Safety & Traffic Manager informed the Committee that the Welsh Government and the South Wales Trunk Road Agency had recently reviewed and amended speed limits across the trunk road network in Carmarthenshire and there had been changes made to speed limits on the approaches to Carmarthen. The Authority liaised with the Trunk Road Agency on a regular basis.

UNANIMOUSLY RESOLVED that the report be received.

7. SUBSTANCE MISUSE SERVICES VISITS UPDATE

The Committee considered an update on the visits made by the Executive Board Members, with responsibility for substance misuse and health and social care, to substance misuse service providers. The visits had been undertaken in response to a recommendation by the Committee's Task & Finish Group, following its review of Substance Misuse Services during 2013/14.

The following issues were raised during consideration of the report:

It was suggested that it was those individuals who did not ask for assistance, were the ones causing the most disruption in communities. The Council was applauded for recently utilising new legislation to tackle ongoing anti-social behaviour at a property in Pen-y-Groes by issuing a Closure Notice to safeguard tenants and residents next to the property. The Executive Board Member for Communities agreed that it was important to show that unacceptable anti-social behaviour would not be tolerated but also to remind individuals that assistance such as that provided by the substance misuse treatment services, was available.

The Chair suggested that for future visits, the Chair of the Task & Finish Group which undertook the review of substance misuse services, be invited to attend alongside the relevant Executive Board Members. The Committee agreed to the proposal.

8. REVENUE & CAPITAL BUDGET MONITORING REPORT 2015/16

Cllr. D.E. Williams declared and interest in that he is the legal owner of Cystanog Bends (on B4300, Capel Dewi).

The Committee considered the Revenue & Capital Budget Monitoring Report for the Environment Department, Public Protection Services and the Community Safety Team, as at 30th June 2015 in relation to the 2015/16 financial year. The following issues were raised in relation to the report:

In response to a question about the current status of the transfer of public conveniences, the Group Accountant noted that the £44,000 variance was related to the costs still being incurred as part of the three-year rolling programme of transfers.

Reference was made to the variance of £50,000 in the Civil Design service and clarification sought regarding the source of income. The Group Accountant informed the Committee that the income came from both internal and external clients and that a review of hourly rates and productivity was currently being carried out to try and make good the possible shortfall in income. The Interim Director of Environment informed the Committee that the Highways and Non-Highways Design Teams were being brought together at present. This had been proposed by the previous Director and the restructuring was being undertaken to pool skills and knowledge, lessen the reliance on external consultants and address the peaks and troughs in demand.

In response to further comments regarding income generation and costs associated with vacancies, the Interim Director of Environment agreed that the work of the Design Service was an opportunity to generate income for the Authority. One example of this was the work being undertaken with external public sector organisations to manage regional contractor frameworks. The costs associated with vacancies showed that all posts in this service created income for the Authority and that employing staff was a risk when demand for work reduced. This was another reason that the Local Authority was working with other public sector organisations, thus ensuring better planning of future work programmes.

It was asked why there was a variance of £393,000 in the Property Services budget due to an unachievable income target, when it was known that the Carmarthenshire Home Standard work would eventually decrease as the project was completed. The Group Accountant and the Interim Director of Environment informed the Committee that the Service was considering various efficiencies and that the matter was being looked at by senior officers as it was a long recognised issue which was now coming to a head.

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It was asked whether earmarked reserves (corporate or departmental) would be utilised to address the forecasted end of year variance of £379,000. The Group Accountant informed the Committee that there were departmental and specific reserves which could be used to meet the overspend but that the most recent budget monitoring exercise for the end of August 2015, had shown that the overspend had reduced. The Interim Director of Environment noted that reserves were often held for projects that would save the Authority money in the long-term (e.g. upgrading public lighting network with energy efficient bulbs) but that a list of those reserves and what they were specifically allocated for, could be circulated to the Committee.

Clarification was sought regarding the variance of £17,000 in the Public Protection Service in underachievement of fee income in 2015/16. The Trading Standards Services Manager informed the Committee that this reflected the current financial climate and was related to the Safety Work undertaken to monitor and regulate storage of dangerous materials (e.g. explosives). The variance was also influenced by court cases and the Authority's ability to recover costs.

In response to a query about the work at the Trebeddrod Reservoir, the Group Accountant acknowledged that there were no details in the report but that £112,000 had been spent on the project to date. She added that further information could be circulated to the Committee.

RESOLVED that the report be received.

5. PUBLIC QUESTIONS

No public questions were received.

6. SUSTAINING POST-SIXTEEN COLLEGE/SCHOOL TRANSPORT

Councillor D.J.R. Bartlett declared an interest in that he is a governor at Ysgol Dyffryn Aman.

Councillor C.A. Campbell declared an interest in that he has two children in secondary education who may continue in post-sixteen education.

Councillor A. James declared an interest in that he has children in full time education.

Mr. S. Pearson declared an interest in that he has children in full time education.

The Committee considered a report outlining a proposal to charge for post-sixteen college/school transport. The report was presented to members of both Scrutiny

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Committees in order that they might offer comments, as part of the formal consultation process.

The Head of Transport & Engineering informed the Committee that at its meeting on the 24th February 2015, the County Council approved a three year budget strategy, part of which included agreement to "continue with a Home to School College Transport Service with the introduction of a charge, which would be introduced on a phased basis over a number of years, subject to "any children on free school meals being exempt as well as children currently at Pantycelyn school also being exempt".

The Head of Transport & Engineering also reminded the Committee that post-sixteen transport was a non-statutory service and that the Council to date, had chosen to exercise discretion and provide a service. However, due to the significant financial challenge facing the Authority at present and for the foreseeable future, this proposal had been developed in order to sustain a post-sixteen transport service, following discussions with major partners.

The following issues were discussed during consideration of the report:

Reference was made to discussions at a previous meeting of the Environmental & Public Protection Scrutiny Committee in June 2015 when members were informed that discussions with schools and Coleg Sir Gâr were on-going and it was asked what progress had been made. Clarification was also sought in relation to the subsidy currently provided to the service. The Head of Transport & Engineering informed the Committee that throughout discussions, officers had sought to sustain the service. The College was also facing financial pressures and whilst officers had sought further contributions, this was not possible. However, the College had committed to maintain its current contribution of approximately £700,000 to support the service. The net effect of the Authority's subsidy was £477,000.

In response to a question about the resolution passed by County Council in February 2015, the Head of Transport & Engineering reaffirmed that any pupils in receipt of free school meals would be exempt from the charge and that all the children currently based at the Pantycelyn Campus of Ysgol Bro Dinefwr, would also be exempt. However, children in primary school in the Llandovery area who would be moving up to Ysgol Bro Dinefwr in the future, would not be exempt should they choose to continue in post-sixteen education.

It was suggested that education was a key factor in improving the well-being of communities and grave concern was expressed that a charge would not only deprive those youngsters who were poorer financially but those who were culturally poor and not necessarily appreciated or supported at home from attaining a good standard of education. The Head of Transport & Engineering recognised that this was a difficult issue and that all the Committee's comments would be considered as part of the consultation process.

Reference was made to the member Focus Group which had met in recent months to discuss school transport policy. It was stated that the Group was united in its

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opposition to a charge for post-sixteen transport but when faced with the reality of the budget situation, members had considered £100 a head to be a reasonable charge, should it be implemented. However, the charge of £200-250 proposed in the report far exceeded this and was unacceptable, especially as in due course, it would only increase. The Head of Transport & Engineering acknowledged that the Focus Group had been opposed to the charge but could not recall any discussion relating to a charge of £100. He informed the Committee that the charge had been calculated based on the current budget commitment, an assessment of pupil numbers and take up of the service.

It was asked whether youngsters would be expected to pay up front for transport or whether this could be done in stages throughout the year. Reference was also made to the stigma attached to free school meals and reassurance was sought that those receiving free transport would not be identified. The Interim Director of Environment agreed that different methods of payment could be considered and the Head of Transport & Engineering confirmed that this suggestion would be captured as part of the consultation process. He also reassured members that all pupils, regardless of whether they paid or not, would receive the same pass.

Concern was expressed about the divisive nature of the proposed charge by burdening younger people with additional costs for education, even before they considered a degree at university. It was suggested that there was little breakdown of all the figures quoted in the report, especially in relation to the numbers of pupils on existing routes, the numbers currently eligible for free school meals, as well as the potential impact of Universal Credit on those currently eligible for free school meals. Reference was also made to areas such as Brynaman where pupils in different local authority areas would be paying different costs for attending sixth form in schools or colleges (e.g. Neath Port Talbot currently charged £100 whilst Carmarthenshire were looking to charge £200+). The Head of Transport & Engineering reminded the Committee that the principle was agreed by County Council and this was simply the commencement of the consultation process which was required for a change in policy. He acknowledged that charges did vary across the eight Welsh authorities but that it was a continually changing picture. He noted that a number of students were already travelling to Gower College from Carmarthenshire and paying approximately £280 per year. He also reminded the Committee that the school/college bus network was constantly reviewed to ensure it was being utilised to its full potential (with a current 95% occupancy).

It was suggested that the majority of the Committee was unhappy with the proposed charge and how this had been included within the overall budget strategy leaving members feeling unclear about many issues. It was asked how the other local authorities had approached and consulted on this matter and whether Carmarthenshire's consultation process could be stopped pending more information being sought regarding the implications of this proposal. The Interim Director of Environment stated that the implementation of the consultation process was being undertaken in accordance with the decision made by County Council. He reminded the Committee that the Environment Department had faced large reductions in funding for many years and whilst in the past, such reductions could be absorbed

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within existing services, proposals such as this were now impacting directly on the county's residents. The Head of Transport & Engineering stated that the consultation process was a statutory requirement which had to be undertaken and could not be postponed. The budget strategy included a reference to post-sixteen transport which was now being consulted on before County Council considered a formal change to policy. He reminded members that they could make additional representations during the consultation process as well as through the forthcoming budget consultation process which would be commencing in the Autumn.

The importance of the principle of a free education was highlighted and concern was expressed that there would be families, who whilst were not eligible for free school meals, would struggle to pay such a charge. It was argued that the Authority should be encouraging young people to remain in education and that charging for post-sixteen transport would actually discourage participation in further education. The consultation referred to in the report was also queried and it was suggested that the majority of those who responded to the last budgetary consultation and who agreed with the proposal to charge, were actually middle-aged with no children. It was also felt that the charge would hinder the development of Welsh-medium education in the County's secondary schools as pupils would opt for the nearest school with a 6th Form rather than one offering Welsh-medium provision.

Reference was made to the increase in school meal costs and along with an additional charge for attending post-sixteen education, it was suggested that the impact on families with two children or more would be significant. It was acknowledged that there were financial and moral duties of care to be considered but that the Authority could learn from other authorities' experiences. It was also asked whether the impact of parents not paying and then driving pupils to school instead (as well as resultant emissions) had been considered and whether the equalities impact assessment had actually taken minority groups would be placed at a disadvantage financially, into consideration. The Head of Engineering & Transport informed the Committee that the Equalities Impact Assessment had been undertaken and as it was a 'live' document it would be amended on an on-going basis, as responses were received during the consultation process. He reminded the Committee that there was a Council resolution in place to proceed with the consultation and that following this, all views submitted would be collated and considered prior to a final decision by County Council.

The Committee declined to endorse the proposal outlined in the report and it was proposed that prior to proceeding further, the Executive Board request further details from the other Welsh local authorities who had already implemented charges for post-sixteen transport, to clarify how these had been implemented and their effect on post-sixteen education in the long term.

UNANIMOUSLY RESOLVED that the Executive Board ask the other Welsh local authorities for full details of how they had implemented charges for post-sixteen transport and clarification as to whether these had effected post-sixteen education in the long term.
