WHERE WE WERE

- Pendine Outdoors is a large multi activity outdoor residential centre operating since the 1960's to a predominately Primary School audience.
 - Maximum capacity of 120 beds,
 - Over 2000 stays per year.
- Typical school experience:
 - a full week residential Monday to Friday
 - Sharing facilities:
 - with other schools (school clusters) include shared cabins, dining facilities and activity-based minibus travel.

WHERE WE WERE – PROGRAMME DELIVERY

- The program is a mixture of:
 - Onsite including use of the sea and the coastal strip, climbing tower and team building.
 - Off site activities including lakes and woods and extreme stream. Day out option, usually further west, by coach.
 - Evening activities Round House, Orienteering & Nature Walk,
- Very competitive price point:
 - In county £175.00 (FSM £125.00) with a view to keeping access to the opportunity of the experience as open as possible.
- Current non-residential options include Days Out: Pen Y Fan, River Studies etc. Also Tented Expeditions to Snowdon.




- The Outdoor Industry as a whole has been particularly hard hit with industry on a knife edge:
 - Residential centres particularly bearing the brunt. Many will close.
 - Lack of certainty of the future
 - Significant risk of loss of capacity
 - Staff exiting the industry loss of skilled practitioners & less new staff entering the industry. Reduced opportunity at HE and FE / to study.
 - Affects on possible client experience going forwards.

WHERE WE ARE NOW – IMPACT OF COVID

The current situation

- Pendine has been closed to residential groups as of March 2020, with Staff furloughed, redeployed, ongoing Repair and Maintenance issues and forward planning / financial modelling.
- Instructors are employed on a casual basis no certainty they will return.
- Work on capital forward planning on hold
- Detailed work on future options.
- Consequent impacts on children & young people:
 - No residential experience, compounded by measures seeking to mitigate
 COVID-19. Impact on well-being & mental health particularly.



FUTURE DELIVERY - ON SITE

Offering schools exclusive use of the site for their residential booking - `bubble protected`

- Half week bookings 2 nights only.
- Adapted program no use of minibuses. Onsite & walking distance activities only.
- Dedicated Cabin.
 - COVID management around Dining/Catering & cleaning including deep clean before/after.
- Advantages: seeks to offer a confidence-inspiring & robust shape around the booking.
- Downside: shorter stays, less inter-school interaction, some activities not offered.
- Less capacity in high season bookings spread from March to early November. No guarantee of a summer slot.
 - Levels of confidence on this shape & likely take-up, including fringe season?
- Can we staff this? Will staff return to the industry?

POST COVID THE NEW NORMAL AND BEING RELEVANT

- Face reality. Work with Education on exploring other options not just at POEC
 - Core options going forward: Go more Mobile (invest in vehicles & kit).
 - Day Visits to schools' sites and schools to other sites
 - Utilise the Climbing Tower
 - NNAS support of maths/problem solving,
 - John Muir Award wild places, environmental/conservation etc.
 - Develop North Dock as a boating base
 - Utilise other residential facilities in County
 - Pendine Attractor Project, Llandysul Paddlers, Cwmamman Youth Centre
- Develop tented residential stays in different areas of the County.

SUMMARY THE NEW NORMAL AND BEING RELEVANT

- POEC is an aging much loved facility
- Customers hold the delivery of activity in high esteem
- Future delivery will need to be a blend of POEC delivery, other residential and non-residential delivery at a range of safe sites in Carmarthenshire and direct working with Schools across the County
- The industry is at risk. Outdoor Education instruction as a career is at risk. But this could be an opportunity to be key in the market in Carmarthenshire.
