Project Description	<p>This project is to fund Summer Engagement Activities, as match funding for the Children in Need “Ieuenctive Dau” for 10-18 year olds.</p> <p>The aim of the project is to support disadvantaged young people to participate more in their community and raise their self confidence and personal skills. The project aims to consult with the most disadvantaged young people on what activities they would enjoy in order to engage them in future participation and volunteering in community activities and events.</p> <p>Dr. Mz’s aim to provide new skills and opportunities to these young people and introduce them to the project through pre engagement opportunities like arts and crafts, cookery, woodwork, trips and music activities so they feel more confident with improved communication, teamwork and organisational skills to be ready to volunteer in the community. They will consult with the children and young people to see what they want their programme to look like.</p> <p>The young people will learn skills in planning activities, language and play, appropriate behaviour, mentoring, role modelling and team building. Project Description	The Carmarthen Male Voice Choir has been an integral part of the music scene in Carmarthen and its neighbouring villages for over half a century and, during that time, has travelled widely to such countries as Brittany, Germany, Holland and Canada. Although the choir plays an important

	<p>role in supporting charitable causes, it has also found time to compete in Eisteddfodau and was successful in winning the primary award in its class at the Swansea National Eisteddfod.</p> <p>The choristers, the majority of whom have Welsh as their first language, are amateurs and represent a good cross section of occupations and professions. Their unifying factor is their love of singing.</p> <p>In furtherance of the choir's aims and objectives they have been invited to attend the 50th Anniversary Concert of the Dublin Welsh Male Voice Choir at the National Concert Hall, Dublin in September 2016. The Concert programme includes songs in the English, Irish and Welsh language and will serve to heighten Welsh Culture.</p> <p>Carmarthen Male Voice will celebrate their 60th Anniversary in 2018 and the visit to Dublin will cement relationships with a view of a reciprocal visit to Carmarthen for the Anniversary Choir. This will serve to further enhance local economy and culture.</p> <p>Such prestigious events always assist in recruiting members, regardless of nationality. The present membership includes people from England, Spain and Bermuda and assists incomers to be immersed in the Welsh language and traditions. This in turn leads to a significant community benefit with concerts being held in a wide variety of venues including, Village Halls, Old People's Homes, Town centres as well as more prestigious concert venues.</p> <p>Choir members are anxious to widen their choral experience and assist in the cycle of continued improvement.</p> <p>The Choir has continued unabated since 1958 and is on a sound financial footing, indeed the visit to Dublin will financially assist in the long term, given that it will undoubtedly lead to an increase in membership.</p> <p>The proposed visit to Dublin has helped the Choir to move with the times, whilst it is not a business it now conducts itself in a businesslike manner forming Sub Groups to improve and enhance its efficiency. These groups include fundraising, membership recruitment, marketing and the planned visit to Dublin was the catalyst in this regard.</p>

Project Title	Roof repairs & Re-pointing
Applicant	Caersalem Independent Chapel
Project Description	<p>Caersalem Chapel situated in Pontyberem was a daughter chapel of Capel Seion, Drefach. The chapel was built during the pastorate of the Rev. J Evans in 1847, but completely rebuilt under his successor the Rev. W E Evans in 1884. Soon after the rebuilding a vestry was added at the left south-west side.</p> <p>The chapel front is in rock-faced masonry in local sandstone with conspicuous contrasting dressings in local grey limestone, in a style freely based on the Classical. The front elevation of the chapel is pedimented with a plain twice-corbelled string-course as a cornice, but the elevation is more conspicuously articulated into three bays by pilasters; the two inner pilasters penetrate the pediment to reach the roof verge.</p> <p>As an independent church they encourage the community to utilise the building, various events are held with the aim of opening the doors to draw new members, encouraging local residents to attend.</p> <p>This project is for essential repairs to the Chapel as included in the condition report of 2015 indicating that the East facing slate roof of the Vestry and the lead sheet lined gutter directly below was in poor condition and required replacement within 12-24 months, hence this is now due.</p> <p>It is proposed to strip the defective slate roof coverings and replace with new Welsh slate over treated softwood battens and under felt, conduct repairs and woodworm treatment to the underlying roof structure, replace the lead sheet gutter and supporting timber boarding below with new treated timber boarding and weatherproof with sheet lead over fleece membrane and provide new cast iron rainwater pipes and gutter outlet boxes.</p> <p>Also, it is proposed to adapt existing rainwater pipes discharging rainwater from the main roof away from the new lead sheet gutter. It is envisaged that the works will be conducted by a recognised and experienced conservation led Building Contractor.</p> <p>Also, the main front South elevation suffers from water penetration, albeit the extent of damage internally is not considered significant when compared to some Churches and</p>

	Chapels, but requires the porous cornice to be removed and re-pointed.

Applicant	Eiriol
Project Description	<p>Eiriol is a charitable organisation to relieve the effects of mental health problems amongst those people living in Carmarthenshire through the provision of a comprehensive advocacy service.</p> <p>The project aims to expand the scope of Eiriol's independent mental health advocacy service into one of the identified areas of high need, being Ammanford.</p> <p>Currently all Eiriol's mental health and carers' advocates are based at the Carmarthen office, with drop in centres operating in Llanelli and Newcastle Emlyn. They currently do not have this service in the Ammanford area.</p>

	<p>Eiriol does offer a home visit service but this is necessarily very limited both in terms of the advocate's time and travelling costs incurred. This project is to establish a base in Ammanford to provide an in depth one to one advocacy service in an accessible location. The office would allow advocates on their 3 current projects which are, 50+ mental health advocacy, mental health carers advocacy and generic community mental health advocacy, enabling clients to access the service in their community.</p> <p>There will be a dedicated project worker who would assist the advocates with client admin and liaise with clients and be a permanent point of contact for the project.</p> <p>The project will help the wider community by providing a service that not only supports those with mental health issues and their carers but also raises awareness of a problem that is still widely stigmatised and feared. It will enable a very vulnerable group of people who live in the area to access the support that will assist them in taking control of their lives and work towards recovery.</p>
