Project Title	Creating a Professional Image
Applicant	Cor Persain
Ward	Tycroes
Project Description/ Community Benefit	Cor Persain is an amateur Choir funded entirely by member subscriptions and fundraising. The Choir has had the occasional small donation from some community councils. Despite being amateur they set themselves high standards and want to be as "professional" as possible. The items requested will help them become fully professional.
	<b>To provide the choir for the first time with a professional</b> <b>image</b> - A choir is judged not only by how it sings but by image, first impressions when appearing on stage is very important. The choir want to look their best and up until now have worn their own clothes in an agreed colour and worn matching scarves. They want to upgrade their image to match the standard of their singing and would like to have matching professional made dresses and jackets made for each choir member.
	To provide the choir with portable risers to make the back row more visible. Cor Persain are a small choir with 28 members at present and when performing they stand in a two row formation. Sometimes the back row is not at all visible and they would like the risers to lift the back row to give a tiered effect. Many of the venues in which they perform are unable to provide staging or similar.
	<b>To provide the choir with a portable PA System.</b> The MD is usually the person who introduces our performance items. Sometimes other members of the choir speak and on occasions they may have a guest compare and not everyone

	is able to project their voice to the back of the hall.
	If the choir have guest soloists they sometimes require amplification and many venues are unable to provide this or charge us to hire. A portable public address system with a microphone would enable them to provide their own amplification.
	Cor Persain are available to participate in any community event, and in the immediate vicinity of Ammanford the choir has participated in St. Edmund's Church Centenary Celebrations, Ammanford Town Centre's St. David's Day celebrations, Rotary's Christmas Concert fundraiser, Ammanford Lions Club's Tree of Light Fundraiser, Concert in Aman Civic Centre on behalf of Marie Curie Cancer Care for example.
	Within Carmarthenshire the choir have participated, in the last two years, in Dyfed Powys Police World War One Commemoration Event, Fundraiser in Llanelli for the "Hands for Alan" appeal, Llandeilo's Festival of Senses, Aberglasney's Christmas Fayre, and several National Botanic Garden events.
	Occasionally they receive a donation towards the cost of the accompanist but most performances are given entirely free of charge.

The choir provides fun events for members and others when organising fundraising activities, which include quiz nights, karaoke night and craft sales.
	Research into singing has shown it is good for your <b>Health</b> and particularly for your heart and general well being. Professor Graham Welch, Chair of Music Education at the Institute of Education, University of London, has studied developmental and medical aspects of singing for 30 years and he says the health benefits of singing are both physical and psychological. He says "Singing has physical benefits because it is an aerobic activity that increases oxygenation in the blood stream and exercises major muscle groups in the upper body, even when sitting. Singing has psychological benefits because of its normally positive effect in reducing stress levels through the action of the endocrine system which is linked to our sense of emotional well-being. Psychological benefits are also evident when people sing together as well as alone because of the increased sense of community, belonging and shared endeavour."
	<b>Culture -</b> Music, and in particular, singing is strongly associated with the culture of Wales and the choir prides itself on being good ambassadors and enjoys singing in both

Membership of the choir gives musical and cultural benefits as participants gain skills, knowledge and understanding of the nature and place of music in their lives and the lives of others. The choir also enjoys cultural exchanges and has sung twice in Spain. They often sing with other choirs and this influences learning by broadening their minds in how to interpret music. The choir fervently hope that listening to them performs provides a cultural experience for all audiences.</li> <li>Education - The choir promotes the teaching of basic musical knowledge through singing and ladies who have joined the choir have no knowledge of Welsh and learn the basics, through singing in the language.</li> </ul>

Project Description/ Community Benefit	Pantyffynnon Partnership Group was initially formed in 2012, as a constituted group from Pantyffynnon Communities First. It is made up of community members, local business owners, faith leaders, local councillors and other charitable community group members.

	The Pantyffynnon Partnership Centre is currently run by a dedicated group of volunteers and it has been able to sustain the post of a part time administrative assistant following the support of a CCC grant in 2014.
	However, there is now scope to maximise the current usage and to further develop the centre into a flourishing community hub, involving the <b>Recruitment of a Development Learning</b> <b>Worker</b> , who will be the one going key in leading the PPG into further financial sustainability.
	This project is to employ a local individual who will have the required skill set and dedication in community development to assist the director team to drive forward the project.
	The project will deliver increased social inclusion and learning as access to training will remain affordable for the area, also continuing to generate employment and volunteering opportunities. The centre will be able to increase participation by means of maximising the usage at the centre, whilst at the same time enabling the centre to continue its journey in becoming fully sustainable.

Project Description/ Community Benefit	Llandybie Playing fields Association is a public association established in 1939 specifically to provide, develop and maintain a recreation ground to be used for the religious, social, moral and physical well being of residents, both adults and children in Llandybie and the surrounding villages of Pentregwenlais and Derwydd.
	Priority projects for LPFA include upgrading facilities at Llandybie Playing Fields and environmental improvements at both Pentregwenlais and Derwydd. The aim of this venture is to work in partnership with Llandybie RFC and a number of community organisations to improve facilities at the Llandybie Playing fields.
	This project will enable the King George V playing fields to undertake a sand slitting exercise resulting in the de compaction of the soil, allowing the water to help penetrate and enter the drainage system, which was implemented two years ago from monies received from Mynydd y Betws.
	The installation of drainage at the playing fields two years ago has been instrumental in ensuring the fields can be used for

	all sporting activities in the years to come. However, whilst the drainage is working, it has been recognised that the top six inches of top soil on the pitch is compacted and surface water in certain areas is unable to reach the drainage channels. This sand slitting exercise will ensure that the playing fields become playable throughout the winter months. Rugby has been a major part in the growth and development of Llandybie as a village. The nature of the sport means that lifelong friendships develop and the club remains a focal point for reunions of past players and supporters.
